School Board In Session

The Board of Education met in regular session February 2 at 7:00 p. m. in the board room. Those in attendance at the meeting were: L. J. West, president; Billie Harrison, vice president; Joe Lovelace, secretary; Joe Oswald, David Pinson; Bob Riley; Delwin Webb, Superintendent; Earl Carter, Business Manager.

Bills for the previous month were presented and approved for payment. In other reports the tax collection revealed that at 97.23% of the taxes had been collected; a budget progress report for 5/12 of the school year was presented and accepted; enrollment figures for January 31, 1970 indicated that 1,146 students were enrolled which is 28 students above the same date last year.

The board officially set Public School Week to be March 2 through March 9 with Thursday night, March 5, designated as open house for visitors. All schools and rooms will be open house for visitors. All schools and rooms will be open and teachers will be in their respective rooms. In the elementary building closed circuit television will be demonstrated. The television is used in teaching the bilingual kindergarten. All patrons are invited and encouraged to attend the annual open house.

In other action the board granted a request of the FFA to withdraw from the Houston Livestock show and enter the El Paso show which will be the week of February 8. Discussed at length were plans for the erection of a vocational education building. If the building is secured at least 2 more vocational subjects will be added to the curriculum for the coming year. The course will be either power mechanics or farm machinery repair and will be part of the agricultural program of the school. The other course will be a vocational pre-employment course for special education students.

In other action the board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Helen Thomas, fifth grade teacher, and employed Mrs. Floyd Galloway as fifth grade teacher and Mrs. Steve Hill as junior high teacher.

The board also called for trustee election to be held Saturday April 4 in the city hall and a complete notice of this official action is elsewhere in this paper.

Next regular meeting of the board will be March 2.

DAR Good Citizens Honored By Chapter

Hale Designated 'Disaster Area'

The Farmers Home Administration has notified Congressman Bob Price that nine High Plains counties, including Hale, have been designated as disaster areas.

The other counties are Bailey, Briscoe, Castro, Deaf Smith, Hale, Lamb, Parmer and Swisher.

The designation means that emergency credit is available to farmers and ranchers in these areas who have been unable to obtain funds elsewhere.

According to a spokesman in the office of Rep. Price, he has been working closely with the FHA in an attempt to obtain the designation which makes funds available at an interest rate of 3 per cent for farmers and ranchers who have been affected by natural disasters such as hail or freeze.

FIRE CAUSES BIG EXPLOSION

A fire in a large storage barn on J. C. Mills' farm 7 miles north and 2 1/2 miles east of Abernathy late Saturday afternoon caused an explosion that was heard and felt a long distance away. An oxygen bottle and an acetylene bottle were tied to a power line pole near the barn. The pole caught fire causing the acetylene to burn and the heavy steel oxygen bottle to explode.

The fire was blown high in the air and a long distance away from the pole. Firemen on the scene and City Patrolman Eldon Sparkman anticipated the explosion and kept spectators and themselves a safe distance from the pole and bottles. The fire was quickly brought under control as soon as firemen and equipment moved in after the explosion.

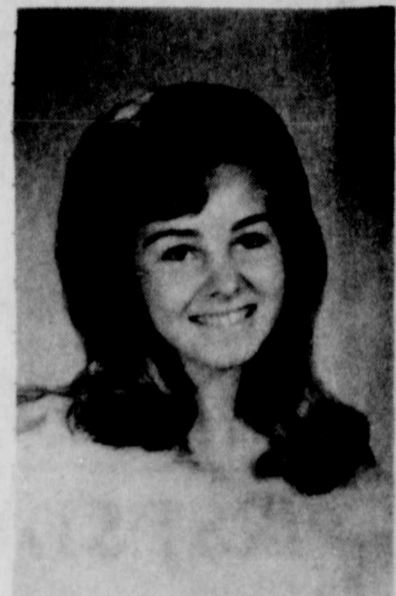
Former Area Resident Dies

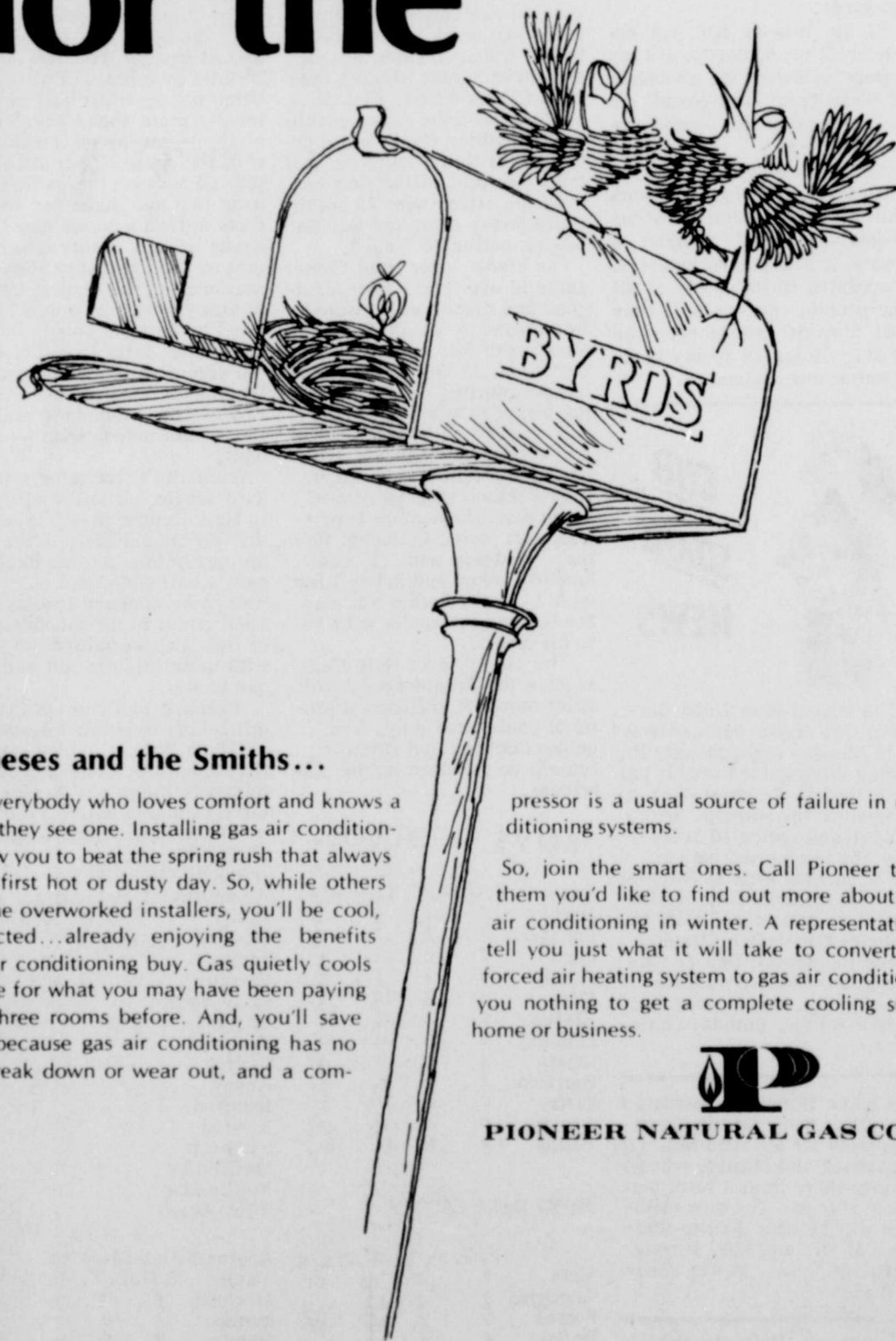

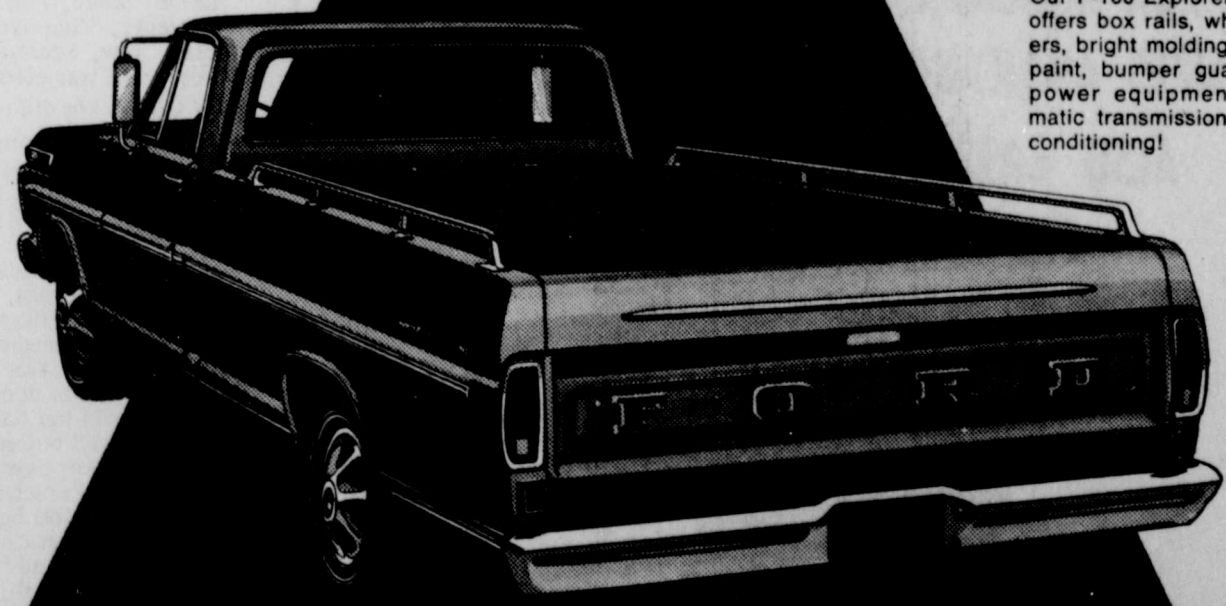
