HARDING VISITS UNKNOWN GRAVE

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—President Harding today went to Arlington Cemetery where he laid a wreath of flowers on the tomb of the unknown soldier as a part of the president's program in commemorating Armistice Day. The president was accompanied to the cemetery by Secretary of War Weeks, and Secretary of Navy Denby.

Services were held in eight American cemeteries in France, Belgium and England, according to cablegrams received here.

An Armistice Day pilgrimage to the home here of Woodrow Wilson, on S. Street, was arranged for today under the direction of a committee of women, and the program for the day includes the paying of tribute to the president who also gave his life for America, retiring from public life wrecked in health.

EARTH SHOCKS SHAKE CHILE

SANTIAGO, Chile, Nov. 11.—Severe earth shocks were felt in the various parts of Chile last night and early today. There was much damage but no loss of life has been reported.

A tidal wave came in at Antofagasta, according to reports, smashing vessels and sweeping over homes. Fire broke out at Coquimbo and is raging, following the shock, the report said.

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 11.—Advices received by all American cable companies here today say that it is feared that the earthquake in Chile caused a catastrophe at Antofagasta.

GETS 20 YEARS IN MURDER CASE

GALVESTON, Nov. 11.—Robert J. Jones, of Alvin, Texas, was sentenced today in connection with the death of Miss Hazel Cheverre, by a jury which heard the evidence in the trial. Miss Cheverre died by poisoning on Sept. 14, 1921, and Jones was named in a dying statement made by the girl, and other evidence connected him with the crime. Jones was married at the time the girl died.

RUSSIAN HOLIDAYS PROVIDE EXCUSE FOR DRINKING

(By Associated Press)
RIGA, Nov. 11.—M. Semashko, the Soviet Commissar of Health, has issued a plea for moderation of drinking in Russia, particularly among the peasant class, according to information reaching Riga.

"In Russia the real subject for discussion should be drunkenness," he says, "not a moderate consumption of spirits, as is known in Europe, but the sporadic drinking of very great quantities of strong liquor."

The commissar places the blame for present conditions partly on religious customs, which provide the people with a great number of festivals as an excuse for drinking, and partly on the bourgeoisie, who drive the poor man to drunkenness, he says. He does not advocate total abstinence, but urges the state to adopt moderation measures.

Other information on this same subject sets forth that the Omsk government has decided to reintroduce, as a state monopoly, the sale of vodka containing 38 per cent alcohol. The fight against illicit distilling in Omsk does not appear to have been successful, as the people are in sympathy with the "moonshiners."

Palusche is said to be the oldest inhabitant of Silesia.

Thousands Throng City For Trades Day Event

The people who flocked to Ballinger Saturday for the Ford-Dodge trades day event smashed the records for Saturday crowds here. The people came early and lingered late. By ten o'clock there was a demand for parking space in the business district, autos being lined up for a distance on all streets. The crowds increased until the afternoon hour.

The Ford-Dodge parade was staged on time and furnished mirth and merriment for the large crowd. Many held back and did not enter their ears in the parade, but competition was keen in most of the events in which prizes were offered.

The fire truck lead led the parade, and while new Dodges decorated dodges, new Fords decorated Fords were conspicuous in the parade, the redolent and burlesque predominating, and the comies created fun as they passed through Hutchings avenue, and returned.

Many of the cars in the parade were out of town, the long distant winner registering from Houston, 410 miles away with one from New Mexico 305 miles distance from Ballinger.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 11.—American Minister Schurman has asked the Chinese government to procure the release of two American missionaries reported held by Chinese bandits in Hon Johnan province. The names of the missionaries are given as Forsberg and London, according to dispatches received today by the state department.

ONE INJURED IN EXPLOSION

HILLSBORO, Nov. 11.—Wylie Verner, age eighteen, was seriously injured early today when an improvised cannon, made from iron pipe exploded. The explosion threw particles of iron hundreds of feet. The youth was standing one hundred feet away when he was struck in the right side by a piece of the flying iron. It is believed that he will recover.

NEW MURDER IN SNEED FAMILY

FORT WORTH, Nov. 11.—Wood Barton, son-in-law, of John Beal Sneed, cattleman and chief in the famous Sneed-Boyer tragedies ten years ago, was mortally wounded late yesterday at Paducah, Texas. Barton died in a few hours after being shot. C. B. Berry, surrendered to the sheriff, but he declined to make a statement. Beal Sneed owns a ranch near Paducah, where Barton spent part of his time.

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 11.—Alvin M. Owsley, National Commander of the American Legion, in an address here today, admonished all former soldiers to "go to work and quit fighting the recent war." He declared that he believed the American Legion, "is an organization selected by providence to complete the work begun when the declaration of independence was signed," and he characterized as "the blackest spot in American history the neglect of the disabled veterans."

TURKEY SCRAP IS CRITICAL

LONDON, Nov. 11.—The situation at Constantinople is still very critical, the newspaper reports agree. The allies are determined sit tight, although the Turkish Nationalists want them to get out. The cutting off of communication by the Turks prevented definite news of the situation reaching here.

BIT MAKING
RAPID PROGRESS

The drill is going down in the
Safety First well at a rate of 25
or 30 feet, operating only with a
day shift. The well promises all
that a wild cat could promise, and
those pushing this piece of devel-
opment are optimistic.

The drill is down 3250, reach-
ing that depth early Saturday
morning and is going through blu-
e shale, the same formation which
covers the oil sands in the Brock-
enridge and Ranger fields. The
hole is in perfect condition.

This development is being car-
ried on and financed by sale acre-
age, and the land owners have
been putting in acreage to help
complete the well. It is a proposi-
tion in which men with acreage
can help by subscribing acreage,
and men with money to invest can
help by buying the acreage.

Every effort on the part of those
promoting the proposition will be
made to complete the well to a
depth of 4000 feet, or strike oil.
To abandon the well at this stage
would be to lose the money which
has been put in it without ac-
complishing anything. A full
and complete test is what the peo-
ple want, and we believe that the
land owners and acreage specula-
tors will see to it that the well is
completed.

GIRL DIES HERE

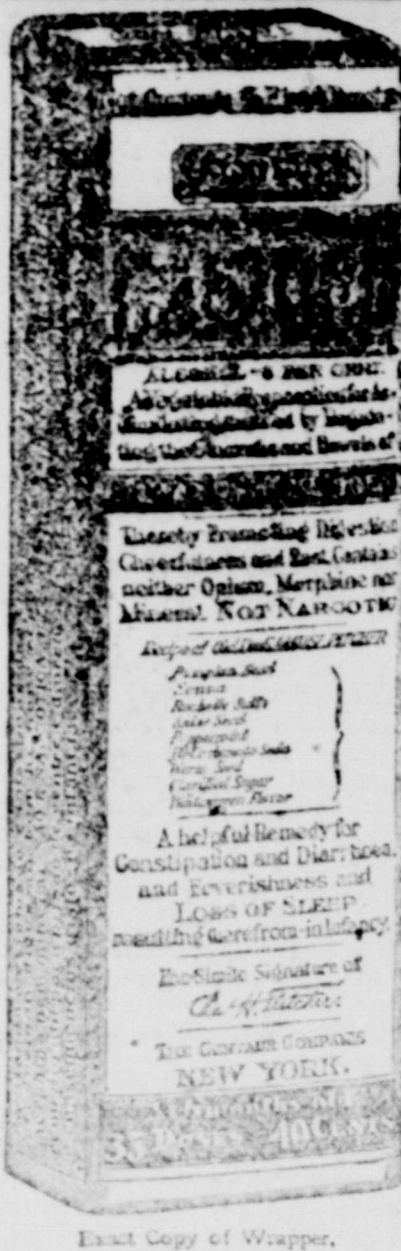
The fourteen year old daughter

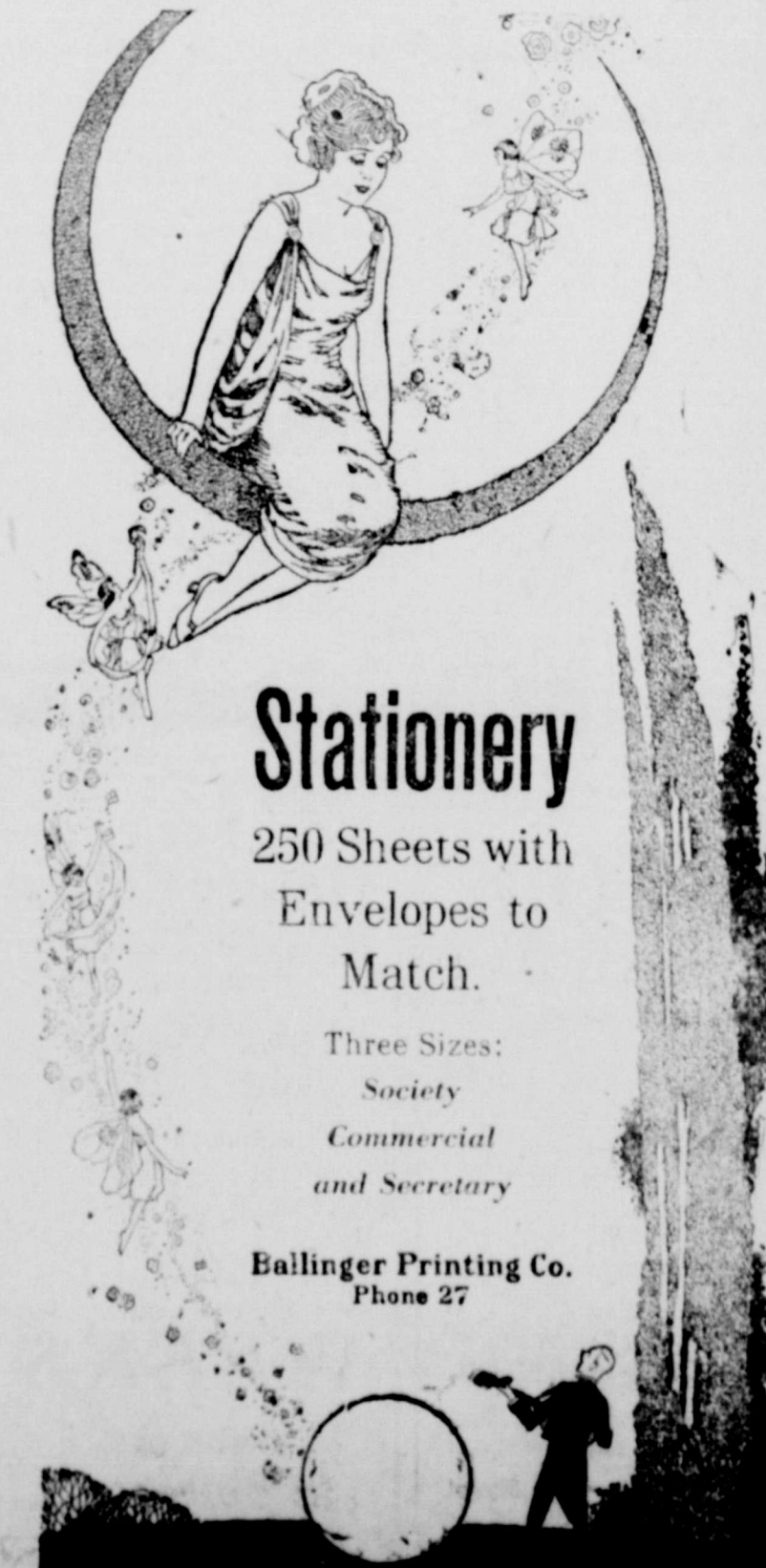

Annual Banquet Paves Way for City Building

Moving forward with a program which will take Ballinger out of the city of the "biggest Little city in Texas," the annual banquet and membership meeting of the Young Men's Business League passed into history Friday night.

The progressive spirit of this city filled the banquet hall at the Central Hotel to overflow, and for nearly four hours the progressive element of Ballinger mixed merriment and mirth with the discussion of commercial problems, civic and social problems, reviewed the problems solved in the past, and laid plans for solving the problems of the future.

A unique program was carried out, covers having been laid for about 250, and every seat in the banquet hall was occupied and extra places had to be provided at the eleventh hour for those who were late in calling for tickets.

The tables were decorated, the yellow autumn color scheme being in effect, with fifteen beautiful young ladies in charge. Orchestra, radio music and "pep" songs were interspersed as the banquet course was served.

Considerable time was taken up in getting acquainted. Each guest

was asked to introduce the one seated to their left, and as the introduction went around the table the guests rising to their feet introduced their "neighbor," who in some instances was husband, wife or sweetheart, and the introduction in many cases was accompanied by remarks which created a ripple of fun, or a roar of laughter.

As signified by the invitations sent out and the program arranged for the occasion the meeting was held for the purpose of pushing Ballinger one notch forward in civic and commercial work, and for the purpose of bringing members of the Young Men's Business League together in a social meeting and to elect directors for the ensuing year.

Secretary Williams and the various committees planned well for the meeting and deserve credit for the successful manner in which it was carried out. Mr. Williams had charge of the preliminary part of the program, while C. S. Guin, president of the Y. M. B. L., acted as toastmaster, or master of ceremonies.

The highway question, irrigation and general work of the local commercial organization, including the development of an oil field here, came in for discussion. Hon. Lee Satterwhite, of Panhandle, was the principal speaker of the evening. Mr. Satterwhite occupies an important place in the legislature of Texas. He discussed the highway crisis in Texas, and told what Texas must do within the next two or three years, or by 1926 to maintain her relationship with the federal road building commission if the state continues to share in federal aid. Mr. Satterwhite is an old friend of C. R. Stephens, and Mr. Stephens introduced the speaker, paying a tribute to his loyalty in serving his state in the legislature and working for the upbuilding of a better highway system in the state.

B. F. Bennett, of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, discussed the irrigation question and predicted that with the completion of the big irrigation dam, Ballinger would rapidly climb into the 25,000 population class of Texas cities. Mr. Bennett declared that the possibilities for making Ballinger a city depended more on the completion of the irrigation project than the development of any other of this county's natural resources.

Harvey Allen, of San Angelo, a director of the Colorado Valley Irrigation Association, and chairman of the Board of City Development of San Angelo, devoted most of his talk also to the question of irrigation, and is an enthusiastic booster for the project. He stated that San Angelo was vitally interested in the proposition, and that he was launching a membership drive in his city to aid in putting over the Colorado project.

In his usual optimistic way, J. McGregor made an address which will spur the local commercial organization on to greater activity. He reviewed some of the good already accomplished, and pleaded for a more loyal support. He declared that every citizen should be a member of the league even though they could pay only one dollar a year dues. For the moral support he said that every progressive citizen should support the organization. Mr. McGregor predicted that the oil industry of the county would yet make the city famous.

Miss Huff, representing the American Red Cross, of St. Louis, delivered an interesting talk, relating something of the program the Red Cross is carrying out during peace times.

Garland Woodward, of Coleman, proved himself a booster for his home town, when the toastmaster introduced him for a short talk. Mr. Woodward briefly referred to the Ballinger program in working for good roads, irrigation, oil, gas and a better water supply, and declaring that Coleman had these, he invited the newcomers to Coleman, where they would find everything that Ballinger wanted.

Following a brief outline of the program the Young Men's Business League hoped to carry out during the ensuing year, the committee, consisting of J. McGregor, Scott Mack and C. A. Dose, appointed to nominate directors for the ensuing year, made their report, and the following directors were elected without opposition.

J. J. Beck, Roy Reeder, Claud Stone, H. C. Gardner, L. Cohen, E. P. Talbott, N. K. Freeman, M. McGregor, S. B. Baby, John A. Weeks, R. L. Harwell, J. M. Pyburn, Henry Jones, C. P. Shepherd and C. S. Guin.

It was moved and carried that the president and secretary of the Shakespeare Club, Civic League and American Legion Auxiliary be made honorary members of the board of directors.

MOSCOW, Nov. 11.—An all-Russian central committee for combating consequences of the famine has been established to assist in relieving the poor and invalids. Michael Kalenin, chairman of the all-Russian central executive committee, who is referred to as the "president of Russia," is at the head of the new organization. The work will be carried on by government funds raised through taxation and by voluntary contributions.

LIFE-SAVING CAMPAIGN IN SOUTHWEST DIVISION
American Red Cross Organized and Trained Many Corps in This Section Last Summer.

More than 34 chapters have been visited during the months of May, June and July by Captain Norbert E. Raacke, first aid and life saving representative of the Southwestern Division. While visiting these various chapters, Capt. Raacke gave first aid demonstrations before Rotary, Lions and Kiwanis Clubs, as well as life saving demonstrations and instructions at Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A. and many outdoor pools and lakes. At the majority of the pools and lakes visited, the Captain has secured particularly that practically every one of life saving precautions are taken. A large lake at Nevada, Mo., is owned by an old Indian, who believes that if a person were drowning, someone near at hand would come to his rescue.

Many letters of commendation have been received from chapters visited by Capt. Raacke. Salina, Kas., was particularly well pleased with his demonstrations at the Country Club outdoor pool. The following is an extract from a letter recently sent in by the life saving committee of that town:

"Capt. Raacke's demonstration at the large outdoor pool at the Country Club was of the highest quality. His silence, only to be broken by his cheering at his own extraordinary feats of swimming and life saving. Capt. Raacke is in the line of effort that will save many lives and still the talk of the town. He not only has been a great help in the Life Saving Department, but has given even greater blessing to the Red Cross in the saving of lives."

There are several well organized life saving corps in the Southwestern Division. Ballinger, Tex., has an excellent women's corps. The annual banquet held in May, life saving badges were awarded to more than forty women, service medals to two and the life saving bar to one.

On July 30th the diver patrol of the St. Louis Chapter gave an exhibition and race at Lincoln Beach, on the Missouri River. This exhibition was witnessed by probably the largest crowd ever gathered at Lincoln Beach. More than 500 onlookers crowded the sand when the first event, the canoe stroke race, was witnessed. Capt. Raacke had charge of the life saving demonstration, showing the various methods of breaking death holds encountered in rescuing a drowning person.

Eight life guards, after his demonstration on the large, struggled viciously with each other in a practical illustration of life saving tactics. The Galveston, (Texas) Life Saving Corps have frequently exhibited their skill in first aid and life saving. Owing to the prompt and efficient first aid administered by three members of the Galveston Life Saving Corps on June 4th, the life of John D. Wheeler, 20 years old, of Houston, Tex., was saved. Mr. Wheeler was overcome while bathing in shallow water and was found floating in an unconscious condition. The three members of the life saving corps succeeded in reviving Mr. Wheeler through the application of the Schaeffer method of resuscitation. He was taken to the hospital in a very weakened condition. As Mr. Wheeler was found in comparatively shallow water, it is believed his mishap was due to a fainting spell.

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SWEDISH TRAINS WILL HAVE ROLLER BEARINGS

(By Associated Press)
STOCKHOLM, Nov. 11.—The use in Sweden of roller bearings for the wheels of railroad cars, passenger and freight, has been inaugurated by the issuance of definite orders to the state railways. What promises to be a boon to railroads and travelers the world over, and the possible development of a manufacturing industry of large proportions, is foreseen.

The system of roller bearings as now perfected is the result of years of experiment and research in Sweden and elsewhere. The solution of the problem has been hastened because of the growing need of finding some way to reduce the expense of railroad operation. A saving of about 15 per cent in coal, together with a reduction of personnel and a conservation of equipment, will become feasible by the installation of roller bearings.

The Swedish company which manufactures these bearings reports that the Pennsylvania Railroad (U. S. A.) has been making experiments for some time with a view to their adoption.

SANCTIONS WHISTLING AS A CERTIFIED ART
(By Associated Press)

BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 11.—Whistling as an "art and process" may soon be added to the curriculum of some public schools in California. The state board of education has granted Miss Blanche Adella Hawkins, a senior at the University of California here, a certificate authorizing her to "conduct the art and process of whistling" in the schools.

Authorities say this is the first time in the history of education that such a certificate has been granted.

"I have always felt," Miss Hawkins said, "that whistling could be made a real musical accomplishment and the best time to begin instruction in whistling, as with every other study, is in childhood."

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
