This week is National Newspaper Week, October 13-19. This is one week in the year when we try to focus attention on the newspaper, especially The Mitchell County News. We would like to remind our readers once again that the local newspaper is the only paper that cares about Loraine. Other papers like to circulate here, yes, to build their subscription list but it doesn't concern them too much if the town does not get along too well. They pay no taxes to the city or the school. They do not fight for the rights of Loraine citizens or help to promote the interests of Loraine and Loraine people.

The local paper has always been in the forefront fighting for the best interest of Loraine and Loraine people and it will continue to do so as long as it remains a going business.

The squeeze on small towns and small businesses, including the newspaper, is becoming greater year by year. Large farms have about cut the rural population in half. Large business in large towns are putting the bite on our citizens for their trade. The local paper offers local merchants an opportunity to fight for the business of our local people. A lot of it is leaving our town that should not be.

We could enumerate many things the local paper has had a big part in getting for Loraine during the years. You are aware of them. We sometimes wonder what kind of town Loraine would be now if it had not had a newspaper all these years. The town was without a paper for a time more than 30 years ago and the leaders in the community then were seeking someone to start a paper again. The slogan for National Newspaper Week this year is "Newspapers Make a Big Difference in People's Lives." During the time our town was without a paper the leaders as well as all citizens must have realized the significance of that slogan.

On November 9 the people of Texas will vote on four constitutional amendments. Every voter should exercise his privilege and vote. To help toward a better understanding of the four amendments, The News will run a column during the time between now and election date. No. 1 on the ballot is the amendment proposing to abolish the poll tax in Texas as a requirement for voting.

Proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

The climax of the homecoming activities will be a football game between the Loraine Bulldogs and the Trent Gorillas. This game will open conference play for the Bulldogs who have had a 4-2 warmup season. Kickoff time is 7:30.

At half time the Homecoming Queen and the Homecoming Sweetheart will be recognized in a colorful ceremony.

DRY WEATHER STEPS UP COTTON HARVEST
Dry, mild weather allowed cotton producers to step up harvesting operations in District 2. According to B. B. Manly, Jr., Officer-in-Charge of the U.S.D.A.'s Cotton Classing Office in Abilene, Texas, receipts from District 2 totaled approximately 29,000 samples last week. The Abilene Office classed a total of 40,100 samples during the week. This brought the total bales classed during current harvesting season to 100,000.

Grades continued about the same as the previous week, with 14 percent of the cotton in the White Grade category, 85 percent was Light Spotted, 1 percent was Spotted, and 5 percent was Light Gray. A further breakdown of the percentages, shows Middling Light Spotted as the predominant grade making up 59 percent of the total.

A slight decline was noted in staple lengths for the preceding week. The predominant staple length was once again 29.32 with 55 percent being classed in this category. Two percent was classed as 13.16; 26 percent, 7.8; 12 percent, 15.16; 1 percent 31.32; 1 percent, 1.4 inch and longer.

The Micronaire readings continued high, with 96 percent reading .35 and higher.

The Market was fairly active with increasing demand for Light Spotted Grades and staple lengths of 15.16 and shorter.

SPUR FIELD DAY SET
Paul T. Marion's 'cow cafeteria' will highlight the Rolling Plains Experiment Station's annual fall field day at Spur, Texas on Friday, October 25, 2000 agents Buddy C. Logsdon announced today. Marion is superintendent of the Spur Substation and personally directs all beef cattle research activities there. His pet project features a feedlot breeding herd that has never been on pasture. Visitors will see these cows and their 4th calf crop at weaning time, Logsdon said.

Other items of special interest to area ranchmen will include reports on brush control research, water conservation practices and cow and calf operations on native pastures.

The Field Day program will get underway with a tour of the station from 9 to 12 a.m., followed by a "dutch treat" chuck wagon lunch.

Afternoon speakers will include E. D. Robinson, station range scientist; W. J. Waldrup, head of A&M's Soil and Crop Science Department; J. K. Riggs, animal husbandry professor; and H. O. Kunkel, associate director, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The day's activities will be concluded with a question and answer session.

Mrs. T. J. Coffee Observes 90th Birthday

Mrs. T. J. Coffee, a resident of Mitchell County for 73 years, observed her 90th birthday with a picnic luncheon in the back yard at her home here Sunday.

Mrs. Coffee was born Hannah Pauline Dorn October 13, 1873, in Mount Hilliard, Alabama, and moved with her parents the late Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Dorn, to Falls County, Texas, at the age of 13. In 1890 the family moved West. They loaded their household goods and 11 children in two wagons pulled by horses and mules and driving 16 head of cattle began their trek West. They were two weeks making the trip to Falls County. From Falls County they moved to Mitchell County where Mr. Dorn had bought 350 acres of ranch land South of Colorado City (site of the present Lake Colorado). There they settled the Dorn community erecting a school and a church building.

Mrs. Coffee attended Colorado City High School, there taking an examination for a teachers certificate. She first taught in the school her father helped to erect, later going to Howard County teaching North of Big Spring. There she met her husband Thomas J. Coffee. They were married at the home of her parents in the Dorn Community August 18, 1895.

Mrs. Coffee had bought a farm 1 1/2 miles South of Westbrook where they farmed five years before purchasing land North of Loraine, a section which included historic Lone Wolf Mountain which was then the playground of West Texas. The achievement of West Texas lived on this place until 1907 when they moved to a farm 1 mile South of Loraine where they lived until the late 20's when they moved to the home where Mrs. Coffee still lives. Her husband died January 11, 1935.

Nine children were born to this union, 6 of whom survive. They are Mrs. W. F. (Ethel) James, Floyd Coffee, Ira Coffee, Jack Coffee, all of Loraine, Mrs. L. T. (Lola) Smith of Sweetwater, Mrs. Robert (Mildred) Bruce of Snyder. Deceased are three sons John, Charles and Wilbur. She has 18 living grandchildren and 42 great grandchildren. The oldest of the great grandchildren is 19 year old W. F. James III a student at University of Texas. The youngest is James Franklin Hickman, Jr. 1 year old son of Jackie Ruth of Alice.

Betty Ann Bruce on the C flute and Susan McDaniel on the alto saxophone played Happy Birthday to their grand mother and great grandmother. 13 of the 42 great grandchildren were also present to wish and sing happy birthday. SCHOOL PARTICIPATES IN STATE TESTING PROGRAM
The Loraine School District is cooperating with the Texas Education Agency in administering the State Testing Program. This school district qualified for the administration of the state tests, according to Mr. J. B. Cushing, superintendent. The test coordinator for the program is Preston C. Lightfoot.

The 7th Grade Tests of Educational Ability were given Monday and the 7th Grade Achievement Tests will be administered October 21-23.

The major purpose of the ability tests is to estimate scholastic ability in order to provide teachers and other personnel with a basis for judging the student's potentiality for success in school. The achievement tests are provided for measurement of the educational development of the pupils in the broad curricular areas of reading, language arts, Arithmetic, and work-study skills. Not only do these tests measure in-school learning, but they also measure out-of-school learning of the pupils.

Upon completion of the tests the school sends them to a data processing center in Chicago for scoring. The school then receives the test results which enables the counselor to prepare profile charts showing the pupil's strengths and weaknesses. Teachers, pupils, and parents have an opportunity to determine how well each pupil has mastered the basic skills and to learn in what areas pupils need the most help.

The test records and profiles for students are placed in permanent cumulative record folders for guidance purposes. Since September of 1961 all affiliated and accredited elementary and high schools must have a testing and guidance program for grades 1 through 12.

To volunteer the deer hides, sprinkle the raw side with table salt, drain, package, attach a card from the local sponsoring group and take to a motor freight line for free delivery.

If the hunters have their deer processed, they can ask the meat packers to send the hides.

The Volunteer Service Council will tan and give the leather to patients in the Texas mental and TE hospitals along with the schools for the retarded where they become a part of the recovery program.

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:
If you are one of those who believe that the Internal Revenue folks collect money on April 15 and sort of look for work the rest of the year, you are wrong-for several reasons. Tax dollars roll in to the Dallas District office at the rate of \$7,000,000 a day. July is a light collection month, but taxpayers in the northern half of Texas paid \$95,000,000 during July 1963. Some months the taxes run almost \$200,000,000. Withholding taxes, excise taxes, gasoline taxes, and even the \$50 gambling stamps, bring more dollars into the federal till throughout the year than the terrible deadline effort taxpayers make on April 15th.

Defoliation May Be Costly Or Profitable Says Cotton Expert

Defoliation, costly or profitable, depends largely on the maturity of the cotton which it is applied, says B. B. Manly, in charge of the U.S.D.A.'s Cotton Classing Office in Abilene, Texas. Defoliant applied too early, stops the maturing process of a stalk of cotton. The experiment stations do not recommend defoliation until at least 80 out of 100 bolls are open. If it is applied earlier, low yields, poor turnouts, and lower yields may result. The extent of damage will depend on how many immature bolls were killed. In addition to lower yields and turnouts, low mike cotton usually does not bring a good price and sometimes the grades may be affected, lowering the value still more. On the other hand, if more than 85% of the bolls are mature, defoliation and stripping can be profitable. Weather is always a potential hazard to open cotton. Also at this time gins are not as crowded as they usually are later in the season.

Generally conditions are very good for defoliation this year, but it would be wise to be certain each field, and even parts of the fields are ready for defoliation. Producers should be careful not to begin stripping too soon after defoliation. Stripping too soon will result in green bolls and possibly more barkey bales.

The Abilene Office, which is part of the Agriculture Market Service has processed 70,000 bales this season. The crop is moving around two months early, except in the Big Spring, Stanton, and Midland areas, where it is later than usual.

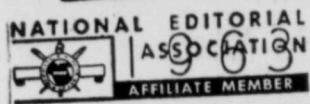

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Farm Facts

According to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, there were 14,808,000 people living on farms in the United States in 1961, or about one person out of every 22 in the total population.

This is the smallest farm population of recent record. From 1960 to 1961, the number of farm people decreased by about 830,000 as the movement away from farms more than offset the growth that would have taken place from births.

Non-white farm people number 2,346,000. They account for 1/6 of the total but because of their concentration in the South make up 3/10 of all Southern farm residents.

The farm population has a high percentage of children and teenagers; 43% of all farm people are under 20 years old. Farm people of late middle age or older outnumber young adults, however. In 1961, there were 109 farm males for every 100 females, compared with 97 males for every 100 females in the non-farm population.

Farm people are defined as those living on places with 10 or more acres of land and selling \$50 or more worth of farm products per year.

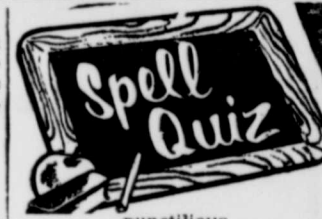

He was born in Malta August 4, 1902, but had lived in Mitchell County most of his life. He lived in Lorain for many years in his youth and married Opa Jarratt here.

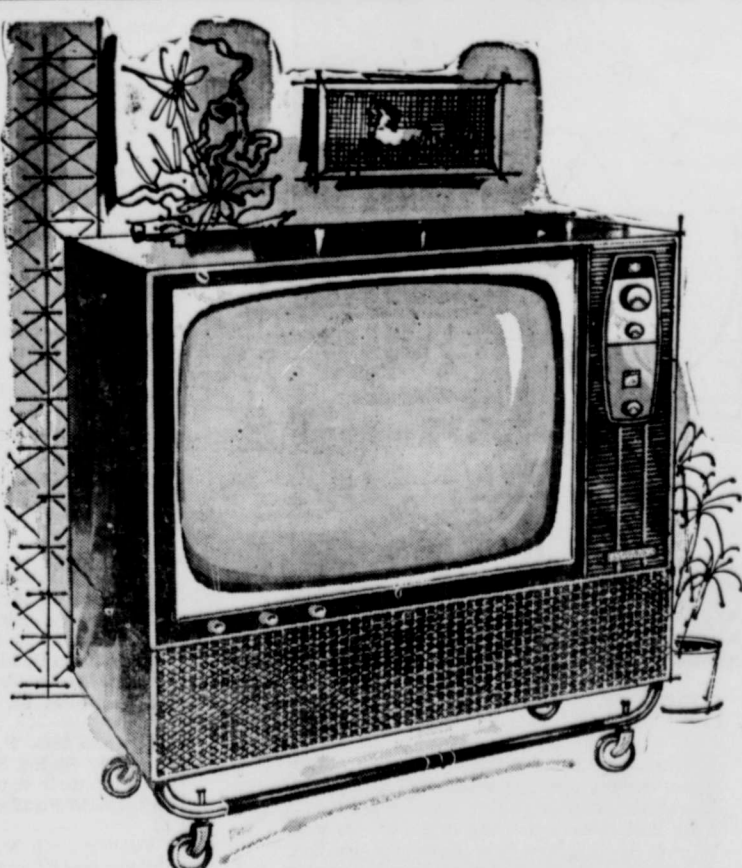

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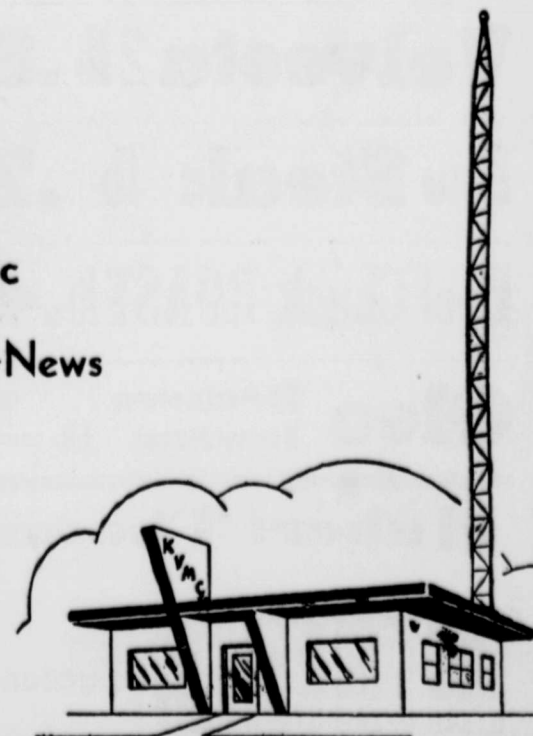
