

Federal Old-Age And Survivor's Insurance Plan

Editor's Note: The following is the first of a series of articles prepared by W. O. King, manager of the Abilene Social Security Board field office, to be published in this paper. Federal Insurance for Wage Earners and Their Families

Out of the changes in the Social Security Act made by Congress last August relate to the provisions for old-age insurance survivors benefits. Three amendments concern almost every family in the United States, in any or another:

- Monthly benefits beginning at 65. This is 2 years earlier than was provided in the original act.

In addition to monthly payments to insured wage earners who are eligible for benefits at the age of 65, monthly benefits will be paid to aged and minor children of these wage earners. Monthly benefits are provided for aged widows, widowers, and for widows with dependent children; and, in some cases, dependent parents of insured wage earners who die.

The wage tax of 1 per cent each on employers and employees remains the same until 1943. That year the tax will not be in effect in 1940, as was provided in the old law.

CHICAGO, Feb. 16.—So-called "growing pains" have no basis in scientific facts and merely constitute another myth handed down from grandpa's day, according to Dr. Joseph L. Love of Austin, Tex. Writing in the February issue of the osteopathic magazine, Dr. Love asserts that when children complain of pains in their legs, the lower part of the back, the neck, or head, the trouble is likely to be caused by an infection or by some structural maladjustment.

Dr. Love recommended early examination by a physician for any growing child who complains of leg or back aches and pains.

FINN DEFEAT BELIEVED TO BE NEAR NOW

Russian might was beginning to tell in a serious way against Finnish bravery today, with reports being received that Soviet forces had cracked through one of the first line defenses of the Karelian Isthmus and that Finns had retreated to their second line. It was not thought that they could hold out much longer against the 50 to 1 odds with which they are faced.

Although they are fighting stoutly, the Finns have abandoned counter attacks, in order to preserve their fast dwindling manpower. Reservists of the classes of 1897 and 1896, men of 43 and 44 years, have already been called to the colors, and women and girls are manning telephones, carrying dispatches, and, in some instances, even grabbing up rifles and aiding in the fighting.

Further to the North advises from Russia state that Red forces have occupied parts of Summa, but these reports are without verification.

Sweden, upon whom Finland had depended for military aid, today declined to lend this aid in an official capacity, though they allowed Swedish volunteers to join the Finnish army. More material aid from France and England is still hoped for by Finland, but it may come too late, as the Russian massed drives are fast turning the tide of battle in most areas.

Series of Developments In Europe Has Caused World To Wonder What, If Anything, Is Now In The Making

A whole series of developments in Southeastern Europe and the Near East has caused the world to wonder what is brewing, if anything, in the Balkans and the Near and Middle East.

The Italian supreme defense council has just ended a series of meetings in which complete plans were mapped for war if it comes in the Southeast.

Turkish authorities in London have received information that Russia has started building fortifications along the Russian-Turkish frontier and along the pipelines which cross from the Caspian to the Black Sea to carry the oil from the Baku fields, Russia's great oil reservoir.

Despite German denials, it is reported persistently that German engineers are helping the Russians in these preparations.

Britain and France are massing troops in Egypt, Palestine and Syria, with probably 600,000 men under arms in that region.

All these preparations are clues to the answer but the answer is far from apparent.

It is only possible to review the many diverse factors which enter into the situation and look for the possibilities.

In the opinion of several experienced United Press correspondents just returned from Europe, the preparations are mainly for defense purposes—just in case. They believe the difficulties which would be encountered would make an attack unprofitable to either side. They concede, however, that nothing is impossible in this war.

As one of them put it: "I am not expecting my house to burn down but I have it insured."

Ferdinand C. M. Jahn, United Press correspondent for many years in the Balkans, Turkey, and the Near East, has just returned to this country.

In his opinion, there is no indication of aggressive plans by either Germany or Russia to attack Rumania, which has been guaranteed by the Allies.

FINNS MAKING GAINS IN SOME SECTORS STILL

WITH THE FINNISH ARMY On the Central Front, Feb. 16.—Finland's silent white ski patrols have smashed a long and determined Russian attempt to break through Mid-Finland and they have threatened another Russian division, the 45th, with destruction, the Finnish commander here said today.

Russian airplanes are dropping ammunition and supplies inside the lines, in indication that large bodies of the Russian troops have been isolated.

The Finns now control the vitally important highway paralleling the frontier between Soumussalmi and Kuhmo, Russian artillery which had bombarded Kuhmo village for weeks is no longer heard and is believed to be withdrawing.

Dreams of the Russian high command to cut Finland in two have been destroyed, according to information which the Finnish commander made public.

This distinguished man promises to emerge as one of the country's most able military minds. It was he who directed the Soumussalmi victory.

(It was believed certain that the commander referred to, who apparently asked that his name be kept secret, was Gen. Kurt Willenius).

The commander told me that the Russians could now have little hope of saving what remained of their 45th division.

Sizeable Russian detachments are still fighting for their lives, assaying local attacks, supported by crack patrols brought here from the Ural Mountains and Siberia. Just how long it will take the Finnish soldiers to smash them was uncertain. But the Finns were confident.

"I might as well tell you, Papa," she said. "I'm not going to that party tonight."

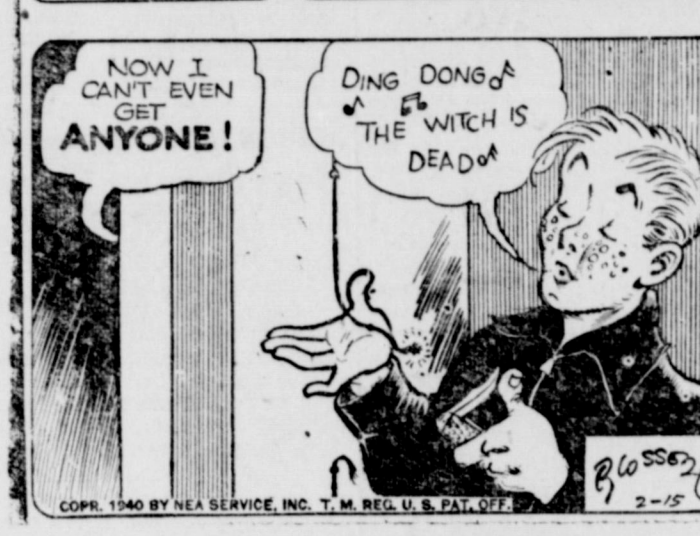
She pressed her lips to keep her self-control.

Playing for Fun

At Union College, in Barbourville, Ky., they're trying a new system of athletics. They're learning to play for fun.

As far as possible, financial aspects have been removed from Union College sports. Admission to all football and basketball games played at home is free. Athletic scholarships are no longer awarded. President Conway Boatman is looking ahead to the day when the school will build a stadium with no fence around it.

The result, Dr. Boatman reported, is a new spirit of sport, better scholarship among participants. And the football team last year didn't do so badly: it won three, lost three and tied one.

Many larger institutions might profitably study this new plan. With commercialism rearing its head throughout the realm of college athletics, football and basketball cease to be games and become deadly businesses instead.

Test Tube Rubber

One of the principal products in which the United States is not self-sufficient is natural rubber. Since the World War, when trade routes were jeopardized and the inflow of raw rubber was slow, this deficiency has been the source of deep concern among scientists and industrialists.

Science has a way of licking problems like these, if given time; and, while American researchers have met with only moderate success in the development of synthetic rubber, word got around that scientists in Germany had hit upon a feasible formula. Rights to use the formula, said to yield a better product than crude natural rubber, have now been assigned to an American firm, and large scale production may soon begin in this country.

It is entirely possible that synthetic rubber will soon come to be used exclusively. At least, we may breathe more easily in the event international complications again tangle up sea routes.
