Crockett County votes to go wet

Voters approved the sale of alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption in Crockett County Friday when they voted 659 to 530 for the measure. 1,192 ballots were cast with Pct. 3 the only one not in favor.

Approximately 42 percent of those registered voted with 376 absentee.

Friday's voters cast their ballots as follows: Pct. 1, 124 for, 77 against; Pct. 3, 121 for, 145 against; Pct. 4, 159 for, 55 against; Box 36, 10 for, 5 against. Absentee votes tallied 172 for and 199 against.

An article in the Oct. 2, 1903 edition of The Southwest Texan, an Ozona newspaper, carries the commissioner's court report of a Sept. 19 vote counting by commissioners to determine "whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited" in Pct. 1. The 1903 results were for prohibition.

Commissioners will meet Thursday to canvass the ballots. After certifying the election with the Secretary of State and Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission district office in San Angelo, the TABC will begin accepting applications for licenses.

Applications for a license to distribute and personal history forms

are available at the San Angelo TABC office or from County Clerk Debbi Puckett.

Once the TABC verifies that applications are correctly filled out, they must be filed with the county clerk and notices published before a hearing can be conducted by County Judge Kathryn Mayfield. Upon approval by the judge, the applicant must pay the appropriate fees at the tax office. This office then forwards certification to the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission in Austin for final approval. Annual state fees include: \$300 package store permit, \$100 local distributors fee, \$30 local cartage fee (delivery), wine and beer off-premises store, \$60 and beer only license \$60.

San Angelo TABC head Roger Durant verified Monday that several applications have been picked up by Ozona people.

There are 61 Texas counties which do not allow the sale of any alcoholic beverages, Durant said.

A petition is being circulated to ask commissioners to regulate locations of establishments selling alcoholic beverages. A request has been made to place the matter on the agenda for the June 13 court meeting according to Judge Mayfield.

Covered Wagon Dinner Theater will be held in a new permanent amphitheater at Caverns of Sonora.

The Sutton County Steakhouse will cater the event with two sizes of portions. Costs for the meals will be \$3.75 and \$5.50.

Tickets for the show are \$4 with no charge for children six and under. Tickets are available at the gate and

reservations are not necessary this year.

There has been a great deal of interest generated from around the state for the Covered Wagon Dinner Theater, and it is the hope of the Outdoor Drama Group of Sonora that the summer performances featuring entertainers from neighboring communities will increase tourism in the area.

Chamber Brochure distributed

The new brochure for Ozona Chamber of Commerce has been completed with copies sent to ports of entry and visitor centers around the state.

The attractive tan brochure welcomes visitors to the "Biggest Little Town in the World", outlines points of interest, public services and facilities and other services.

Lettering for the publication and the map of Ozona were done by Steve Williams of the chamber.

Crockett County Museum allowed use of prints sold there to picture the courthouse, jail and Emerald House

for the promotional piece.

Distribution of the brochure came just as magazine advertisements promoting Texas as a "whole other country" began appearing in national and regional publications. The Texas Department of Commerce officials are impressed by the results the ads and the accompanying month-old television campaign are producing.

"These advertisements, both television and magazine, are generating more interest than any other tourism campaign in the state's history," said Bill Lauderback, executive director of the Department of Commerce. "Our increased travel promotion funding is enabling us to get the Texas message out to many more potential visitors, and this should result in increased travel spending statewide, and ultimately, more jobs."

The Commerce Department will spend approximately \$5 million this fiscal year advertising Texas as a travel destination, compared to \$970,000 last year. About \$2 million more is allocated for other tourism promotion programs of Commerce's Tourism Division.

The increased funding resulted from legislative action last year that dedicated one-twelfth of the state's hotel/motel occupancy tax collections specifically to tourism promotion and advertising.

Grand Jury returns six indictments

Six Ozona residents were indicted on felony charges when a new grand jury met June 1.

Richard Berry was indicted on a charge of forgery, a third-degree felony. The indictment says Berry forged another person's name to a motor vehicle title certificate.

Bail was originally set at \$20,000 by Judge Brock Jones but was reduced to \$10,000.

Conviction for this offense carries a penalty of two to 10 years in prison with a fine of up to \$5,000.

Bail was set at \$1,500 on Ismeal Castro. He was indicted on a charge of burglary of a habitation. The indictment states that Castro entered a habitation without the owner's consent and committed aggravated assault.

Arturo A. Torres Jr. was indicted on a charge of theft connected with several knives and guns with a value of more than \$750 but less than \$20,000. His bail was set at \$10,000.

Ricky Lynn Swearingen was indicted on a charge of burglary of a vehicle and bail set at \$5,000.

Also indicted on a charge of burglary of a vehicle was Nino Castillo Tambunga. Bail was set at \$5,000.

An indictment on a charge of burglary of a building was filed against Jose Rodriguez with bail set at \$5,000.

An indictment means that nine of 12 grand jurors believe there is cause for trial.

Perez convicted of assault

John M. Perez of Ozona was convicted of aggravated assault Monday in district court.

Perez was given a six year probated sentence with deferred adjudication and assessed court costs of \$114, attorney fees of \$1,500 and ordered to make restitution in the amount of \$1,691.85.

Producers urged to apply for Emergency Feed Program

Producers are urged to come by the ASCS office as soon as possible and make an application for Emergency Feed. Assistance will be computed at 50% of the cost not to exceed five cents per pound of feed grain equivalent.

Producers will be given a questionnaire to fill out, and the following information will be asked: the number of head of livestock that the applicant has owned for 6 months or more, feed on hand as of the date the application is signed (this includes only feed that was purchased after April 1, 1988 and is still on hand), and if you own or lease land in another county or state.

You will need to have signed

purchase tickets for the feed that you have on hand as well as any feed you purchase after you fill out your application. You can bring these tickets by the office and we will keep them for you.

We still have many unanswered questions about the feed program; as we receive more information, we will pass it along to you. What we really need from you is to fill out the questionnaire so that when we are ready to make payments, we have the information. We expect to make the first payments sometime in July. If you have any questions, call or come by the office and we will do our best to help you.

How we fared on the TEAMS test

TEAMS scores for 1988 show that Ozona students held a higher passing percentage than those statewide on most areas of the test.

Statewide TEAMS results released recently showed marked improvement in test scores and the percentage of students mastering the reading, writing and math exams at grades 3, 5 and 7. Grade nine results remained steady.

The improvements show that nearly three-fourths of students in grades 3, 5 and 7 mastered the three sections of the tests in 1988 compared to just more than half in 1986.

Of Ozona's third graders, 90 percent passed the math, 85 percent passed the reading and 62 percent passed the writing sections of the test. Of all Texas third graders, 91 percent passed math, 84 percent passed reading and 76 percent passed writing.

When compared with results of the past, Ozona third graders held higher passing rates than the state figures in both math and reading during 1986 and 1987. In writing, the students passed with a much higher percentage in 1986, but then dropped below the overall figure in 1987.

Ozona's fifth graders remained above the overall passing rate in all areas with 94 percent passing math, 93 percent passing reading and 91 percent passing writing. Of all Texas

fifth graders, 89 percent mastered math, 88 percent mastered reading and 79 percent mastered writing.

In 1986, the percentage of Ozona fifth graders remained above the overall figure, but in 1987, while still remaining above in reading, they dropped below in math and writing.

Ozona seventh graders held passing rates of 98 percent in math, 93 percent in reading and 79 percent in writing as compared with 91 percent in math, 87 percent in reading and 80 percent in writing across the state.

In 1986, the Ozona seventh graders' passing rate was above the overall rate in reading and writing, but below in math. The rate was below in all areas during 1987.

Ninth graders in Ozona held an 86 percent passing rate in math, 85 percent in reading and 61 percent in writing. The state passing percentages were 83 percent in math, 79 percent in reading and 67 percent in writing.

In 1986, Ozona's ninth graders held higher passing rates than the overall in reading and writing, but lower in math. Math and writing were higher with reading being lower in 1987.

In addition to across-the-board improvements, the achievement gap between minority and other students has noticeably narrowed according to State Board of Education Chairman Jon Brumley.

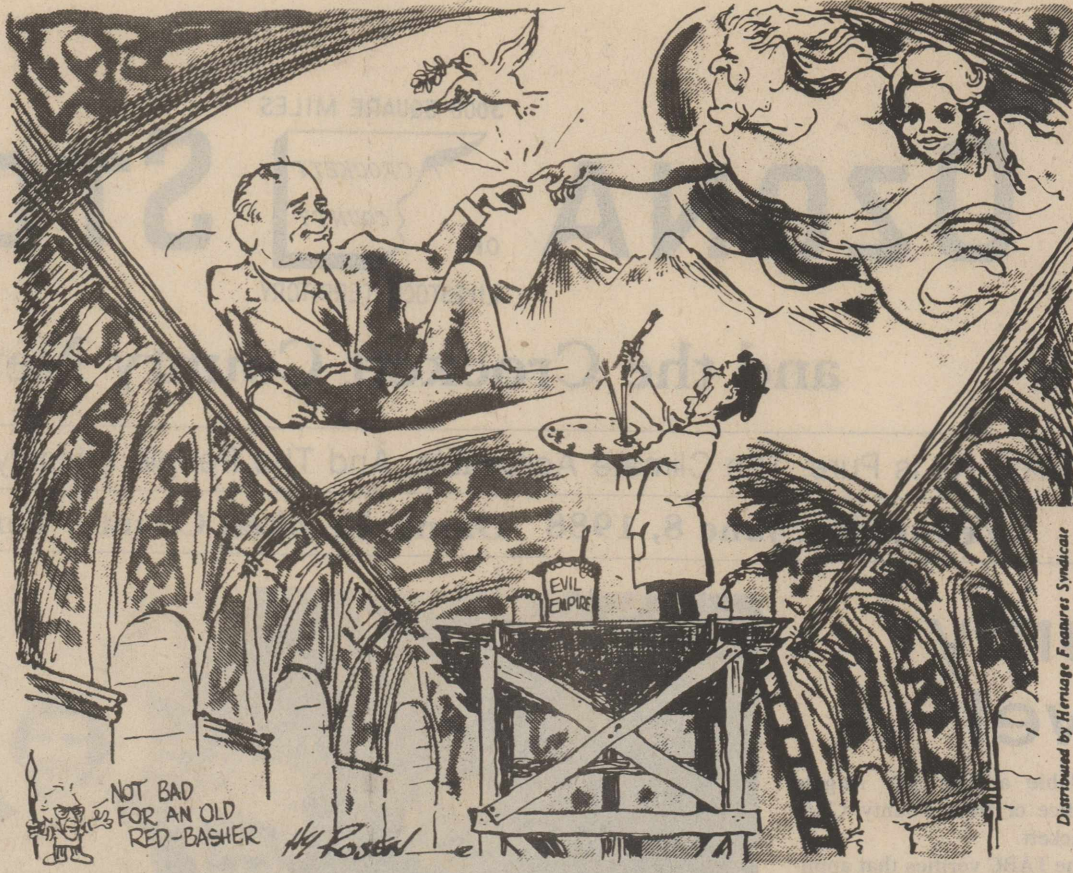
Mrs. Massie (Rebecca Baggett) West died Monday, June 6, 1988 at the Crockett County Care Center in Ozona. She was 82.

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STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Comptroller Bob Bullock last week predicted Texas will have sufficient revenues to maintain current spending levels without a tax increase for the next two years.

A real plus in the state's economic growth has been helped in part by Texas ranchers and farmers who made \$2 billion more last year.

Ongoing efforts led by Rep. Dudley Harrison and Sen. Bill Sims with assistance from other top agricultural leaders are aimed at increasing those profits.

Simply stated, much Texas produce is shipped out of the state for processing. If it's processed here, more profits stay here.

The Texas Agricultural Diversification Program, passed last session by Harrison and Sims, has \$500,000 to award small grants to firms which can match an amount with private dollars.

The funds are seed money for expanding textile plants, flour mills, slaughterhouses, and retail

facilities.

"Kill It Myself"

No state agency will approve grant applications. Instead, a panel comprised of top farm and ranch leaders oversees the funding.

Harrison, a conservative, often called "The Wiley Ol' Fox" by other lawmakers, and Sims sit as ex-officio members to monitor the program's cost effectiveness.

"It's not going to be another give-away. If it's not cost-effective, then I'll kill it myself," Harrison vowed.

Mauro Seeks State Share

Former U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough was a key state's witness in a lawsuit last week over whether parties involved in a West Texas oil lease owe the state millions of dollars in delinquent royalty payments.

Texas Land Commissioner Gary Mauro seeks to halt payment of oil royalties to the owners and says the state and owner should split the \$161 million which has been produced by the lucrative four-acre lease since 1934.

Mauro says Texas has received only \$10 million and is demanding

the balance be paid to the state.

Yarborough was an assistant attorney general in 1935 when the state approved a deal whereby the owner assigned the lease to another businessman.

The question now is whether the owner illegally assigned the lease to himself behind a dummy operation, a move that Yarborough said, if known, would have killed the 1934 settlement.

Probe Sought for Senator

Though it smacks of politics more than a mission of good government, the Texas GOP called for an official budget probe of state Sen. Richard Anderson, D-Marshall.

After Anderson admitted someone in his office ran up more than \$1,000 on the state phone bill for calls to his campaign offices, the Republicans asked the attorney general and Travis County district attorney, both Democrats, to investigate all of Anderson's state office expenses.

Library awarded literature

The Crockett County Public Library has been awarded a 60-volume set of The Library of America, the series that American Heritage magazine called "The most ambitious effort ever undertaken to put the best of American literature into the hands of the general reader."

The public library is receiving the award after submitting an application to The Library of America and obtaining a pledge of \$250 from Friends of the Library. The library is one of more than 1000 across the country that have already acquired this important collection of American literature with funds from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation and matching funds pledged in their local communities. For libraries in Texas, each \$250 raised locally is being matched by \$250 from the Texas Committee for the Humanities and by \$500 from the Mellon Foundation.

The Crockett County Public Library will receive the 36 volumes already published in the Library of America, over 46,000 pages of the best writing our country has produced. Thereafter, the remaining 24 volumes will be sent in regular shipments over the next five years for an average of five volumes a year. Each volume will have a bookplate acknowledging the generosity of the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, the Texas Committee for the Humanities, and the Friends of the Crockett County Public Library. Certificates will also be sent to the library for display and

for presentation to its donors.

The Library of America is a nonprofit publishing program that began in 1982 in an unprecedented effort to restore America's literary heritage by publishing the collected works of America's major authors in a uniform, hardcover series. Seed money for the program was provided by the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Ford Foundation.

Volumes already published include the works of Henry Adams, Willa Cather, James Fenimore Cooper, Stephen Crane, Theodore Dreiser, W.E.B. Du Bois, Ralph Waldo Emerson, William Faulkner, Benjamin Franklin, Nathaniel Hawthorne, William Dean Howells, Washington Irving, Henry James, Thomas Jefferson, Jack London, Herman Melville, Frank Norris, Francis Parkman, Edgar Allan Poe, Harriet Beecher Stowe, Henry David Thoreau, Mark Twain, Edith Wharton and Walt Whitman.

The Library of America volumes are generally sold through bookstores at \$27.50 per volume, except for the Jefferson, Parkman and Franklin volumes which are \$30.00 each, and by subscription for \$21.95

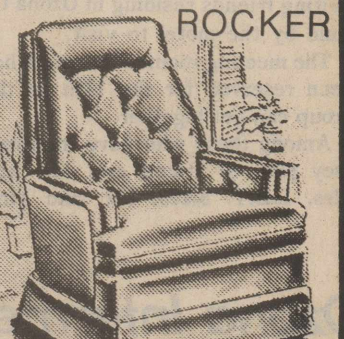
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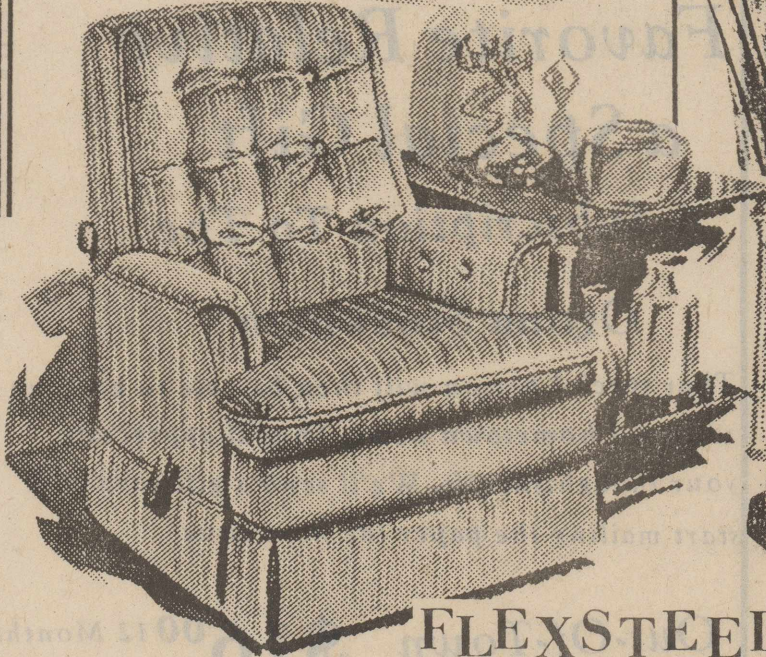


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Intermediate holds awards assembly

Presidential Academic Fitness Award explained

In 1983, President Ronald Reagan established the Presidential Academic Fitness Award program to honor students who have achieved excellence in their studies. Awards are given at three levels to students who are graduating from elementary school, middle or junior high school, and high school.

Students who fulfill all criteria qualify for the Presidential Academic Fitness Award, and these national criteria may not be modified. The criteria is based upon four areas.

The first criteria is grade point average. A student must have maintained a B+ average in all years in the school (K-2 not included).

Second, a student must have scored at the 80th percentile or higher on the most recent standardized achievement test given. This battery score must include both verbal and mathematical skills.

Third, high school seniors must

have completed 12 high school or higher level course units in the "New Basics," which include English, mathematics, science, social studies, foreign languages, and computer science. In addition to the above criteria, an Extraordinary Effort Award may be given to a limited number of students who do not meet all the academic criteria, but whom the school wishes to recognize for extraordinary effort.

This award is optional and may be presented to no more than 10 percent of the number of students who meet all of the academic criteria for the award. The award is a certificate signed by President Ronald Reagan, U.S. Secretary of Education William J. Bennett, and the school principal.

According to Mr. Bennett, "The

Presidential Academic Fitness Awards (PAFA) program helps schools honor students for outstanding academic achievement. The award is evidence that students have mastered their studies and demonstrated their ability to work hard over a sustained period to realize their full academic potential.

In this way, the award seeks to foster the development of good character as well as academic success." President Reagan has stated, "America's future hinges on the education we give our children - on the knowledge and skills, the values and virtues we impart to them. Citizens who have received such a well-rounded, deeply-grounded education will lend unity to our society, strength to our economy and vigor to our public life."

Trooper Jaime Velasquez, 25, graduated from the Department of Public Safety training academy and has been assigned to the Drivers License Service in Ozona.

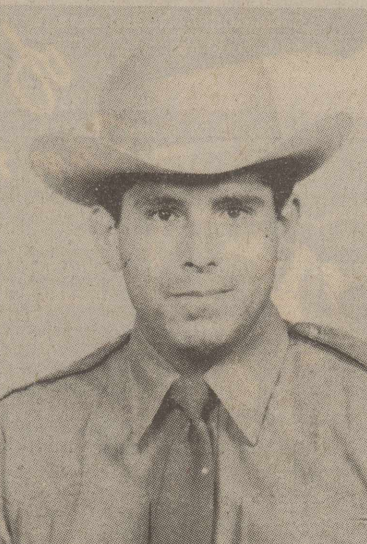

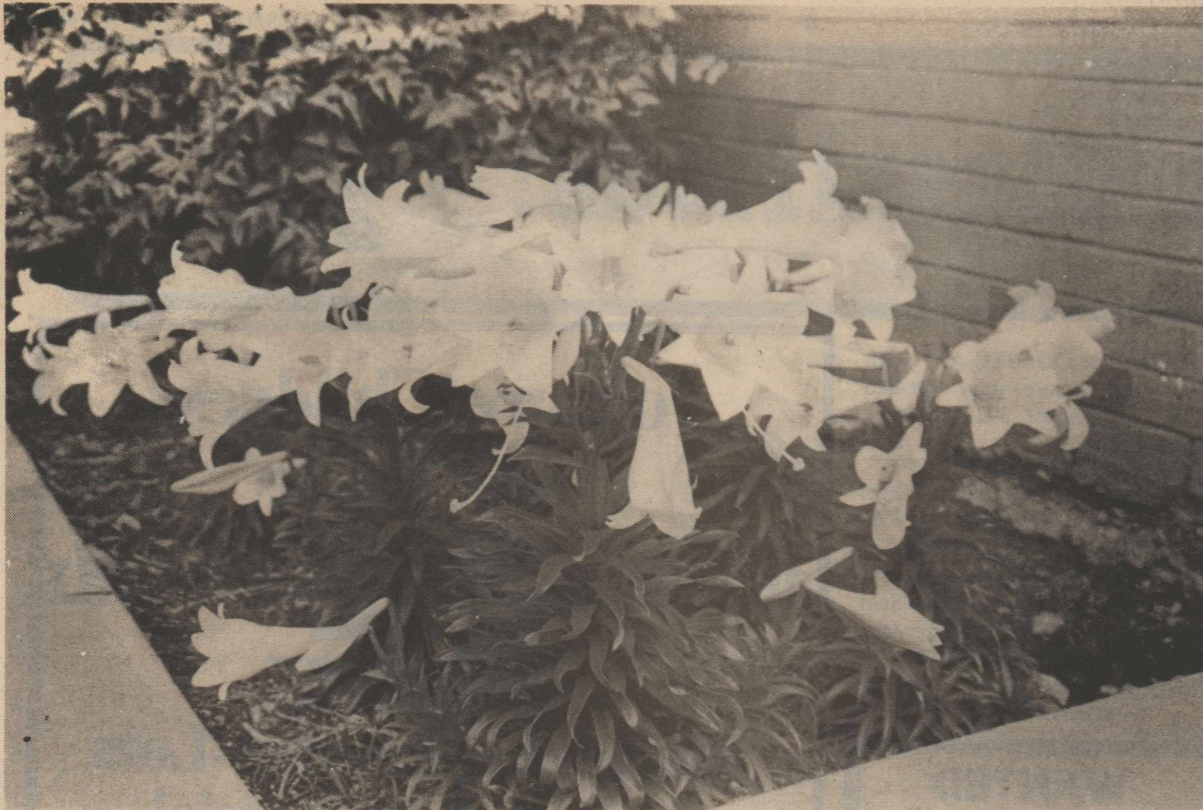

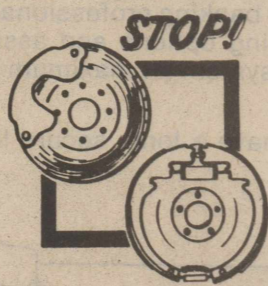

The Water Of Life

"If you're thirsty, come to Me and drink. If you believe in Me, streams of living water will flow from you, as the Bible has said." John 7:37-38

Jesus spoke these words at the Festival of Booths (Tabernacles), an annual commemoration of Israel's wilderness wanderings. The people lived in tents for seven days, and each morning a golden pitcher of water was brought from the Pool of Siloam and poured out in the Temple-reminding them how God had miraculously provided water for His people from a rock in the desert. This rite was omitted on the eighth and great day of the Festival, probably to suggest their thirst for the greater spiritual blessings the Prophets had spoken of. And on that day Jesus said: "If you're thirsty, come to Me and drink."

His words are an invitation that's aimed at our deepest longing-for happiness, for peace and purpose in our lives. Anyone who's traveled in the desert areas-Death Valley, the Sahara, the Australian Outback-can imagine the danger of someone who's run out of water, from the whipping desert wind to the blazing hot sun which soon dehydrate the body. To have water is life; to be without means death.

Yet, we cannot survive on H₂O alone. There is another kind of thirst, for the heart and mind need to be quenched of spiritual thirst. Jesus knew that the world through which He walked was parched by a force more severe than the power of the desert sun and wind. It was the furious force of rebellion against God, which ruptured the relationship between our first parents and our Creator. And in spite of all the sweat of our brow and our modern technology, we and the land we inhabit remain under the curse of our

rebellion. Because of our own sins, our lives are dehydrated of peace and purpose.

But spiritual thirst isn't easy to recognize. An early Church father, Augustine, once said: "Our souls are restless until they rest in God." But most people don't associate their restlessness with thirst for God. In Matt. 5, Jesus says: "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness." The junk food of gossip and grudges, the delicate delicacies of indecency and infidelity, and the main courses of pride and power-are all poisonous provisions offered as the answer for our hunger by the ruler of this world, Satan. Each of us has been invited to his banquet, and each of us has sampled the menu. Some have gorged themselves, but all our tongues are tainted with the taste of sin. And no amount of 'Scope' can wash away that awful taste! And nothing less than a radically different diet will save us from certain death.

In John 6, Jesus says: "I am the Bread of Life"; in the reading above, He pictures Himself as the Water of Life. This is the only diet that can take away the bad breath of sin! While some may not desire a simple "bread and water" diet, Jesus proclaims Himself as the source of salvation and the means of quenching spiritual hunger and thirst. Spiritual thirst is quenched by coming to Jesus Christ and believing in Him, as God's Spirit (verse 39) holds up our Saviour and Lord before us in the living waters of Baptism, in the bread and wine of the Lord's Supper, and in the Good News of God's mercy in the Bible. The Holy Spirit creates faith in our hearts and minds so that we might receive the good gifts of God.

Those gifts were purchased on the

Cross at Calvary with the precious blood of God's only-begotten Son, where the earth literally shook with the universal consequences of Christ's death for us. All the benefits of Christ's redeeming work - forgiveness of sins, fullness of life, and victory over death - are bestowed by God's Spirit; whom Jesus sent after He rose from the dead and ascended to the right hand of the Father. However, we're not always aware of our spiritual thirst; especially when we think we don't need to grow in grace and God's purpose for our lives. In his first letter, chapter 2, the Apostle Peter says we're to thirst for the pure Word of God - so that we'll grow till we're saved. Then he reminds us: "Surely you have tasted that the Lord is good". When we yearn for forgiveness, when we see that God hasn't yet filled every area of our lives, when we desire to be the kind of person God would have us be - then we are experiencing spiritual thirst. The Psalmist describes those who delight in God's Word of grace in Psalm 1: "He's like a tree planted by streams of water. It produces its fruit in its season, and its leaves don't wither".

In chapter 12, the Prophet Isaiah declares: "Happily you will draw water from the saving fountains. On that day, you'll say: 'Thank The Lord'." We thank Him because He washes away our sins, quenches our thirst, changes our appetite, and like the Garden of Eden - causes our lives to bear good fruit. The Apostle Paul describes this fruit in Galatians 5: "The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and control".

What will YOU do about spiritual thirst? Jesus says: "If you're thirsty, come to Me and drink".

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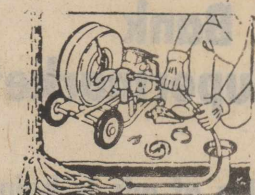

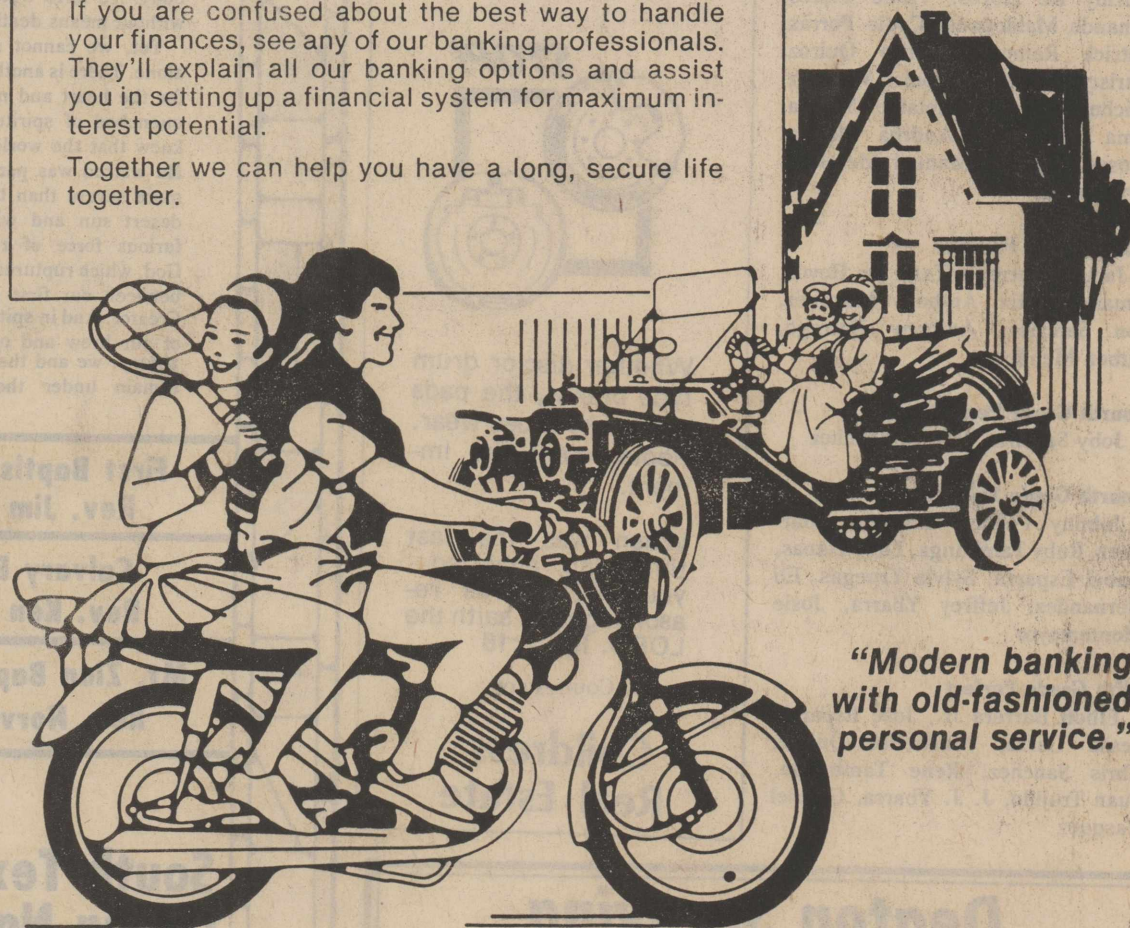
