County receives road money from state

State Treasurer Ann Richards has sent checks totaling \$7.3 million to Texas' 254 counties for road construction and maintenance. Donley County received \$15,328.86.

The Treasurer each year disburses money appropriated by the Legislature for the Lateral Road Program. The grants may be used by counties for the purchase of right-of-way and for construction and maintenance of lateral roads, farm-to-market roads or state highways.

The money is allocated to each county under a formula based on the county's area, rural population and lateral road mileage, Richards said.

Bronchos defeated Floydada 7-0

The Clarendon Broncos defense did not bend and did not break at Floydada Friday night in the 7-0 win for the Broncos. The Winds of Floydada came away with only four first downs and a total offense of only 61 yards. The inconsistent Bronco offense kept the final score close. The Bronco offense ate up 222 yards and 12 first downs.

The Broncos got all the points they needed early in the game. After Brent Hayworth recovered a Floydada fumble on the first play of the game, the Broncos set up shop on the Winds 35 yard line. Leland Howell ran to the 3 yard line on the first play but a clipping penalty moved the ball back to the 40 yard line. The Broncos scored on the third down when Howell hit Daniel Ford with a perfect pass and Ford went in for the TD. Dan Nichols added the point after, and the score read 7-0.

The Broncos moved the ball well the rest of the first half but could not manage to lay the Winds away. Three Bronco drives died around the Winds 30 yard line. The defense continued to cause the Winds to turn the ball over to the Broncos. Russell Alexander had a fumble recovery and Clay Sharp had a pass interception in the first half.

The third quarter was the Winds only bright spot as they got 3 of their 4 first downs and their defense kept the Broncos in the hole. But when it came time to stop the Winds, the Broncos did each time.

The fourth quarter saw the last chance for the Winds fade away after a Bronco turn over put them in business on the Bronco 20 yard line. Alexander threw the runner for a 10 yard loss on a sweep play and with 7 minutes left in the game the Bronco offense came back to life and kept the ball for 6 minutes behind the running of Marcus Smith, Randy Crump, Howell, and Ford. The offensive line of Alexander, Nichols, Don Brogdon, Mike Hook, Steve Phillips, and Robb

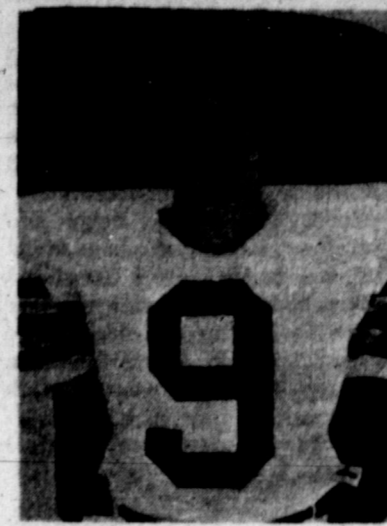

Letter to the Editor

To the People of Armstrong County and the Golden Spread:
 "How do we feel about Jay Kelly Pinkerton's stay of execution."
 This was the question we were confronted with during the wee hours of the morning on August 15, 1985. From 12 o'clock midnight thru 4:45 in the morning, our phone continued to ring. Associated Press correspondents stationed at Huntsville, the U.S. District Judge's office and lawmen, asked the same question.

How do we feel? As the parents of a murdered child, we feel that we have been cheated out of a time of peace and rest within our family, a time for remembering the good things we shared together, a time to bury our grief and leave it there, but most of all, we have been robbed of our rights as a victim of the brutal crime, and the rights of others who have worn our shoes and those who will wear them. As victims of this crime, we have learned a hard lesson, the criminal has the rights.

It took 11 months for the arrest of Pinkerton, when Sarah Donn was murdered and 7 months later for Sherry's murder. Two years later (1982), her trial, and in February 1985, her case was referred to the Texas Court of Appeals in Austin, where it still remains.

In the meantime, the U.S. District Judge, Hayden W. Head, Jr., granted a stay of execution for Sarah Donn's death, allowing him 7 more months to exercise his rights and now the current stay of execution.

Where does justice begin and where does it end? We have found that our lawmen work long and endless hours to put a case together before and during the trial. Two juries, 24 people, found Pinkerton guilty and handed down the death sentences.

Our criminal rights are set-up to

where the criminal has at least 7 to 10 years to exercise his rights with appeals, retrials and stays of execution. These are the times when our family has to pick themselves up, fight back their tears, and try not to remember the brutality of Sherry's death.

In silence I have tried to do something about this, writing letters to Paul Harvey, ABC News, Parents of Murdered Children, Cincinnati, Ohio, and to our State Representative, Foster Whaley.

Now we must speak out. You came to us with your love in the darkness of her dying, with prayers to sustain us during the stresses of her trial, and now we are asking you to stand up and be counted. To write letters

and circulate petitions, stating your concern to our Judges at both Federal and District levels and you, lets send them to our U.S. Supreme Justice, that granted the stay and our President who appoints them. Our Governor Mark White; Attorney General Jim Matton; our State Representatives who make and pass our laws and our lawmen who abide by them. Our news media, 20/20, 60 Minutes, The Donahue Show and ABC News Nightline.

Let your anger be known to them. This could be a start for getting some of our Criminal Rights revised; to stop these long appeals and the numbers of them to guarantee the execution of these types of criminals within a reasonable time after their

trial - within a few months - unless new evidence can be introduced.

Do it now, today, while these senseless deaths are fresh in your mind.

Our laws can be changed if we stand in numbers.

DPS RESPONDS to Questions from Texas drivers about the Safety Belt Law

Q. Who must use safety belts under this state law?

A. All drivers and front seat passengers are required to use them whenever they ride in safety belt-equipped cars or trucks of 1/4-ton capacity and below.

Q. Can I be fined for failing to comply with this law?

A. Yes. Effective December 1, 1985, an offense is punishable by a fine of \$25 to \$50.

Q. Did the child safety seat law change?

A. No. Children under two years of age still must be secured in a federally-approved child safety seat system when they are riding in any seat equipped with a safety belt in a passenger car or light truck (1/4-ton capacity and below). Children from two to four years of age must be secured by a safety belt or child safety seat system when riding in any seat equipped with a safety belt in a car or light truck.

Q. Who would be cited for a violation of the safety belt law?

A. If the unbelted person is under 15 years of age, the driver will receive the ticket. If an unbelted person is 15 or older, that person will receive the citation for the violation.

Q. Are any persons exempted from complying with this law?

A. Yes. The law does not apply to a person who possesses a written statement from a licensed physician stating that for medical reasons, the person is unable to wear a safety belt. Also exempt are U.S. Postal Service employees when they are servicing postal boxes or performing duties for their agency requiring frequent entry and exit from vehicles.

Q. What if the safety belts have been taken out of the car?

A. If safety belt anchoring hardware came as original factory equipment on the car, the belts should be present and in use by front seat occupants riding in the vehicle.

Q. What about older cars and light trucks which came equipped with only lap belts or no safety belts at all?

A. If the older model vehicle did not come equipped with a shoulder strap like the newer models, use of the lap belts alone by front seat riders is permitted. Vehicles not originally equipped with safety belt anchorages are not required to have safety belts.

Q. Can I be cited if there are more people riding in the front seat than there are belts for?

A. No. The law states that each person occupying a seat equipped with a safety belt must be secured by the belt.

As an example, if three persons are riding in the front seat and three belts are provided, all must be buckled in. If only two belts are provided, the two persons in the belted positions must be secured by the belts.

Q. Can residents of other states be cited for breaking this law?

A. Yes. The statute applies to anyone riding in the front seat of the specified vehicles while they are being operated on roads, streets or highways of Texas.

Q. What if the belt doesn't fit?

A. Auto manufacturers have made belt extenders available for larger persons.

FmHA observes 50th anniversary

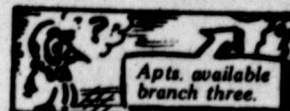
The Farmers Home Administration is observing its 50th anniversary this year, still providing financial assistance to farmers and other rural residents and communities unable to obtain credit from other sources at

Philip C. Madeley, Assistant District Director, said that a total of six loans totaling \$4,426,800.00 have been made in the Amarillo District comprising the North 20 counties of

the Texas Panhandle this year. Of the total, four were rural rental housing loans totaling \$2,611,800.00 for 128 rental units, and two were community loans totaling \$1,815,000 for one water and sewer project.

Farmers Home Administration is the rural credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Its predecessor agency, the Rural Rehabilitation Administration, was created by Presidential Executive Order in 1935. The Farm Security Administration succeeded that agency in 1937 and was renamed the Farmers Home Administration by a 1946 Act of Congress.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Sections 1 and 2 of House Joint Resolution 6 propose a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development bonds.

The additional bonds to be issued will be dedicated for deposit in the Texas Water Development Fund, with \$190 million of those bond proceeds to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition and with \$400 million of those bond proceeds to be used for state participation in the acquisition and development of facilities for storage, transmission, transportation, and treatment of water and wastewater. Of the remaining bonds authorized, \$190 million will be dedicated for use in water quality enhancement projects, and \$200 million will be dedicated exclusively for flood control projects.

The amendment would also allow the legislature to provide for the creation, administration, and implementation of a bond insurance program to which the state pledges up to \$250 million of its general credit to insure payment of the principal of and interest on bonds or other obligations issued by political subdivisions of the state for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, recharge, chloride control or desalinization. Unless authorized to continue by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the Legislature, the bond insurance program will expire on the sixth anniversary of the date on which this section becomes a part of the constitution. Bond insurance issued before expiration of the program will not be affected by such expiration.

The amendment would authorize the legislature to create and appropriate money to special funds in the state treasury to make grants, loans, and other financial assistance available to governmental entities for certain enumerated water planning purposes. Also, the legislature would be permitted to extend the benefits of constitutionally approved water projects to nonprofit water supply corporations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds, to create special water funds for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, subsidence control, recharge, chloride control, agricultural soil and water conservation, and desalinization, to authorize a bond insurance program, and to clarify the purposes for which Texas Water Development Bonds may be issued."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 3 of House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue and sell Texas agricultural water conservation bonds in an

amount not to exceed \$200 million, if authorized to do so by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the legislature. The Texas agricultural water conservation bonds would be general obligations of the State of Texas, and would be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year. The amendment would allow Texas agricultural water conservation bonds to be issued and sold only for four years after the date on which this Act becomes a part of the constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance and sale of \$200 million of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to authorize a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property if such relocation or replacement is done in conjunction with or immediately following the relocation or replacement of water mains serving the property. Any legislative enactment permitting the expenditure of funds for such purposes would authorize the city or town to fix a lien on the property, with the owners' consent, for the cost of relocating or replacing the water laterals, and would provide that such cost shall be assessed against the property, with repayment by the property owner to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years at the rate of interest set by law. Such liens could not be enforced until after five years from the date the liens were affixed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the use of the proceeds from the sale of permanent school fund land to acquire other land for the permanent school fund. Currently, the constitution requires that proceeds from the sale of such land be invested in certain bonds and other securities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing proceeds from the sale of land dedicated to the permanent school fund to be used to acquire other land for that fund."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 89 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts by determining

the services the district must provide, by setting requirements a resident must meet in order to qualify for services, and by determining any other relevant provisions necessary for providing health care to residents.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the State of Texas to enter into an agreement with another state to confine inmates from the state of Texas in penal or correctional facilities of the other state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to permit state prisoners to be placed in penal facilities of another state pursuant to an interstate agreement."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioners court of Chambers County to divide Chambers County into not less than two and not more than six justice precincts. Under current constitutional law, Chambers County may be divided into not less than two and not more than five justice precincts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing Chambers County to be divided into two to six precincts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant an additional \$500 million in bonding authority to the Veterans' Land Board for the veterans' housing assistance program. Under the current constitution, the Veterans' Land Board is authorized by Article III, Section 49-b-1 to issue and sell not more than \$800 million in bonds, \$500 million of which may be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. This amendment would increase that authorization to permit the issuance and sale of up to \$1.3 billion in bonds, \$1 billion of which would be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. In addition, the amendment would remove the current definition of "veteran" from the constitution and permit the legislature to redefine "veteran" as the changing times and circumstances require.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing \$500 million in additional bonding authority for the veterans' housing assistance program and changing the definition of those veterans eligible to participate in the veterans' land program and the veterans' housing program by authorizing the legislature by law to define an eligible veteran for the purposes of those programs."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature either to enact a statute or to attach a rider to the General An-

proprations Act to require prior approval of the expenditure or emergency transfer of any funds appropriated by the legislature to state governmental agencies.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to protect public funds by authorizing prior approval of expenditure or emergency transfer of state appropriations."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which would be deposited in a fund to be known as the farm and ranch finance program fund. The fund would be administered by the Veterans' Land Board and would be used to make loans and provide other financial assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land. The amount of bonds outstanding at any one time would be limited to \$500 million. The principal and interest that becomes due on such bonds in each fiscal year would be paid from amounts remaining in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, with the balance due to be appropriated from treasury revenues in the fiscal year when such amounts become due.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide financing assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 16 proposes a constitutional amendment that would define indictments and informations as instruments charging a person with the commission of an offense, and would delete certain technical requirements as to the form of writs and processes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the manner in which a person is charged with a criminal offense and to certain requirements applicable to state writs and processes."

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the Texas Supreme Court and the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from federal appellate courts. In addition, the two courts would promulgate rules of procedure relating to the review of those questions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment granting the Supreme Court of Texas and the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from a federal appellate court."

PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that would create a board with responsibility for the reapportionment of judicial districts, subject to legislative approval. The amendment would provide for the continued power of the legislature to provide for judicial reapportionment, and would provide that reapportionment

will be the responsibility of the Legislative Redistricting Board if the Judicial Districts Board fails to make a timely reapportionment. The amendment would provide for the creation of judicial districts smaller than a county in counties where the creation of such districts has been approved by the voters at a general election. The amendment would provide for more than one judge for a judicial district. The amendment would rename supreme judicial districts as courts of appeals districts. The amendment would provide that the jurisdiction and terms of court of district and county courts may be as provided by law. The amendment would provide for the jurisdiction of justice courts, which may have additional jurisdiction as provided by law. The amendment would provide for rules of judicial administration and civil procedure to be promulgated by the Supreme Court, and would provide that the legislature may delegate additional rule making power to the Supreme Court or to the Court of Criminal Appeals. The amendment would provide that courts and judges in existence at the time of its adoption remain in existence until otherwise provided by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the reapportionment of the judicial districts of the state by the Judicial Districts Board or by the Legislative Redistricting Board, and providing for the administration and jurisdiction of constitutional courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the office of County Treasurer in Andrews County and transfer the powers and duties of that office to the County Auditor. The amendment would also abolish the office of County Treasurer in El Paso County if, at the statewide election at which this amendment is submitted to the voters, a majority of the voters who vote in El Paso County favor the amendment. The functions of the office of El Paso County Treasurer will be performed by a person employed or designated by the El Paso County Commissioners Court. The amendment also provides for the abolition of the office of County Surveyor in Denton, Randall, Collin, Dallas, El Paso, and Henderson Counties upon approval of such abolition by a majority of the voters who vote on the question at an election called by the commissioners court of the county. If the office of County Surveyor is abolished in any county, the commissioners court may employ or contract with any qualified person to perform the duties of the office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

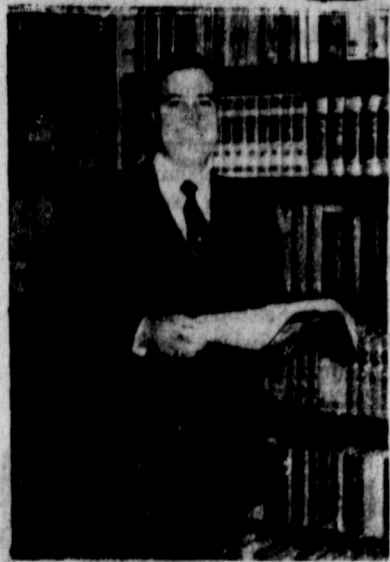
"The constitutional amendment to provide for:

(1) the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Andrews County and El Paso County;

(2) the abolition of the office of county surveyor in Collin, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Henderson, and Randall Counties."

FRIENDSHIP: LET'S MAKE FRIENDS

All of us need friends - people who love us, who accept us with all our faults, people with whom we can be free to laugh and cry, people with whom we can pray, people who edify us and stir us up and inspire us, people who will be loyal to us. Victor Hugo once said, "The greatest happiness of life is the conviction that we are loved, loved for ourselves, or rather loved in spite of ourselves." The Word of God points out the value of having a companion, whether it be husband or wife, child, or dear friend: "There is one alone, and there is not a second; yea, he hath neither child nor brother... This is also vanity, yea, it is sore travail. Two are better than one; because they have a good reward for their labour. For if they fall, the one will lift up his fellow; but woe him that is alone when he falleth; for he hath not another to help him up. Again, if two lie together, then they have heat; but how can one be warm alone? And if one prevail against him, two

shall withstand him; and a threefold cord is not quickly broken" (Ecl. 4:9-12).

CHARACTERISTICS OF TRUE FRIENDSHIP

1. It involves unconditional love. Proverbs 17:17 says, "A friend loveth at all times, and a brother is born for adversity."

2. Friendship involves sharing joy and sorrow. Lord Byron said, "To have joy, one must share it -- happiness was born a twin." Paul admonishes us, "Rejoice with them that do rejoice, and weep with them that weep (Rom. 12:15). Bohm wisely noted, "Friendships multiply joys and divide griefs."

3. Friendship involves acceptance. Proverbs 10:12 says, "Hatred stirreth up strifes; but love covereth all sins." When you love someone, you do not magnify his failures; you dwell on his good points. "He that covereth a transgression seeketh love; but he that repeateth a matter separateth very friends" (Prov. 17:9). Henry Ward Beecher, well-known New York pastor of earlier years wrote: "Every man should have a fair-sized cemetery in which to bury the faults of his friends." Another wise man said, "He who seeks a faultless friend rests friendless."

4. Friendship involves counsel and sometimes even rebuke. Proverbs 27: 5, 6, and 9 emphasize this truth several times. "Open rebuke is better than secret love. Faithful are the wounds of a friend; but the kisses of the enemy are deceitful. Ointment and perfume rejoice the heart: so doth the sweetness of a man's friend by hearty counsel." When he gives counsel or correction, he should speak the truth "in love" and "in private." Leonardo DaVinci said, "Reprove a friend in secret, but praise him before others."

5. Friendship involves prayer. "If two of you shall agree on earth as touching anything that they shall ask, it shall be done for them of my Father which is in heaven" (Matt. 18:19). James 5:16 states, "Confess your faults one to another, and pray one for another, that ye may be healed." Next to the phrase "I love you," the sweetest words a friend can say are "I'm praying for you."

6. Friendship means loyalty. Proverbs 27:10 admonishes, "Thine own friend, and thy father's friend, forsake not." Job's friends had a problem with loyalty. He called his disloyal and insensitive friends "miserable comforters" (Job 16:1) and cried, "Behold, my witness is in heaven, an my record is on high. My friends scorn me: but mine eye poureth out tears unto God" (Job 16:19, 20). I wonder if Job might

have echoed, "With friends like this, who needs enemies?" Friendship means loyalty!

7. Friendship means giving. "Every man will have something to do for his friend, and something to bear within him." Loving and giving are synonyms!

8. Friendship means knowing Christ. That leads me to the final point. Earthly friends will disappoint you; they may be forgetful, or insensitive, or rude, or even dull. But God allows human friendships to fail sometimes in order to remind us that we must seek the Heavenly Friend, the Lord Jesus Himself, "a friend that sticketh closer than a brother" (Prov. 18:24).

Boulter holds town meeting in Hedley

Approximately 50 people met in the Hedley Lion's Den on Friday, September 13, to hear Congressman Beau Boulter. Mr. Boulter is the United States Representative from the 13th Congressional District of Texas.

Introduced by District Director Ernie Houdashell, Mr. Boulter touched on a wide range of subjects, including how the government wastes money in Washington, the trade policies of America, and the farm policies in America.

The only freshman representative member of the Budget Committee, Mr. Boulter is also one of 26 members of the Senate-House Budget Conference Committee.

"At least I know what I'm talking about. I know I'm doing a good job. I'm fighting as hard as anybody can for the traditional values that have made this country great. I am fighting for the basic ideals you believe in. If I could tell you what my basic goal in Congress is, it is to do everything I can to reform all our laws around the traditional family values. We have so many policies in this country that actually undermine the family unit."

"Many of you here tonight make your living from agriculture. I have the best Agriculture Advisory Committee that any Congressman has. James Edward Potts is a member of that committee."

"The farm bill will do very little for you until we take care of the other two things, waste spending in government and the trade policies." Mr. Boulter mentioned several special programs which he feels is

unnecessary and should be abolished. One of these is the Legal Services Corp which is a group of lawyers who are subsidized by the government to represent people who bring suit against school to force busing, people who are in favor of abortion on demand, and others.

Another is the synthetic fuel program which receives government money to engage in research to find ways to produce synthetic fuel. He said, "Let the oil companies do that. They have enough money."

Amtrack is another program which he feels should be self supporting. "It costs the taxpayers \$38.00 every time a passenger boards an Amtrack train. These are just some of the special programs that need to be eliminated or at best reduced."

When asked about the postal service, he replied, "The postal service is, in my opinion, one of the only services that is legitimate. I'm not in favor of closing any rural post office. The REA is another service that is taken care of. It is one of the most necessary services in my district. There's a chance that the rural areas may make a come-back some day and the REA will be vital to it."

Mr. Boulter mentioned the Grace Commission. He said, "The Grace Commission is a group of private citizens who used their own money to make a study of waste spending in the Federal Government and they made a list of 247 ways to cut waste spending. They showed how the government can save \$424 billion in the next three years. Of course, the people in government are not in favor of the Grace Commission. Neither are those who are in charge of military spending. I am in favor of a strong national defense. I am not in favor of spending millions of dollars of your money foolishly."

Bill Hill was instrumental in setting up the town hall meeting in Hedley. He is the County Campaign Manager for Donley County.

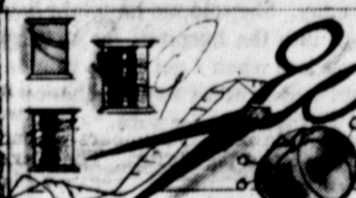

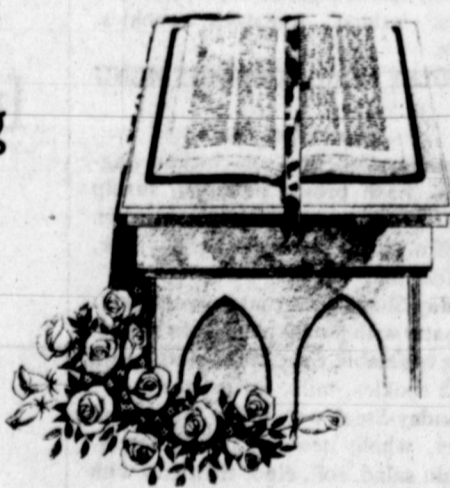

Don't really know where the month of September went - but next Tuesday, September 24th is Birthday/Anniversary supper night, 6 p.m., at the Center. Hope to see you there.

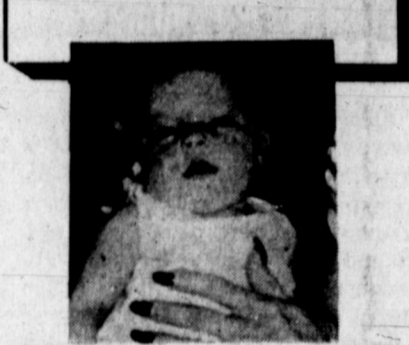

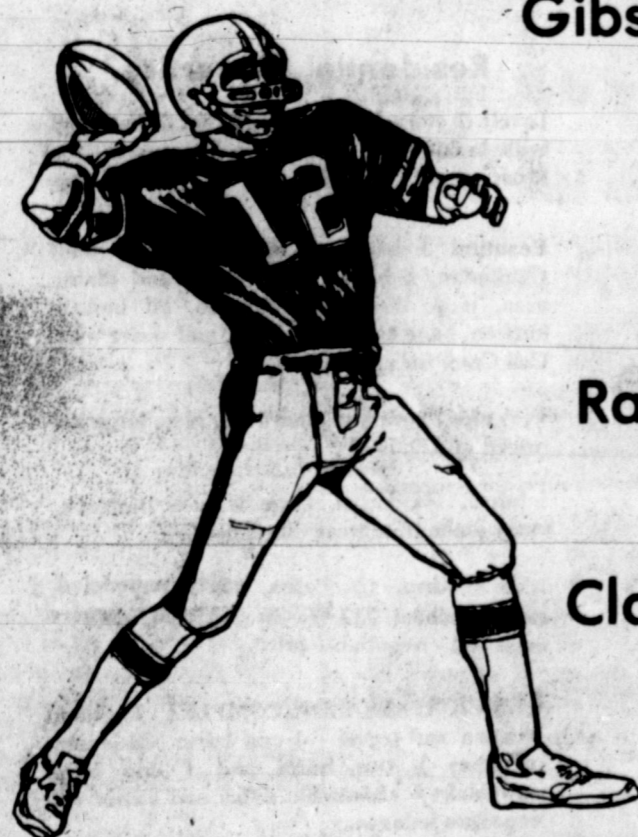

THE IMPORTANCE OF TRIALS
If you are a Christian, ask yourself these things. When I came to Christ, did all of my problems disappear? What problems (trials) am I facing right now? Does God have His hand in these trials? Do the problems that I face make me want to quit the Christian life, or do they draw me closer to God?

One of the most troubling experiences you can go through as a Christian is to encounter a real trial or problem in your life. Many people seem to think that once you get saved, life will become a bed of roses. People forget that a rosebush is also full of thorns. The Bible makes it very clear that our faith will be tried (1 Peter 4:12).

Let's take a moment to define what we mean by trials. Trials are those problems that arise from forces outside ourselves, that affect our lives, and yet catch us powerless to do anything to change the situation which results. They are a tryout to test quality, value or usefulness.

Here is a list of some of the trials that you as a Christian may face:

1. You may encounter school problems.
2. You may encounter people who will be against you because you are a Christian.
3. You may experience financial problems.
4. You might encounter social problems.
5. You could experience physical pain that you do not understand the reason for.
6. Your boyfriend or girlfriend might have broken it off with you.
7. It may be that God would allow you as a Christian to be involved in a terrible car wreck? You mean God would allow you as a Christian to get sick? You mean God would allow people to say bad things about you because you believe in Him? Would God actually allow problems to arise in my life? The answer is yes! Next week we will see why God allows us as His children to experience trials.
