DENVER TO START LAYING RAILS MAY 15
CRISIS IS PASSED IN FLOODS, HOOVER BELIEVESWORD BASED ON
SURVEY OF ALL
FLOODED LANDSDEATH LIST WON'T PASS

RELIEF IMPERATIVE

(By Associated Press)
NEW ORLEANS, April 27.—The crisis probably has passed in the Mississippi river flood situation and no more extensive hardship, suffering and loss of life and property is anticipated in the opinion of Secretary of Commerce Hoover. President Coolidge's observer in the inundated region. Hoover today completed his tour of the area from Memphis to New Orleans.

In Mississippi and Arkansas Mr. Hoover said he found no unsatisfactory conditions and only the necessity of continuing adequate relief measures. He said, however, that his view of the flood danger may be upset by later developments.

"I believe the flood dead will not greatly exceed 200," he said.

Homeless 150,000
"The homeless will probably be not much greater than 150,000."

"Our greatest problem is the rehabilitation of the homeless persons in their former habitations and the re-establishment of agricultural production in the stricken regions."

The commerce secretary felt confident that the return of normal agricultural production in the inundated regions will be only a matter of a few weeks after the water runs off the land.

Lay Plans To Blast
Mississippi Levee

NEW ORLEANS, April 27.—(AP)—With the definite decision that a breach would be made in the levees below New Orleans Friday to save the city, officials today turned their attention toward the formulation of plans for cutting the levee. A series of conferences was in progress between state and federal engineers and Major General Edgar Jadwin, chief of army engineers.

Meanwhile the high water continued along a three hundred mile front between New Orleans and Vicksburg, with national guardmen patrolled.

New Type Of Plane
Is Found Successful

CLEVELAND, April 27.—(AP)—Aeronautical engineers here today hailed as a revolutionary step in the advancement of naval aviation the successful trial flight of a huge single motor air-cooled bombing plane constructed in the plant of the Glen L. Martin Airplane company.

This great ship, largest bomber of its type in the world, took off from the Glen L. Martin field promptly at noon, and soared for twenty minutes, the first time in history that any military plane had carried a load greater than its own weight.

Both the take-off and the landing were described by observers as perfect.

Gray Lays Blame

(Story in Column 5)Ex-Sen. Beveridge
Dies Early Today

(By Associated Press)
INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 27.—Albert Jeremiah Beveridge, former United States senator from Indiana died suddenly here today.

Mr. Beveridge was twice elected to the senate from Indiana. He retired from the senate in 1911 and twice sought to return but was defeated in 1914 as the progressive party candidate and in 1922 was defeated by Samuel M. Ralston, democrat.

Death came at 6:10 this morning at his home here. He has been working for some time upon his latest book, the life of Abraham Lincoln.

Mr. Beveridge's death was caused by heart disease.

The former senator had not been confined to his bed but on orders of his physicians had been living quietly while undergoing treatment. He was 64 years old.

Ruby Defense Denies
Charges Are Dropped

Defense counsel in the Martin S. Ruby embezzlement case, which was tried in 29th criminal district court here last week and a verdict and two year sentence returned by the jury, have not dropped charges of misconduct on the jury, but will press the charges in their attempts to secure a new trial next Friday. It was announced today by Pearce and Triplett, representatives of Mr. Ruby.

Fred Pearce, member of the firm, said they have affidavits and other papers to support their charges, and that a strong plea will be made for another trial. The attorneys, however, failed in efforts to draw admission of irregularity from members of the jury in an investigation conducted before Judge Clark M. Mullican, trial judge, Tuesday morning.

Selection Of Moore
Jury Is Continued

AUSTIN, April 27.—(AP)—Criminal district court today resumed the process of qualifying talesmen from whom a jury will be selected to try H. H. Moore, former legislator, indicted on charges of accepting a lobbyist's \$1,000 bribe.

An additional venire of sixty men were summoned today to supplement the 27 from whom 15 men were qualified yesterday as prospective jurors to whom opposing counsel may later apply their pre-emptory challenges.

CALLES THINKS
ROAD TO PEACE
IS NOW OPENEDCOOLIDGE'S ADDRESS IS
PLEASING, HE SAYS, IN
PLEA FOR HARMONY

(By Associated Press)
MEXICO CITY, April 27.—President Calles believes that the road has now been opened for a satisfactory settlement of all difficulties between Mexico and the United States.

He emphasized this in commenting on President Coolidge's New York speech and said that at the bottom of all the difficulties, "there is nothing more than a misunderstanding or divergence of judgment in appreciating a matter of legal order, which really had not affected the legitimate interests, nor, fortunately, injured the sentiment of the nation, nor brought any injury to our decorum."

Doesn't Want Arbitration
The Mexican chief executive has no desire that the Mexican-American controversy shall be settled by arbitration, saying: "It appears to us perfectly satisfactory that such settlement should be obtained by means of negotiations."

"I think, as President Coolidge does," he said, "that there is a great desire to maintain cordial relations. It is not only possible, but easy to reach an amicable settlement, and using Mr. Coolidge's own words as carried by the newspapers, 'I believe that the two countries should comport themselves in such a way that their friendly relations are not impaired.'"

Asked his opinion relative to President Coolidge's mention of the origin of the difficulties with Mexico, President Calles declared:

"I believe he spoke of claims which over a long series of years were referred to as damages, either as regards American lives or property, which, due principally to revolutionary acts, have been, and will be, judged by general and special claims commissions which are functioning."

According to the newspaper version of President Coolidge's speech, he traces the origin of the intensification of difficulties to promulgation by the Mexican government of laws which Washington considered menacing confiscation of American properties. Fortunately, due to correct understanding, comprehension of our purposes and the scope of those laws, President Coolidge in his speech showed a thorough understanding that.

DALLAS, April 27.—Nomination of Governor Moody for president in 1928 was advocated here Wednesday by Jed C. Adams, of Dallas, democratic national committeeman from Texas.

"In my opinion," said Mr. Adams, "neither Governor Al Smith nor Wm. G. McAdoo is a logical candidate for the democrats. I think that both of them should keep out of the race."

"I think Governor Moody would make an excellent candidate for the office of president of the United States and I would like to see the Texas delegation to the next democratic national convention next summer go instructed for him or left free to vote for a man of equal calibre. We should have a candidate from the south or west."

THEATRES AID
FLOOD RELIEF

Palace Will Show Sunday For
Red Cross; All Texas Will
Enter Into Scheme

(By The Associated Press)
DALLAS, April 27.—Backed by the Motion Picture Theatre Owners of Texas, Inc., and the film exchanges, theatres throughout the state next Sunday will devote their entire programs and all their energies to the cause of flood relief.

Benefit performances will be given in more than 250 theatres. W. S. Wald, manager of the theatre owners' organization announced the entire proceeds of these performances, without deduction for expenses of any kind, will be turned over to the Red Cross, so that every penny spent in these theatres next Sunday will go to the relief of flood victims.

Palace To Be Open Here
In line with the plans of the Red Cross and the Motion Picture Theatre Owners' association two shows will be presented at the Palace theatre, on next Sunday afternoon, Manager Clifford Lindsey said today. The first show will begin at one o'clock and the second two hours later, closing the afternoon's performance at 5 o'clock, he said.

Pictures for the day will be furnished by a Dallas concern, Mr. Lindsey stated, and all money taken in will be turned over to the American Red Cross to be used in rehabilitation work in the flooded areas.

City Marshall And
Predecessor Fight

ST. JO, Texas, April 27.—(AP)—Henry Crump, about 30, a former city marshal here, still lived Wednesday with chances pronounced against his surviving two bullet wounds in the lung sustained during a shooting affray in a local barber shop Tuesday night.

W. G. Donely, present city marshal, was taken in custody after the shooting but was released soon after, according to Renee Alford, Jr., county attorney, at the request of one of Crump's brothers. The brother was quoted by Mr. Alford as saying Donely fired in self defense. According to the story of the affray as related by Sheriff Walker, Crump was causing a disturbance in the barber shop. When told by Donely that he was arrested, Crump, witnesses said, took a pistol out of a drawer in the shop and fired at Donely who returned the fire.

NEW YORK, April 27.—(AP)—Henry Judd Gray agreed to kill Albert Snyder because Mrs. Snyder "hounded me and got me in a whirl with her love making," he asserted in his confession read in court today.

The confession related how Gray met Mrs. Snyder and stated that she told him of half a dozen attempts she made on her husband's life.

He told her he thought she was "terrible," the confession continued, "but she played me pretty hard," and finally he agreed to help her.

He got the wire, chloroform and such weight as her orders, he said, but never really thought he would go through with the scheme until he found himself actually striking the sleeping husband.

"Was In a Daze"
Gray said in the confession that he was in a daze throughout and his description of himself was that of a man in a hypnotic trance, unable to withstand the commands of the hypnotist.

He asserted that Mrs. Snyder directed him in his every action, and when the husband seized him after the first blow she took the snuff weight and beat the already stunned man unconscious.

Appeals Court Gets
Briefs For Walkers

AUSTIN, April 27.—(AP)—Briefs for the state in habeas corpus appeals of Hugh and Walter Walker, under murder indictment in Hutchinson county in connection with the slaying of Coke Buchanan, former officer, in March, today were submitted in the court of criminal appeals.

Each man seeks reduction of bond. Walker's bond was set at \$25,000 by district court in his first habeas corpus appeal for release, and Hugh Walker's at \$15,000. The state today contended against reduction.

Appeal of Ed Bailey, under indictment in the same case, for reduction of his \$20,000 bond was denied by the court.

Believing that trial court erred in denying application for change of venue, the appeals court reversed and remanded the life sentence of A. F. Rhodes in Stonewall county, convicted of murder in connection with the slaying of George Smith about September 5, 1926.

Prejudice is Upheld
A "prejudiced" feeling was found to exist in Stonewall county against Rhodes, an officer at the time of the killing, and the trial court should have allowed Rhodes' plea for change of venue, the higher court held.

J. C. Hill of Crosby county, indicted of criminal assault, was granted bond of \$5,000, action of trial court being reversed.

Dorothy Mackaye Drank Gin
In Lover's Apartment While
Husband Died, Claim

LOS ANGELES, April 27.—Gin fizz said to have been imbibed by Dorothy Mackaye, stage actress in the apartment of Paul Kelly, while her husband, Ray Raymond, musical comedy star, was dying in a hospital, became an element for the prosecution today as the district attorney's office prepared its murder case against Kelly.

The prosecution announced that evidence of the drinking party would be presented at the murder trial, Kelly was indicted following his admission that he engaged in a fist fight with Raymond in a quarrel over the actor's prepared to murder case against Kelly.

Raymond was buried yesterday while the chorus of the musical comedy, "Castles in the Air," his last starring vehicle, sang "Dear Old Pal Of Mine." Miss Mackaye, wearing a widow's veil, added a dramatic touch to the funeral when she wept as she knelt beside the casket and placed a baby shoe in the dead actor's hand. The tiny foot-print was one of the first worn by Raymond's four year old daughter.

Crosbyton Farmer
Is Granted Bond

J. C. Hill, Crosby county farmer, who was indicted by a special session of the grand jury in Crosbyton at the February term on a charge of criminal assault, and who later in a preliminary hearing before Judge Homer L. Pharr was denied bond, was granted bond in the sum of \$5,000 by the court of criminal appeals at Austin today, according to Associated Press dispatches to the Daily Journal. The trial court was reversed in its refusal to allow bond to the accused man.

Hill was indicted on a double charge of incest and criminal assault on the person of his 15 year old daughter, has been in jail at Crosbyton since his arrest. The trial court in its decision, held that Hill would be allowed bond on the incest charge, but denied him bail on the criminal assault charge. The accused man lives about three or four miles northeast of Ralls.

Trainmen And Rail
Operators Wrangle

CHICAGO, April 27.—(AP)—Protests against the admission of freight and passenger rates as evidence in the adjustment of wages, were voiced today at the opening of the arbitration hearing by representatives of the trainmen and conductors of Western roads.

Sixty thousand employees of roads west of the Mississippi river are seeking an approximate increase of \$1 a day. After L. E. Sheppard, president of the Order of Railway Conductors, had outlined the reasons for the trainmen and conductors' demands, the company executives explained the company's position. They said the company ought not to agree to an increase because of loss of revenue, due to declining passenger traffic and lowered freight rates.

EQUIPMENT FOR
LAYING TRACKS
READY FOR USECHILDRESS TO QUITAQUE
TRAINS WILL RUN BY
FOURTH OF JULY

(By Associated Press)
CHILDRESS, Texas, April 27.—Work of laying track on the South Plains line of the Fort Worth and Denver railroad is expected to start May 15, at Estelita Junction. The machinery used for laying the steel has arrived here and 100 rail miles of steel is in storage. It is expected the road will be laid into Quitaque, Briscoe county, July 4 and that trains will be in operation between here and Quitaque shortly afterward.

Reballast Part of Line
Announcement is made here that Denver road officials have ordered the third division between Childress and Amarillo rehabilitated with eight inches of gravel from the Magnolia pits. Thirteen miles of steel rails have been ordered for the Wichita Valley and new double track steel bridge purchased for the Wichita river at Wichita Falls.

On the fourth division between Amarillo and Texline all extreme grades will be cut down immediately and thousands of carloads of ballast has been ordered shipped to Childress to finish the new terminal for the South Plains branch from here to Lubbock and Plainview. Millions of dollars is to be spent on the road bed and new steel to make the line of the highest standard, officials stated.

Committees at Work Here

Two committees from the Lubbock chamber of commerce are now busily at work in an effort to sign up contracts for right-of-way for the new line of the Denver into this city. One of the committees is working on property in the city limits, and the other in the rural sections. These committees report good progress on certain portions of the needed land, and hope to have all the necessary right-of-way by the time the line is constructed into this vicinity.

Committees from the chamber of commerce also are at work seeking to collect the delinquent subscriptions of local people to the fund for purchase of the right-of-way, but collections are reported to be coming in very slowly.

Slaton Makes Appeal

O. L. Slaton, chairman of the committee in general charge of the work, issued an appeal for immediate payment by subscribers of their notes to the end that right-of-way might be delivered. He explained that the only way the right-of-way can be delivered is through payment of these notes for the purchase. Nothing definite is known here as to what time construction work will reach this county, but it was said that work will not start in the county until all right-of-way is delivered in deed form to the railroad company.

For Theft Of Milk

One Lubbock youth paid a fine of \$23.70 in corporation court here Wednesday morning on a charge of theft following his arrest last night at the home of Chas. F. O'Neill, on Broadway in connection with theft of milk from the home. He was accused by members of the family, and police officers were called to the scene.

Much complaint has come into police headquarters here in similar cases and a few boys have been arrested on similar occasions. Officers today asked co-operation of the citizenship at large in the city in curbing the practice.

BASEBALL RISES TO PAY TRIBUTE TO TYRUS RAYMOND COBB

GEORGIA PEACH BEATS RED SOX SINGLE HANDED

CARDINALS DRIVEN FROM TOP; LOWLY BROOKLYN LOSES ANOTHER

(By The Associated Press)
They are cheering Tyrus Cobb today for a feat as remarkable as he ever achieved in 22 years of major league baseball.

At 41 when it seemed he must tire under the weight of years, he called for his youthful fire and speed to win a game almost single handed yesterday. He scooped in a fly at full stride for an unassisted double play. He cracked out three hits. He scored twice, sliding home. He was all over the field as the Athletics forged into the first division by beating the Red Sox 9 to 8.

He Went The Route
With his team trailing 7 to 1, the Georgia Peach opened up with the kind of baseball he played in the world series of 1908 and led a headlong attack, while Connie Mack who paid \$45,000 this year for Cobb sat on the bench and sent in reinforcements. Twenty players all told took the field for Philadelphia, but Cobb served nine full innings and finished fresh.

When Cobb's team rose a peg in the league the Detroit club with which he played all his 2,804 games before this season settled into the second division by losing to the White Sox, 9 to 3. New York and Washington, who head the league in that order, did not play, and the St. Louis Browns, who are third, dropped a game to the Indians, so the advance of the Athletics was a long step toward the top.

Cards Drop Down
After one brief day at the head of the National league the St. Louis Cardinals lost their first game in seven starts to the Pirates who went into a tie for first with New York. Respected Lee Meadows downed the world champions for his fourth straight victory, 9 to 2, while the slow-hauler Sherrod was battered off the Cardinals mound in the third.

Bill Terry's homer, double and sacrifice helped the Giants to their 7 to 2 victory over the lowly Robins who could not connect with slams of Fred Fitzsimmons.

Like the Athletics, the Reds turned defeat into victory as they put on their clubbing clothes in the sixth and hammered out six runs for an 8 to 5 triumph. The heavy hitting Webb knocked a home run for the Cubs in the ninth as a pinch hitter, but no one was on and it was not enough to win.

Billy Evans Says:
Injuries handicap

In doping the pennant chances of a ball club it is impossible to accurately figure injuries. There is no bigger item.

Major league clubs have been known to go through an entire season without having any of their players handicapped through accidents on the field. The Boston Red Sox of 1912, for example.

On the other hand, clubs that were doped to cut a wide swath in the championship have been almost put out of the running before the opening of the season.

When a series of accidents overtakes a major league ball club, the reserve strength gets a real chance to prove its value. It has long been a baseball axiom that a club is no stronger than its substitutes. It's a pretty well established truth.

The Washington club of the American League to date has been hit hardest by accidents.

Many Tough Breaks
The very day that I arrived at Tampa, things began to go badly for the Nationals. Ever since, it has been a succession of tough breaks.

As I stood on the sidelines, discussing the club with Clark Griffith and Manager Stanley Harris, both expressed great satisfaction with the lineup, frankly admitting that pitching was the only real worry.

Walter Johnson was pitching to the hitters. He looked great, had remarkable speed for so early in the spring.

"If Barney (that's what the players call Walter Johnson) has a big year, it will mean everything to the club's chances," remarked Manager Harris. "They say of New York that the way Ruth goes, so goes the club. That holds good for Washington relative to Johnson. It means a lot to have him hitting on high."

"When Johnson is going good, the whole club seems inspired. Incidentally, he is a threat to the opposition constantly fours when he is winning consistently."

Desperate Situation Reported By La.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 27. (AP)—While Louisiana authorities were preparing for the unprecedented expedition of deliberately cutting the dikes and flooding almost all of two par-

ishes to save New Orleans from the mighty flood tide sweeping down the Mississippi, situations little short of desperate were reported today in southern Arkansas and the Mississippi delta section.

Nearly two score of towns within a radius of less than 100 miles in the two states were under water with the plight of thousands of refugees described in official reports to Red Cross headquarters here as serious in the extreme.

Calls For Supplies Made
With the racing waters battering at their homes or the levees and knolls upon which they had sought refuge, those in the devastated districts were sending out piteous calls for boats, clothing, food and other supplies. Directors of Red Cross relief moved as speedily as possible to render aid.

Almost hourly new groups of refugees are being found by relief workers as they move by steamer, motor boat or plane over the desolate regions. One such group was found last night on the Mississippi north of Helena. They

had been without adequate food for days and had little shelter on the levee.

An intertidal woman, Nell Williams, a Red Cross worker from St. Louis, was the first to carry succor to them, braving the facing flood crest in a tiny motor boat alone at night.

While no new reports of breaks in the levees on either the Mississippi or the Arkansas rivers were reported overnight, the flood waters already loomed by yawning crevasses were rushing over lowlands and through valleys to lay waste new areas and drive more thousands from their homes.

The flood roaring through the Stope landing break on the Mississippi above Greenville was slowly forcing the waters in the delta region eastward and today Belzoni, Miss., sixty miles south-east of Greenville and almost eighty miles from the Stope landing crevasse was being inundated.

COPS FROWN ON ALLEY PARKING

Leaving Cars On Streets All Night Must Also Be Put To Stop In Lubbock

Considerable trouble is now being experienced by police officers here with those who insist in parking their cars in alleys of the city and efforts are now under way to halt this practice, with the probability that one or more individuals will be called upon to pay the full penalty provided in violation of the ordinance against such practice. It was said at police headquarters Wednesday.

The practice is considered exceptionally dangerous, both to life and property, and adds a hazard to the possibility of cars during the night so that the street sweeper might go about his work unhampered. Most of this trouble is around hotels, where a few traveling men seem to insist that the parking of their cars is of much more importance than cleanly swept streets every night, officers said.

It was explained that places are provided at most hotels for car parking in addition to many storage shops in the city, and that a few traveling men do not realize the extent of trouble caused by all-night parking on the street. Police officers, it was said, are not trying to be hard on anyone, but insist that authorities of the "back town," as one or two have referred to this place, are due enough consideration from the traveling public to have an opportunity to clean up the streets nightly to improve the general appearance of the city.

JURY IS GIVEN DILLON'S CASE

Spirited Speeches Are Given Out By Both Defense And Prosecution In Trial

The J. W. Dillon pro-law case, on trial in 12nd Criminal District court here before Judge Homer L. Pharr, was given to the jury early this afternoon, and an early verdict was anticipated. Mr. Dillon is charged with having had in his possession for the purpose of sale as a beverage a quantity of extract of ginger on November 12, 1926 while he was owner and manager of a drug store and confectionery.

Testimony in the case was finished late Tuesday afternoon, and arguments, scheduled to have been started Wednesday morning, were delayed by a discussion of several technical legal questions injected into the proceedings early Wednesday. Arguments of counsel started about 11 o'clock Wednesday.

Bradley Makes Appeal
Durwood H. Bradley, district attorney, in opening arguments for the state, explained that under the court's charge, the jury must believe that the beverage was held for the purpose of sale as a beverage, and enlarged on testimony in an effort to show that such was done. He said two cases and nine bottles of the liquid were found in the search by officers.

The mixture is potable, he said, for a witness of the state had demonstrated this on the stand, in addition to testifying that he not only bought more than one bottle at a time, but returned as many as four times the same day to make purchases. He said testimony showed that boys also had bought the liquid and also had returned the same day for more. Concluding, Mr. Bradley said the only issue involved is whether or not the liquid was sold as a beverage.

Schenck Claims Privilege
W. F. Schenck, defense counsel, in his arguments, said that a Lubbock business man who was privileged under the law to sell the extract of ginger for medicinal purposes is on trial for his liberty, and rapped the testimony of Yates, who had testified and demonstrated that the mixture was potable. He said that Yates testified on cross-examination that he had been instructed by doctors to use the extract in preference to "corn liquor," and that each time he made a purchase he told the defendant or clerk that he wanted it for medicinal purposes.

He rapped the attitude of prosecution counsel on the difference between extract of ginger and fluid extract of ginger, saying that extract of ginger might be a semi-solid and not in any manner a potable mixture.

J. E. Vickers, also of the defense, closed defense arguments by a review of the testimony and its application to the court's charge, and asked for an acquittal verdict.

Mr. Bradley, in his closing arguments for the state, sought to impress upon the jury that the sales had been made for beverage purposes as charged in the indictment, and asked for the maximum penalty of five years. Conviction on the charge carries a penalty of from one to five years.

Candy Is Good for You Unless You Eat Too Much of It

BY DR. MORRIS FISHBEN

Editor, Journal of the American Medical Association and of Hygiene, the Health Magazine

AN official statement from the National Confectioners' Association indicates that 52 per cent of the material used in candy is sugar; the other 48 per cent contains gelatin, corn-starch, corn syrup, molasses, nuts, fruits, eggs, butter, milk, chocolate and similar substances.

The Association estimates that the daily per capita consumption of candy in this country is about one good bite a day.

In 1923 the people of the United States spent nearly \$290,000,000 for candy, an average of more than \$1,000,000 a day. Assuming an average price of 40 cents a pound, the amount used would be nearly one billion pounds of candy in a year.

The only difficulty with the use of candy is the fact that it may replace other articles in the diet. When it does so, it modifies nutrition seriously. It should be eaten at meals in addition to more essential foods but not in place of them. Taken after a meal as dessert, it produces a sensation of satisfaction.

The understanding that candy is a delicacy makes it a usual gift. Children are therefore likely to have more candy than is good for them, since the careless purchaser of presents for the child is likely to select candy as the obvious gift.

The investigators of the action of muscles discovered that the body burns sugar rapidly when one is engaged in any physical activity. Therefore, marathon runners and long distance swimmers have been encouraged to hold sugar candies in the mouth while engaged in such efforts. Candy must be considered as a highly concentrated food that gives energy without bulk.

Used with due regard for its food value and its limitations, it may not only be harmless but actually desirable. When it is taken irregularly and without any consideration as to its actual place in the diet, it may interfere with the appetite, cause a dislike for much needed foods, and be associated with indigestion, irritability, bad teeth and under-nutrition.

It must be recognized, however, that candy does not form all of the sugar that is taken in by the body, and that in no more so be associated with bad teeth than other foods which have similar effect on the condition of the mouth.
