Annual Cook-off to once again benefit Children in Need Fund

The Annual Fraternal Order of Eagles Aerie 3188 will host the 11th Annual Chili Cook-off on Jan. 26, benefiting the West Texas Center's Children in Need Fund. The fund helps with the purchase of school supplies, clothing and tuition for summer camps and other financial needs of children who are

receiving services from West Texas Centers. More than 2,500 people with a mental illness receive services each month from West Texas Centers, said West Texas Centers CEO Shelley Smith, LMSW. "This chili cook-off has become a long-standing tradition in Big Spring for many of our local residents and amongst the many veteran cooks who travel the region

competing in chili cook-offs," said Landon Sturdivant, cook-off organizer, a member of the Eagles and West Texas Centers chief operating officer. "We have raised in excess of \$10,000 each year the past few years for the Children in Need Fund," he said. "This fund-raiser has been the primary source of revenue for the children we serve who

aren't provided with regular avenues of funding." Chili cooks are needed for the competition, Sturdivant said. Teams are limited to two people and the entry fee is \$10. Prizes are awarded to the top finishers. "If you don't cook, don't let that stop you from participating in the chili cook-off,"

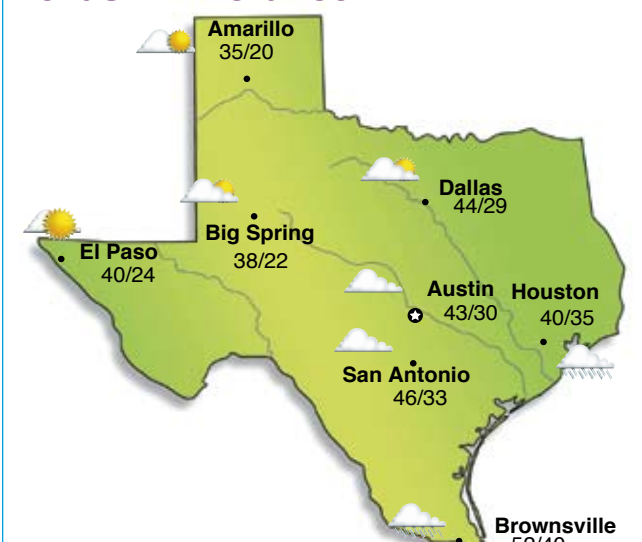

Dewhurst, Williams to lay out draft Texas budget

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Texas Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and Senate Finance Chairman Tommy Williams are expected to lay out the draft state budget, revealing the Republican leaders' spending priorities for the next two years.

They will discuss the 2014-2015 budget Monday before the bill is filed in the Texas Senate. The draft is a starting point that will undergo hundreds of revisions before becoming law.

But the draft bill will signal the priorities of the Republican leadership. Dewhurst has promised a conservative budget and Gov. Rick Perry has called for tax cuts. Democrats meanwhile want to restore \$5.2 billion in cuts to public schools made last year. Lawmakers have \$96 billion in revenue to spend in the next budget cycle.

Lawmakers have already cautioned that much of that money is already spoken for.

House to set rules for session

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The Texas House is returning to work and the first order of business is setting the ground rules.

Lawmakers in the Legislature's lower chamber failed to pass a resolution that will govern how they operate the first week of the 83rd Legislature. The House cannot take up any business until the rules resolution passes.

Tea party conservatives are pushing for greater transparency in what happens to the bills they file, to what committees they are assigned and whether they come up for a vote.

State Rep. David Simpson, a Longview Republican, complained in a speech on Tuesday about how senior lawmakers, including the speaker, control what bills come up for a vote and how committee assignments are made.

He called on lawmakers to make the rules fair.

Lon Morris goes up for auction

JACKSONVILLE, Texas (AP) — The campus of Lon Morris College, including most of its buildings, is set to be auctioned off after the state's oldest junior college filed for bankruptcy last year.

The auction is set for Monday at a Dallas law firm. The two-year United Methodist school is in the small East Texas town of Jacksonville, located about 125 miles southeast of Dallas.

Auction firm AmeriBid says the auction of the 112-acre campus will include most of the school's facilities, including the library, chapel, administration building, classroom facilities and athletic fields.

Lon Morris filed for bankruptcy in July. The college then suspended classes in August after the

U.S. Department of Education decided not to allow students to use federal aid there. Federal statutes disqualify schools that file for bankruptcy.

Trial of Texas dentist in wife's slaying starts

TYLER, Texas (AP) — A retired 76-year-old dentist heads to trial on a murder charge in the fatal shooting of his 71-year-old wife.

Bobby Nichols' trial is to begin Monday in state district court in Tyler. He's accused of murdering wife Rosalind Nichols, his wife of 26 years.

Bobby Nichols has said he "screwed up" when he got home the night of June 29 after drinking with his friends. He's said he doesn't remember details of the night and misses his wife, but has acknowledged shooting her in their East Texas home.

If convicted, Nichols could be sentenced to up to life in prison. He remains free on \$750,000 bond.

Man hurt in blast is dead

LEWISVILLE, Texas (AP) — A man injured in an explosion that leveled a North Texas home that is part of an affordable housing program has died at a hospital.

Christian Community Action president and CEO Ron Batts says 55-year-old Scott Deahl died Sunday night. Batts' nonprofit group owns the home and rents it out to families who are struggling financially.

Deahl lived at the home in Lewisville, about 20 miles northwest of Dallas.

Two firefighters who were standing on the street near the home were also injured in Friday's explosion. One was hospitalized with chest pains and expected to recover; the other was treated and released that day.

Authorities are trying to determine what caused the blast inside the home. Firefighters initially went to the home that morning after a gas leak was reported.

Top Texas lawmaker seeks charter school reform

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The new head of the Texas Senate's education committee said it's too difficult for the state to close down poorly performing charter schools, but more charter schools should be allowed to open.

In the 1990s, state lawmakers passed legislation to allow private, nonprofit groups to operate public schools that are under the supervision of the state instead of local school districts.

State Sen. Dan Patrick, a Houston Republican who has backed charter schools as part of a broader push for alternatives to conventional public

schooling, said he wants to overhaul the current system because he thinks it's too difficult to close underperforming schools and the charter school limit should be increased by 20 per year. The law currently allows 215 charter schools to operate in Texas.

"Back in the '90s, the Legislature didn't get it right. We need to get it right," Patrick, the new chairman of the Senate Education Committee, told the Austin American-Statesman (<http://bit.ly/11t2zNg>).

"What we need is a new way of approaching authorization, follow-up and closure," he said. "We cannot allow for schools that are unacceptable, whether they are traditional public or charter public, to operate for years and years. And that's the situation we're in right now."

He said the specifics were still being ironed out. According to the state Sunset Review Commission, charter schools feature disproportionately among the state's best and worst schools. In 2011, 8.5 percent of the charter schools earned the state's top academic accountability rating, compared to 4.4 percent of the conventional public schools.

However, 17.6 percent of the charter schools earned the lowest rating of "unacceptable," compared to the 4.9 percent of the conventional public schools. Also, the commission reported that 71 percent of the schools facing sanctions for falling short of academic or financial standards were charter schools.

Charter school industry leaders believe the state is sufficiently equipped to oversee schools but has not used its power appropriately, said David Dunn, executive director of the Texas Charter Schools Association. However, he agrees that clarification of legal ambiguities to ease enforcement would be appropriate.

George HW Bush could soon leave Houston hospital

HOUSTON (AP) — Former President George H.W. Bush could be discharged from a Houston hospital within days after nearly two months of treatment for illness that began as a bronchitis-related cough.

Spokesman Jim McGrath said Monday that the Bush family is hopeful he will be released early this week from Methodist Hospital. McGrath says the final word will come from Bush's doctors.

McGrath couldn't say if the 88-year-old will be allowed to return to his Houston home or will be sent to a rehabilitation facility. McGrath says those details will be provided "at the appropriate time."

This deal occurred in the North American representative to the 1989 world women's team championship.
At the first table, a Canadian pair reached four hearts as shown. West's two-heart bid indicated spades and a minor and should have forewarned declarer of the bad break in hearts.
South won the opening spade lead in her hand, cashed the king of diamonds and led a trump to the jack, West showing out. When East declined to win the trick, declarer cashed the diamond ace and then lost the ten of clubs to West's jack.
West's spade return was taken by dummy's ace, whereupon South

ruffed a diamond, ruffed a club low and led one of dummy's good diamonds. East ruffed with the seven of hearts, and declarer overruffed with the nine. South then ruffed a club with dummy's king, but East overruffed with the ace and returned the trump eight to declarer's queen. At this point, two tricks remained to be played, and South had to lose both of them — one to West's high club and the other to East's high trump — so she finished down one.
At the second table, Karen McCallum of the United States was South. Here West made only a simple one-spade overcall, so there was nothing to suggest the terrible trump division. Nevertheless, McCallum found a way to limit the defense to only three tricks.
She took the opening spade lead with dummy's ace and immediately led the club ten to West's jack. McCallum won the spade return, cashed the diamond king, ruffed a club, cashed the diamond ace and ruffed a spade. A club was then ruffed with the heart king. East overruffed with the ace — discarding would not have helped — and returned the five of hearts to dummy's jack.
McCallum ruffed a diamond at trick 10 and then led her last club, the king. East, down to the 10-8-7 of trumps, was forced to ruff her partner's trick and lead a heart to declarer's Q-9, handing South the last two tricks and the contract.

LEVELLAND — The Hawks opened Western Junior College Athletic Conference play against rival Midland College with a disappointing loss, but have since won two straight.

Howard College defeated conference foe South Plains on the road Saturday, 68-65 after a shaky first half was compensated for in the second.

"It was a game of two halves," HC Head Men's Basketball Coach Mark Adams said. "We were down 13 at halftime. (South Plains) played well and executed their offense, but in the second half, we made some adjustments. We played great defense, controlled the game and made our shots."

The winner has Adams feeling better about their place in the WJCAC.

"It's certainly nice to beat a team like South Plains after losing the one to Midland," Adams explained. "It was big for us — I think they

had won 22 straight at home."

The Hawks second half onslaught was led by Cameron Forte, who racked up 26 points for Howard. Rico Richardson also scored in double digits, hitting 12 points.

"They played exceptionally well," Adams added. Richardson played really well, too."

Next up for the Hawks will be a visit from New Mexico Junior College.

"They are one of the best teams in the conference," Adams said of New Mexico.

Game time is slated for Thursday at 7:45 p.m. at the Dorothy Garrett Coliseum.

The Howard College women's squad (12-6, 1-2) fell to the Lady Texans 53-50 after a hard-fought outing Saturday.

The Hawks held a four-point lead at the half, but according to Earl Women's Coach Head Diddle, sloppy handling

Brady leads Pats past Texans to return to AFC title game

FOXBOROUGH, Mass. — Tom Brady made history. Now it's his coach's turn.

The Patriots' quarterback added to a string of postseason success that stretches back more than a decade, earning his 17th playoff win to break a tie with his boyhood idol, Joe Montana, for most by a quarterback.

After New England's 41-28 victory over the Houston Texans on Sunday night, Bill Belichick needs two more playoff wins to match Tom Landry's NFL high of 20. If Belichick gets there this season he'd also tie Chuck Noll for most Super Bowl championships by a coach with four.

First, the Baltimore Ravens stand in the way next Sunday in a rematch of last year's AFC title game.

"Right now our focus is just (being)

happy to win this game and get on to Baltimore," Belichick said. "We can reflect back on some other years some other time."

Sunday was Brady's day to reach a milestone. His first postseason win came in the 2001 season, which ended with his first Super Bowl title. Now he's guiding the NFL's most productive offense into his sixth AFC championship game in his 13 seasons.

"He's our leader and we all follow him," said Belichick, the team's real leader. "We all respect him and he led the team today, along with the other guys. But he certainly did his job, as he's done many times before."

It won't take Belichick long to put Sunday's victory out of his mind, impressive as it was. Brady also is ready to move on to the next challenge.

"I think the two best teams are in the finals," he said. "Baltimore certainly deserves to be here and so do

we, so it's fitting."

The Texans (13-5) certainly don't after losing four of their last six games, starting with a 42-14 rout by the Patriots (13-4) on Dec. 10 on the same field where their season ended.

"There's no good landing in this business unless you're playing a few weeks from now," Houston coach Gary Kubiak said. "Other than that, the landing's a crash."

Brady threw for three scores and 344 yards and seldom-used running back Shane Vereen, seeing more action because of Danny Woodhead hurt his thumb on the Patriots' first offensive play, had three touchdowns. Wes Welker had eight catches for a career postseason-high 131 yards and the defense held Arian Foster to 90 yards rushing, his first sub-100-yard playoff game in the four he's had.

The Patriots also overcame the loss of tight end Rob Gronkowski, who

broke the left arm he originally broke on Nov. 18 in a 59-24 win over the Indianapolis Colts and needs season-ending surgery, a person with knowledge of the injury told The Associated Press.

"It's a bummer to lose anybody," Brady said, "but someone of Rob's importance or Danny's importance, we need guys to step in and fill the void, whether it's this game or any game after."

Gronkowski missed the first game against the Texans, one of five he sat out after his first injury, and it didn't matter.

The Texans were more competitive on Sunday and trailed only 17-13 at halftime as Foster scored on a 1-yard run and Shayne Graham kicked a 55-yard field goal in the last 1:11 before intermission.

Parker puts up 20, Spurs beat T'Wolves

SAN ANTONIO — Despite getting ejected for heatedly arguing a foul and seeing Manu Ginobili strain a hamstring, San Antonio coach Popovich couldn't suppress a few smiles after the Spurs' latest home win.

Tony Parker scored 20 points and Tim Duncan had 14 points, nine rebounds and seven blocks to lead San Antonio in a 106-88 victory over the Minnesota Timberwolves on Sunday night, extending the Spurs' home

winning streak to 12 games.

Duncan's season-high in blocks helped the Spurs outscore the Timberwolves 54-34 in the paint and San Antonio finished with a 43-28 edge in rebounding.

"I don't think that's a huge surprise," Popovich said, smiling, when told of Duncan's blocks. "It's kind of neat that it was seven, but I mean, he does that every night. He tries to do the best he can guarding, blocking shots, protecting

ATLANTA — Matt Ryan won't have to answer that question anymore.

Neither will Tony Gonzalez. They're both playoff winners. Finally.

Ryan got over the postseason hump in his fifth season, guiding the Atlanta Falcons to an improbable comeback in the final half-minute for a 30-28 victory over the gritty Seattle Seahawks in an NFC divisional game Sunday.

If Ryan was feeling relief, imagine what was going through Gonzalez's mind. The 16-year veteran, in what is likely the final season of a Hall of Fame career, removed the only blotch from his brilliant record with his first playoff win.

No wonder he broke down in tears when it was over.

"I've cried after a loss. But never a win," said Gonzalez, who had been 0-5 in the postseason. "I thought it was over. Sixteen years. Six playoff games. I was like, 'Here we go again.' Especially with that big lead. I thought it just wasn't meant to be."

The Falcons (14-3) led 20-0 at halftime, and were still up 27-7 going to the fourth quarter. No team had ever blown such a daunting lead in the final period of a playoff game. But the Seahawks, led by Russell Wilson, nearly pulled off a historic win.

Wilson passed for two touchdowns and ran for another, then led a drive that looked like the game winner. He completed three passes for 50 yards, the last of them a short throw to Marshawn Lynch that the bruising runner took all the way to the Falcons 3. The rookie quarterback made

it all possible with his legs, spinning away from blitzing linebacker Sean Weatherspoon to give himself extra time to throw.

On the next play, after the rattled Falcons were penalized for too many players on the field, Lynch powered over from the 2 to give the Seahawks (12-6) their first lead of the day, 28-27 with 31 seconds remaining.

The Falcons could've packed it in right there, but Ryan and Gonzalez went back to work.

First, Ryan hit a deep pass to Harry Douglas right in front of the Atlanta bench, a 22-yard completion to midfield. Then, with one timeout remaining, Ryan went to Gonzalez on a 19-yard throw over the middle. The Falcons quickly stopped the clock again, and Matt Bryant connected on a 49-yard

AP source: Eagles interviewed Brian Billick

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Philadelphia Eagles have interviewed former Ravens coach and current Fox analyst Brian Billick for their coaching vacancy, a person familiar with the meeting told The Associated Press on Sunday.

Billick, who led Baltimore to a Super Bowl title in the 2000 season, met with the Eagles last Monday, according to the person who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The Eagles are known to have interviewed eight other candidates, including three high-profile college

coaches who decided to stay at their schools.

They were Notre Dame's Brian Kelly, Oregon's Chip Kelly and Penn State's Bill O'Brien.

Philadelphia fired Andy Reid on Dec. 31, a day after finishing 4-12 in his 14th season.

Billick hasn't coached since 2007. He was 80-64 in nine seasons with the Ravens, leading them to two division titles and a 5-3 record in four playoff appearances.

CNN.com first reported Billick's interview.

The 58-year-old Billick began his NFL coaching ca-

reer in Minnesota as a tight ends coach in 1992.

Billick became the second coach in Ravens history in 1999 and guided them to a Super Bowl victory over the New York Giants in his second season.

Known for having a dynamic offense in Minnesota, Billick never came close to matching it in Baltimore.

Of course, talent had a part in that. The Vikings had Randall Cunningham and Daunte Culpepper as their quarterbacks, along with star wide receivers Cris Carter and Randy Moss

and running back Robert Smith.

Billick's Ravens were built on strong defenses led by Ray Lewis and Co.

They finished in the top six in total yards in eight of Billick's nine seasons.

Billick assembled quite a coaching staff in Baltimore. Six of his assistants became head coaches, including Mike Smith (Atlanta), Marvin Lewis (Cincinnati), Rex Ryan (New York Jets), Mike Singletary (San Francisco), Mike Nolan (San Francisco) and Jack Del Rio (Jacksonville).

the rim for us."

Gary Neal scored 15 points, including 3-for-3 shooting on 3-pointers to help San Antonio beat Minnesota at home for the 16th straight time. Tiago Splitter had 10 points and Ginobili scored 12 in the first half before leaving with a strained left hamstring.

Duncan had five blocks in the first quarter to help offset a sluggish start as San Antonio captured a 24-21 lead.

"I don't know, they just kept coming at me," Duncan said. "I'm just trying to bring some energy back and get our rhythm back. I've been in a slump lately and I'm trying to fight my way out of it."

Ginobili, who had six points in the run, did not return after straining his left hamstring in the final minute of the first half. He also had five assists in 12:29.

Popovich said the Spurs will not know Ginobili's status until Monday.

J.J. Barea scored 15 points, Nikola Pekovic had 14 and Luke Ridnour 13 for the Timberwolves.

Minnesota was without head coach Rick Adelman, who missed his second straight game to be with his wife, Mary Kay, who is hospitalized with an undisclosed illness.

The Spurs attacked the basket to open the second half as Kawhi Leonard had a dunk and dropped in a floater, and Duncan and Parker had layups in an 11-0 run.

Dante Cunningham then led an 8-0 run that pulled Minnesota to 66-62.

Neal scored eight points in the opening 3 minutes of the final quarter to extend San Antonio's lead to 88-75.

"We were right there going into the fourth," Ridnour said. "On the road, that's where you want to be — within striking distance. We just went rough a little lull and Neal got hot there."

Popovich was ejected with 7:22 remaining in the game following a double technical for arguing a foul called against Split-

ter on Barea. The ejection sparked an 11-0 run for the Spurs, including a dunk and two reverse layups by Splitter.

The ejection didn't seem to linger with Popovich. When asked about the play of Patty Mills, who was 2 for 8 in scoring five points, the Spurs coach couldn't help but smile.

"He was on fire," Popovich said, biting his lip and shaking his head in a futile attempt not to smile. "Patty is always an energetic guy; he does a great job busting his butt. He just couldn't find the rim tonight, well, he found the rim; he couldn't find the net."

Popovich was able to limit his starter's minutes early in the second quarter, to the point Duncan playfully walked to the scorer's table to check in. Popovich grabbed him by the front of his warm-up shirt and walked the former MVP back to the bench. The frivolity lasted less than a minute, as Duncan re-entered the game after back-to-back steals by Minnesota cut San Antonio's lead to 35-32.

field goal with 8 seconds left for the victory.

Atlanta will host the NFC championship game for the first time next Sunday against the San Francisco 49ers, another team that features a mobile quarterback. The defense hopes that facing Wilson will help prepare for Colin Kaepernick, who passed for 263 yards and rushed for 181 — a playoff record for a quarterback — in a 45-31 victory over Green Bay.

"Russell Wilson and Colin Kaepernick are mobile quarterbacks who throw the ball at extremely accurate levels," Falcons safety Thomas DeCoud said. "We can use this game as a cheat sheet to prepare for next week."

The Falcons overcame their reputation for choking in the playoffs, winning their first postseason game since the 2004 season.

"Nobody flinched," Ryan said. "We just kept battling, kept doing what we do. That's been the makeup of our team all season."

Ryan came into the game with an 0-3 mark in the playoffs, including a crushing loss to Green Bay two years ago when the Falcons were in the same position, the NFC's top-seeded team with home-field advantage in the playoffs.

Now, he'll no longer be asked why he can't win in the playoffs.

"That's going to be nice," Ryan said with a smile. "But our goal is not to win one playoff game. Our goals are still in front of us."

Bryant made his third game-winning kick of the season. But he'd never made one like this, with so much on the line.

"When they scored their touchdown, I walked down (the sideline)," he said. "I told the offensive line, I told Matt (Ryan), I told all the receivers, 'We've done this before.'"

Wilson finished with 385 yards passing and led the Seahawks in rushing with 60 yards on seven carries, an even better performance than the one that carried Seattle to an opening-round victory over Robert Griffin III and the Washington Redskins.

Not quite enough this time. "We had high, high hopes for the rest of the season," Wilson

said. "When the game was over, I was very disappointed. But walking back into the tunnel, I got so excited about next year. The resilience we showed was unbelievable."

A botched squib kick by the Falcons gave Seattle the ball at its own 46 and a chance at one more comeback. But Wilson threw a short pass that only picked up 6 yards, forcing a desperation heave into the end zone on the final play.

Falcons receiver Julio Jones, who had practiced for just such a situation during the week, went in on defense and leaped up to make the interception, leaving Atlanta one win away from the second Super Bowl appearance in franchise history.

Ryan had a couple of interceptions, but threw three touchdown passes, tying a Falcons playoff record. He completed 24 of 35 for 250 yards — the first time he's eclipsed 200 yards in the postseason.

The scoring passes were 1-yarder to Gonzalez, who made a leaping grab in the back of the end zone; a 47-yarder to Roddy White that stretched the lead to 20-0 late in the second quarter; and a 5-yarder to Jason Snelling, a quick throw after a fake pitch to Jones, gave the Falcons a seemingly comfortable edge late in the third period.

Wilson took over from there, running 1 yard for a touchdown to make it 27-14, then going to Zach Miller on a 3-yard touchdown pass that closed the gap to 27-21. Ryan's second interception, an ill-advised deep throw into double coverage, helped keep the Seahawks alive.

But the Seahawks will likely spend the offseason kicking themselves for that last Falcons' drive, and for squandering two scoring chances in the first half.

On fourth-and-1 at the Atlanta 11, Seattle passed on a field goal and a chance to give the ball to Lynch, their best of a back. Fullback Michael Robinson was stuffed for a 1-yard loss by safety William Moore.

With the clock winding down before halftime, Seattle used all its timeouts and wound up regretting it when Wilson was sacked by Jonathan Babineaux at the Atlanta 20. Time ran out before the Seahawks could get off another play, sending Atlanta to the locker room still up by 20.

Turns out, the game was just getting started.

But the Patriots scored on two of their first three series in the third quarter on Stevan Ridley's 8-yard run and Brady's 5-yard pass to Brandon Lloyd that made it 31-13.

"We came out in the second half and didn't perform," NFL sacks leader J.J. Watt said. "Losing. I can't stand it. I can't stand any aspect of it. The taste in your mouth is terrible."

Lloyd scored just six

plays after Rob Ninkovich ended a Houston threat with an interception that gave New England the ball at its 37-yard line.

The Patriots needed just one play after taking over on downs early in the fourth quarter, scoring on an outstanding over-the-shoulder catch by Vereen for a 33-yard touchdown and a 38-13 advantage.

The third-string back finished with 124 total yards — 83 on five receptions and 41 on seven carries.

"I don't come into the game knowing how much anyone is going to play," Vereen said. "I come into the game ready to go."

The Texans were.

On the very first play, Danieal Manning returned the kickoff 94 yards before being hauled down by Devin McCourty at the Patriots 12. But all the Texans could get out of that was a 27-yard field goal by Shayne Graham.

"That was a huge play by Devin to really end up saving (four) points,"

Belichick said.

The Patriots punted on their first two series then took the lead for good on Vereen's 1-yard run following Brady's consecutive completions of 13 yards to Ridley, 25 to Vereen and 14 to Aaron Hernandez.

The Texans offense got going again in the fourth quarter, but it was too late. Matt Schaub's touchdown passes of 25 yards to DeVier Posey and 1 yard to Foster in the last 12 minutes just made the margin of defeat closer.

"It's difficult to sit here (with) the realization that our season is over," Schaub said.

The Patriots' season continues against a team it beat in last year's AFC title game 23-20, but lost to in Week 3 this season 31-30 after leading 30-21 with less than 5 minutes left.

The Ravens advanced with a 38-35 double-overtime win in Denver and will be on the road again, trying to keep Belichick from tying Don Shula with 19 postseason victories. A win would be

the 18th for Brady and Belichick together since the Patriots drafted the quarterback in 2000. It also would put him two up on Montana.

"I grew up a 49ers fan," Brady said. "Joe Montana and Steve Young ... those guys are in another class."

"I love playing, I love competing, I love being a part of this organization," he said. "I think I've just been fortunate to play on some great teams over the years. I never take it for granted."
