AMERICAN GIRL FLYING IN SUNSHINE

Tornado In Arkansas; 4 Lives Lost

BLYTHEVILLE, Ark., Oct. 12.—Four persons were killed and a score injured in a tornado which whipped through the village of Dell, near here, last night.
The dead are A. M. Harben; his sister-in-law, Mrs. F. T. Harben; Justice of the Peace J. P. Winn, and Mrs. Winn.
Fifteen of the injured, 12 of them white, were brought to a hospital here today.
Dell has a population of about 200.
About 20 buildings were wrecked.

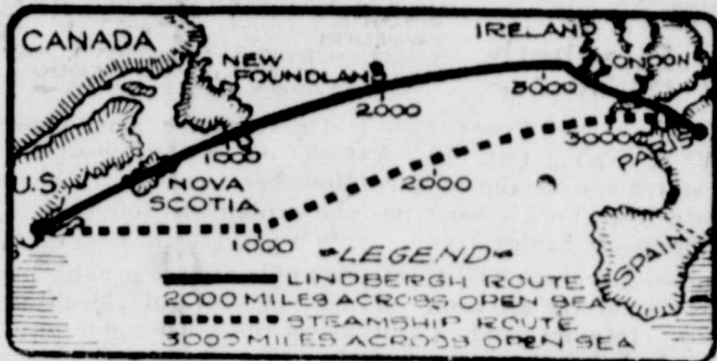
FAIR RECEIPTS ABOUT \$10,000

While no official check-up has been made, it appears that the Runnels County Fair Association will show a net profit of from \$2,000 to \$2,500 on this year's exhibition. The receipts will slightly exceed \$10,000, with more than half coming from the twenty-five cent admissions taken in at the front gate. The estimated expense of holding the 1927 fair is \$7,500, however, only a few of the premium lists have been turned in to the secretary to this date and the total may exceed the estimated amount.
The rain that fell Saturday was sufficient on which to collect insurance for that day.
Thursday was the big day at the fair and in the evening more than 4,000 people paid admission to the front gate alone. With the passes and season tickets it is estimated that the Thursday night crowd exceeded 6,500. The Style Show was a big drawing card that night but only about 2,300 were able to get in seeing distance of this performance.
A letter was received Tuesday from the Board of City Development of San Angelo thanking the citizens of Ballinger and the Runnels County Fair Association in particular for the way in which their special train and boosters were received here on San Angelo Day.

RUNNELS CITIZENS BACK W. T. C. OF C. IN WATER QUESTION

STAMFORD, Oct. 11.—Despite reports that five hundred farmers at Ballinger, and other groups in other West Texas cities had signed letters protesting the West Texas Chamber of Commerce stand for fair division of storm waters in Texas, no such letters have been received by the general offices of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, nor by either President R. W. Haynie or Manager Homer D. Wade of the organization, it is stated at headquarters here.
On the contrary the organization has received scores of letters endorsing the stand of the organization, and has received notice of official endorsements by numerous affiliated chambers of commerce including a communication from the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce disclaiming any knowledge of the alleged protesting letter supposed to have originated there, officials here say.
Homer D. Wade, manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, states that reports which have appeared in some newspapers to the effect that several towns have withdrawn membership in the regional body, and that others have threatened to do so were entirely without foundation.

REBEL GENERALS FLEEING TO COAST

MEXICO, D. F., Oct. 12.—Pursued through the wild mountain country to the west of Vera Cruz the rebel generals, Gomez and Almada today are believed to be attempting to reach the coast where passage in fishing boats or other small craft would put them beyond reach of the government troops, who are hot on their trail.
A dozen small groups of rebels scattered in every direction were declared by the government to be all that were left of the band which is stated never to have exceeded one thousand men.

HASSEL DENIED NEW HEARING

AUSTIN, Oct. 12.—A motion by George Hassel, of Farwell, who signed a purported confession that he killed thirteen persons, for a rehearing by the Court of Criminal Appeals in the affirmation of his death sentence, was denied today by the court.

GAS FLAME SPLITS STEEL FOOT THICK

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Oct. 12.—The cleanest and best cutting flame in the industrial world has been developed from gas, Alexander B. Greenleaf of the Peoples Gas Light and Coke Company of Chicago told the American Gas Association today.
Staging a demonstration of such a flame cutting a steel billet a foot thick, Greenleaf declared that the newly developed apparatus makes possible a flame which "literally melts its way through a huge steel structure and splits it into two parts much as a blade would do." The apparatus enables easier cutting of metal and makes a sharper cut, he said.

Resort City Suffers Heavy Fire Damage

OCEAN CITY, Oct. 12.—Swept by fire, the heart of this south New Jersey resort was a mass of ruins today.
Driven by a brisk ocean breeze, the blaze, which started last night under the Arcade building, wiped out approximately fifty buildings, including hotels, cottages, shops and theatres before it was brought under control four hours later. Many other buildings were damaged.
Mayor Joseph Champion estimated the damage close to \$4,000,000.

Traveling Health Units Aid Infants In Rural Districts



Dr. Elizabeth M. Gardiner

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 12.—A woman watches over the welfare of upstate New York's most important crop—its babies.

She is Dr. Elizabeth M. Gardiner, director of the Division of Maternity, Infancy and Child Hygiene. It is her duty to see that thousands of mothers and children, who might otherwise go without proper care, have the benefit of the right kind of medical advice at the right time.



DR. GARDINER WATCHES OVER THE WELFARE OF UP STATE, NEW YORK'S 100,000 BABIES



FOR THREE YEARS HEREAS BISTANTS TRAVELING THROUGH RURAL DISTRICTS, HAVE ADMINISTERED AID TO 75,000 MATERNES AND INFANTS

Dr. Gardiner has placed her task on a business-like bases. How her work is accomplished she explains as follows:

"When a state tries to improve its apple crop it usually begins in one of several localities, and keeps the other apple growers of the state informed about the progress made.

"This is exactly the way New York has gone about improving the crop of babies. At the present time up-state New York has more

than 100,000 babies a year, and in New York city the number is even greater."

In three years Dr. Gardiner and her assistants have reached about 75,000 women. Aid is administered through demonstration units that travel in the rural districts, and through community health centers headed by public health nurses. These are financed by local, state and federal funds.

"Mothers are given attention and advice during the prenatal period and also at the time of birth and in the nursing period," explains Dr. Gardiner. "Children are examined during infancy and early childhood and their mothers are instructed in accordance with the findings. Nurses are supplied to supervise the 'follow up' work, placing the children under the care of the family doctor and seeing that necessary treatments are instituted and health defects corrected."

Each case is referred back to the attending physician for proper treatment.

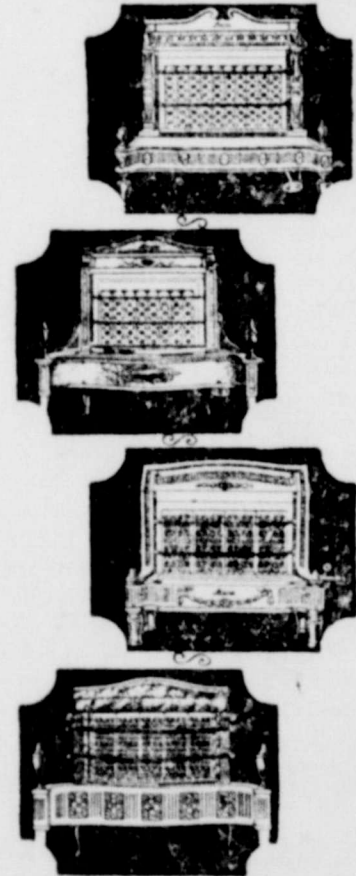

Cooking Chats with 6 Famous Cooks

"CORNEB BEEF AND—"

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series of interesting cooking articles by 6 famous cooks appearing exclusively in this paper.)
If the way to a man's heart is through his stomach, surely one of the easiest ways is to serve him corned beef and cabbage. That holds true for pretty nearly every man, except, of course, the dyspeptic, who is always hard to suit.



MISS LUCY G. ALLEN
Corned beef and cabbage is nowhere more deliciously cooked than in New England, where, with a few additional vegetables, it makes its appearance as the "boiled dinner."

What Flavor!
"And the boiled dinner enthusiast will tell you how excellent the blended flavors are," says Miss Lucy G. Allen, head of the Boston School of Cookery. "The delight in the boiled dinner of corned beef with cabbage, beets, turnips, potatoes, and carrots or parsnips. All but the beets I cook in the same kettle."

Allow ample time for cooking the corned beef. Miss Allen cautions. It should be started at least two or three hours before the vegetables are added. If, by chance, it becomes tender before the vegetables, it can be removed from the fire and reheated before serving.

How to Buy
Very often you can get a more tender piece of meat if you buy a fresh beef brisket. Ask the butcher to rub in coarse salt and keep it a day or two. Sometimes the fibers of meat kept too long in brine get hardened.
Use a very large kettle. Put in the meat, cover with boiling water. (If the corned beef has been soaking long in brine, start cooking it in cold water.)
Let the meat boil for five minutes, then reduce the heat and let it cook slowly for two or three hours.

Add the Vegetables
Add cabbage which has been washed and cut into quarters. Then add peeled turnips, whole if small, diced if large, and the carrots or parsnips cut into two-inch lengths. Scrub beets thoroughly, and put in separate kettle, covered with boiling water.
Half an hour before serving add peeled potatoes to the large kettle. The success of the dinner depends upon having each article perfectly done, but not overdone.

To Serve
In New England this dinner is usually served by placing the meat in the center of a large platter, and grouping all the vegetables except the cabbage around the meat. The cabbage is so bulky that it is best to serve it in a separate dish.
Truly this is a most delicious meal. A fitting dessert is a custard or a rice pudding, as these are not too hearty to serve with this substantial meal.

Many women have found it a great advantage to use their oil stoves. And the long-chimney burner oil stoves cook food so thoroughly, too.

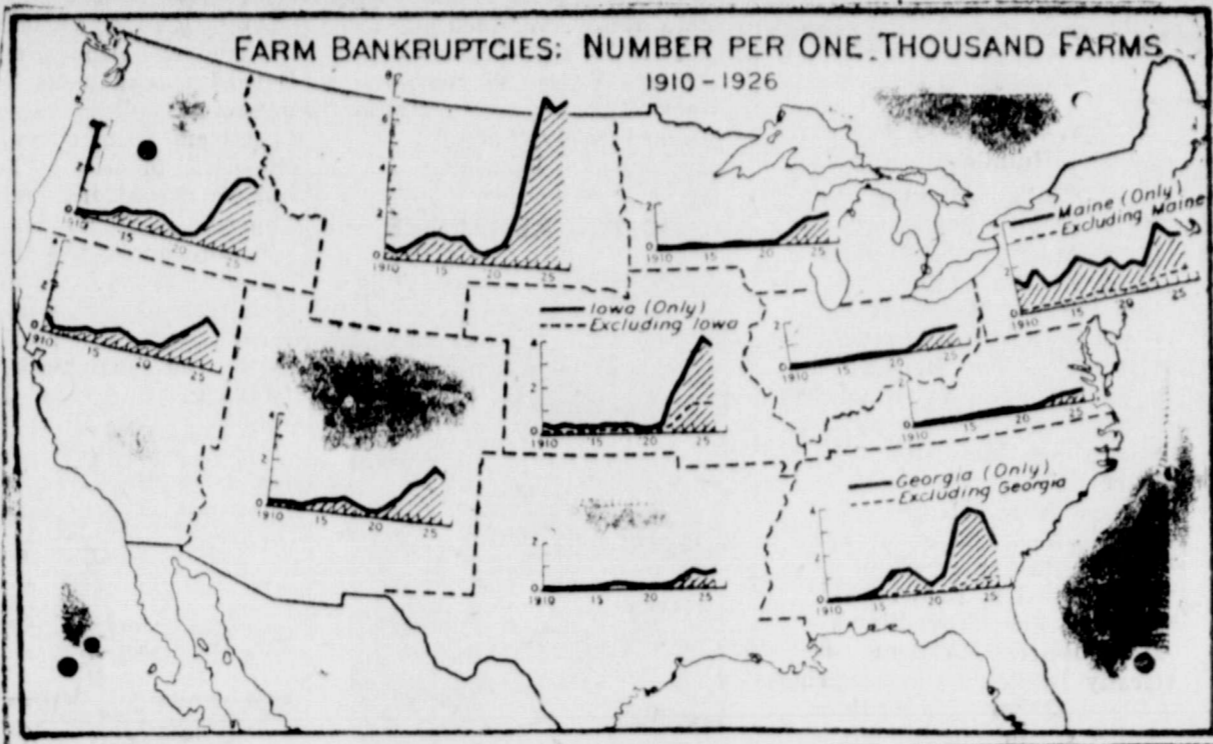
Golden Gate Custard
This is a recipe contributed by Mrs. Belle Debrai, home economics counselor San Francisco.
1 cup sifted bread crumbs
1 cup milk
1 cup orange rind
3 eggs separated
1/2 cup sugar
Add the grated rind of one orange to the juice. Use soft bread crumbs. Sift through coarse strainer. Add milk and orange juice. Beat eggs separately. Add sugar to yolks and then add to custard. Mix well. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Pour in a pudding dish. Set dish in pan of hot water, and bake until firm in center. This takes about 30 minutes, in a moderate oven (350 degrees).

Rice Pudding
From Mrs. Kate B. Vaughn, director of the household economics department of the Los Angeles Evening Express, comes the recipe for rice pudding and hard sauce.
1/2 cup rice
6 cups water
2 cups milk
1/4 cup sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon gelatine
1/4 cup cold water
Add rice slowly to boiling water. Boil until tender, 20 minutes, then drain. Heat milk in double boiler. Add egg yolk, sugar and salt, and cook until thick. Add rice, and the last minute before removing from stove, add the gelatine softened in the cold water. Stir in thoroughly. Fold in stiffly beaten egg white, and set in a large pan of ice water to cool.
Make the hard sauce by creaming and stirring together 3 tablespoons of butter, 1 egg white, 2 tablespoons of lemon juice, 2 1/2 cups of powdered sugar and any desired flavoring.

Farmers to Profit By Smaller Crop Surplus

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—Indication that crop surpluses will be less this year than in 1926 has led to the belief that farm finances may be somewhat strengthened.

Eugene Meyer, federal farm board commissioner, estimates a million-dollar increase in agriculture's income.

V. N. Valgren, economist in the federal bureau of agricultural finance, believes "farm returns may be somewhat greater." The real question, Valgren says, is whether the farmer will be enabled by better market prices to liquidate some of his mortgage indebtedness.

Government charts show that four out of every 1,000 farmers in Iowa were declared bankrupt last year. In the Dakotas, Wyoming, and Montana, the ratio was seven to every thousand, the highest for any section of the country.

It is significant that these charts represent only those farmers who took advantage of the bankruptcy laws. There is reason to believe, Valgren declares, that a majority of farmers forced to give up their business settled out of court, quietly surrendering their property to creditors.

Using the same theory of smaller surplus production, Valgren believes the new volume of farm loans will be lighter. It is estimated that loans secured by farm mortgages totalled between a eight and nine billion dollars last year. In addition, short time

loans from banks and mercantile credit is placed at from four to five billion dollars.

Thetwelve federal and banks, operating since 1916, are figured to have carried but a fifth of the 1926 farm mortgages.

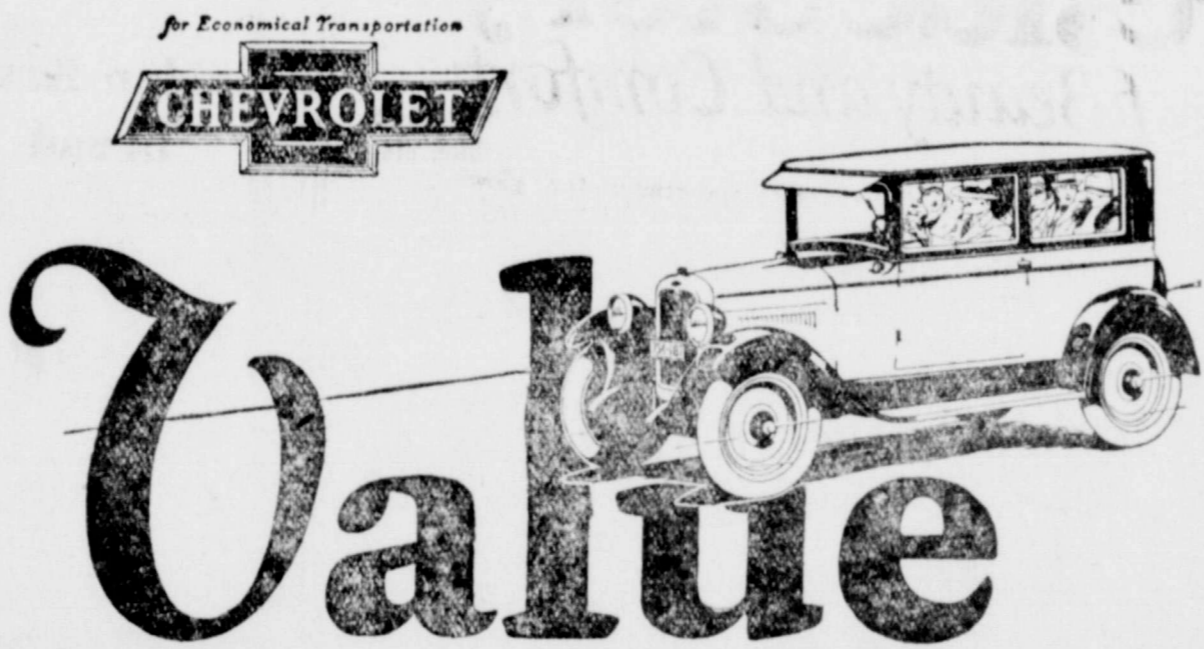

**GOVERNOR TO OPEN
1927 COTTON PALACE**

Moody Will Press Button Oct. 22
Two Parades Opening Day.

Waco, Texas—Governor Dan Moody will officially open the Texas Cotton Palace Exposition, at Waco, on the night of October 22.

It is probable that several members of the governor's official family will accompany him to Waco, the letter from the chief executive stated, in accepting the invitation tendered him by directors of the Cotton Palace. It is expected that the governor and those who will accompany him will arrive early enough to participate in the various events incident to the opening ceremonies, including the cotton parade during the morning and the formal opening parade at night.

Johnson et al No. 1 Simms, ten miles south of the city, is under-reaming after getting a hole of water at 2,710, it was reported Wednesday afternoon. Drillers expect to underream for about 400 feet.

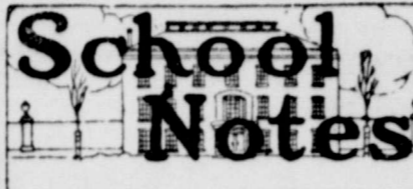
Advance Reports Say "All Aboard" is Fun Riot

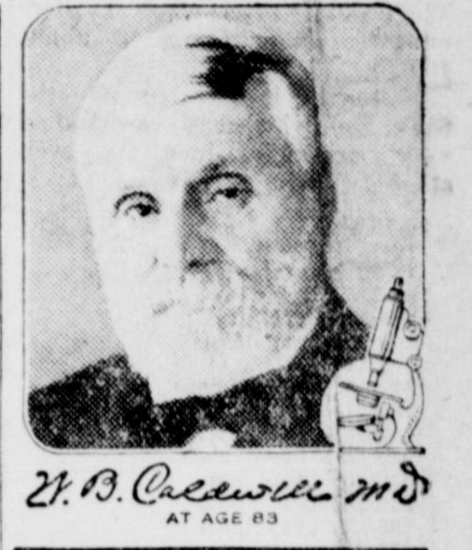

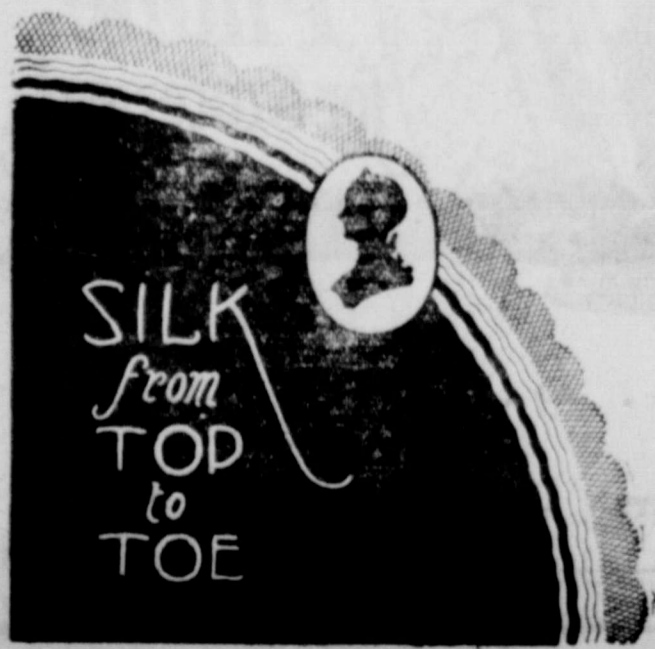
