Heavy Vote Reelects Trustees Saturday

A near record vote was polled in Saturday's trustee election. Incumbent trustees E. W. Cade Jr. were reelected, with Cade leading the ticket with 341 votes. Fowler polled 334 and the opposing candidates Bobby Smith 164 and Glen Gurben 157.

Supply of ballots was exhausted and several late voters used typed ballots.

In County Trustee election Roger Smith was elected along with Roy Noles and Kermit, incumbents, both of Roby.

Burleson Makes Statement For Reelection to Congress

Omar Burleson, veteran Congressman from the 17th District, today pledged a vigorous, active campaign for the Democratic Primary nomination for re-election.

In announcing his plans to seek re-election, Burleson stated he will base his campaign on his record of nearly 20 years service in Congress.

"In that time, I have never been a 'yes man' to anyone or any group, but have fulfilled my responsibility to vote on each issue for what I thought was in the best interest of our Country, or State, and our District; people have the right to expect no less," Burleson said.

Burleson is among the senior members of the U. S. House of Representatives in point of service.

His seniority has carried him to the Chairmanship of the potent House Administration Committee, and to the second position to the Chairman on the powerful House Foreign Affairs Committee. In addition, Burleson serves on two important Joint Committees formed from senior members of the House and Senate, as chairman of one and Vice-Chairman of the other.

"In all my years in Congress," Burleson said, "I have followed two guiding principles: First, to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions as their Representative. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect our District, our State, and the Nation."

Burleson termed his approach to government as one of "common sense," gained through his years of public service.

Burleson is a former County Attorney and County Judge of Jones County. He was appointed an FBI Agent, and served in a number of assignments over the U. S. He resigned from the FBI to join the Navy in World War II, with duty in both the Atlantic and the Pacific.

As a leader in Congress, Burleson has consistently urged the return to a sounder fiscal policy and the cutting of unnecessary and extravagant federal spending.

"I have tried to see that your tax money is spent as wisely, and as judiciously, as you would have spent it had you been in my place," Burleson said. "The record will definitely show that on many occasions I have found myself in the minority—especially on needless spending of the taxpayers' money. I am proud that I have never failed to exercise the right to vote and to do as I thought best."

"At every session of Congress, I have voted for expenditures below that recommended by the Executive Department, and far below that actually appropriated by the Congress, except in the field of National Defense," Burleson said.

"When it comes to the defense of this Country, I have always voted for those things calculated to make and to keep our Nation stronger than any other in the World," he said.

Burleson said he feels there are those other things for which the Government was designed and, of course, it costs money. "Such things

Students Test Vehicle Brakeage At 20mph

A braking-reaction demonstration was given by the Texas Department of Public Safety for the high school student body, on Wednesday, March 30. Don Sexton and Byrde Thomas exhibited the distance it takes to think, react, and then stop.

The automobile used was equipped with a device which marks the pavement when the signal to stop is given, when the brake is applied, and when the car stops.

At a speed of 20 mph, Don required 13.4' to react; and then 19' 2", in addition, to stop. Byrde's reaction distance was 15' 10" and brakeage, 19' 10".

Patrolman Walter Wood demonstrated the reaction and brakeage distance required at 40 mph; with 25 feet to react and 83 feet to stop. A significant fact was that the brakeage distance at 40 mph was over four times that at 20 mph.

The patrolman pointed out the fact that 98% of all Texas accidents involve a broken law and hoped to impress young drivers with the difference and increase of speed can make on the chances of having an accident.

Proclamation

THE WHITE HOUSE
CANCER CONTROL MONTH, 1966
by The President of The United States of America

A Proclamation
Every two minutes cancer strikes a man or a woman or a child in this country.

It ranks second in the cause of all deaths.

This represent untold human suffering, pain, and hardship, as well as a staggering loss to our economy.

Scientists, physicians, and official and voluntary health agencies, through research and cancer-control programs, have made remarkable progress in reducing this heavy toll. Their efforts deserve the most widespread commendation and encouragement.

Further progress can be made if we unite all our Nation's health resources. Recent advances in biomedical research indicate that an expanded attack on cancer may lead to its ultimate conquest.

The Eighty-ninth Congress has given us the tools for such an expanded attack. It has enacted legislation to promote the establishment of regional medical programs of research, training, and demonstrations of patient care aimed at combatting cancer and other such major diseases.

These programs will enable us to develop new knowledge of cancer and to make available to patients the latest advances in diagnosis and treatment.

Any program for the prevention and control of cancer requires the support and cooperation of all our people. For this reason, the Congress, by a joint resolution of March 28, 1938 (52 Stat. 148), requested by President to issue annually a proclamation setting apart the month of April as Cancer Control Month.

Now, therefore, I, Lyndon B. Johnson, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim the month of April 1966 as Cancer Control Month; and I invite the Governors of the States, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, and other areas subject to the jurisdiction of the United States to issue similar proclamations.

I also ask the medical and allied health professions, the communications industries, and all other interested persons and groups to unite during the appointed month in public reaffirmation of this Nation's efforts to control cancer.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington this fourteenth day of February in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and sixty-six, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and ninety-ninth.

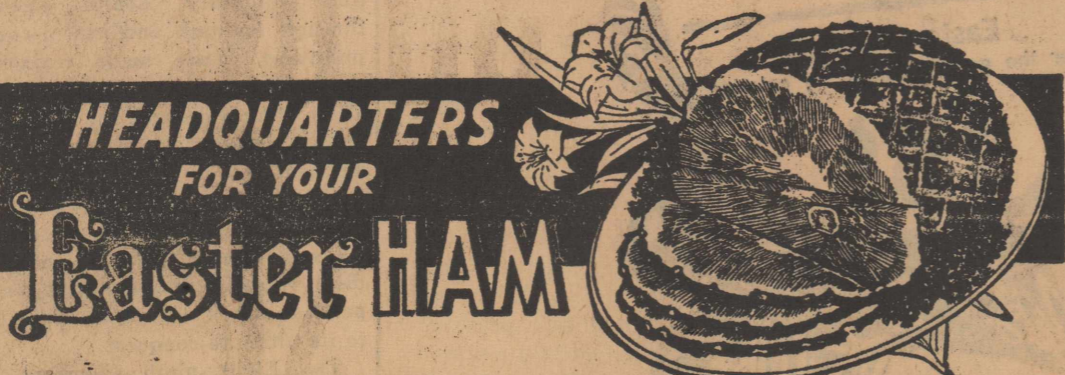

as the conservation of our natural resources -- caring for God's gifts to people that they may be preserved for future generations," he said.

Burleson also said that the individual, groups of individuals or local governmental entities are unable to cope with matters of flood control and, in many cases, an adequate water supply. "We have got to look to the future if our area progresses. For one thing, this means water is a priority concern."

"The Federal Government has assisted our area in numerous respects in coping with some of these problems. We have our share of flood control projects and our share of attention to those now in the planning stage. An example is the effort to find an answer to the flood threat in Abilene and several other places.

"An example of other Federal activity in our area is, of course, our military installations, new Post Office buildings and other Federal interests which are proper and needed."

Further, Burleson said that he "certainly subscribes to the idea that the Government should help elderly and those people who are unable to help themselves."

Burleson has been an implacable foe of the constant encroachment of the Federal Government into the area of State and local affairs.

"As the Federal Government has grown to its colossal proportions, the threat of centralized power in Washington has increased," Burleson pointed out. "To this, I am opposed, as my actions have proved."

"Big Government and high taxes are the result of many activities of the Federal Government which should be reserved to the States. Big Government with its far-flung operations has created needless waste and extravagance."

Burleson stated he was proud of the "trust and confidence placed in me by the people who send me to Congress -- and to violate that trust in any respect would be unthinkable."

He urged residents of the 17th District not familiar with his background of service to investigate the record he has made -- "And if you believe I have been faithful to duty and worthy of your continued support, then your active participation in my campaign will be greatly appreciated."

Well-known throughout Texas, Burleson is a native of the 17th District. He was born and raised on a farm between Anson and Stamford in Jones County. He attended rural school, and graduated from Anson High School. Following graduation, Burleson attended Abilene Christian College, Hardin-Simmons University, and graduated from Cumberland Law School. Later, he studied post-graduate law at the University of Texas.

Burleson married Ruth DeWeese, daughter of Reverend R. D. De Weese, who pastored Baptist Churches in West and South Texas.

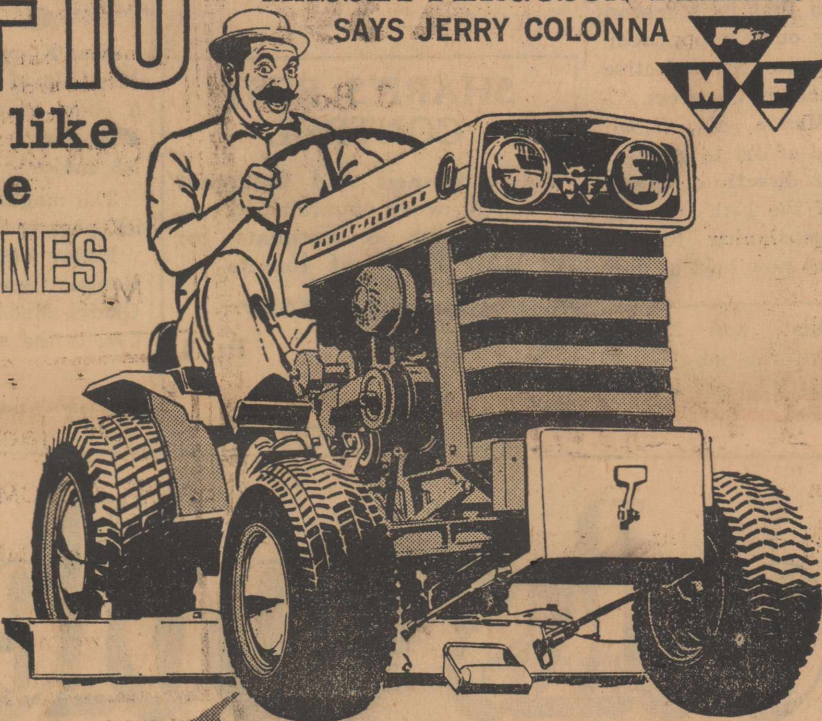

Purebred Bulls are worth more in a crossbreeding program according to research at Texas A&M University's Livestock and Forage Center near McGregor.

Walter Kruse, animal husbandman at the Center, says crossbreeding offers for the first time a truly sophisticated method to prove the value of a purebred bull.

In one test at McGregor, crossbred cows, half Hereford and Half Brahman, were mated with a purebred Hereford bull. At the same time, Hereford cows were mated to a crossbred, half Hereford and half Brahman, bull. The calves from both matings had the same genetic make-up—three-fourths Hereford and one-fourth Brahman.

What happened? Calves from the purebred bull and crossbred cows weighed a good 40 pounds more at 180 day weaning time.

Kruse says this illustrates a vital point to cattlemen—how the cross is made is the key to higher weaning weights. He says A&M research at McGregor has shown time and again that purebred bulls and crossbred cows are the money making combination.

Weeds can reduce pasture and range yields by as much as 50 percent.

They reduce pasture and hay yields by competing with the desirable plants for nutrients, moisture and light. They lower hay quality, harbor insects and diseases and increase labor and equipment costs.

Unpalatable weeds, such as sandbur and bullnettle, are low-quality forage and unpalatable—this prevents proper utilization of pasture and hay by animals.

Weed control by chemical or mechanical methods can up forage quality and yields. But weed control is no substitute for proper fertilization and management of adapted plants.

There are some cases where weed control is not profitable:

When desirable grasses or legumes will not replace weeds killed, the soil fertility level is too low to support a good stand and growth of desirable grasses or legumes, the plants are kept grazed or cut so close they are not vigorous enough to resist weed invasion or when removal of the weed canopy results in damage to the grass and soil from severe sun baking.

The best weed control is weed prevention. Some ideas for preventing weeds in pastures are:

Plant the right amount of seed at the proper time, management is important, keep fence rows and roadsides clean, clean combines thoroughly to prevent bringing in weed seed, do not buy feed containing live weed seed, rotate crops, and mow, spray or cultivate to kill any weeds that get started; most weeds are killed easily when they are young and have small root systems.

Weed control is a good investment—it can pay off with better pastures and forage.

Community Improvement — Reagan Brown, Extension sociologist at Texas A&M University, reports the search is underway to find the state's most progressive community. He says 233 communities, involving approximately 50,000 families, are enrolled in the Texas Community Improvement Program, a new record high. Judging first on the county basis then district and finally on state basis will end the search, Brown said. The state winner will be known in late May.

Defence-Disaster Meet At Sweetwater April 14

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.)—Defense and disaster relief will be the subject of a three-hour conference to be conducted in Sweetwater, Thursday night, April 14, 1966.

The conference will be held at the County Health Unit, 12 and Elm, beginning promptly at 7:00 p. m. Registration will begin at 6:30 p. m.

Nelson Geron, Civil Defense Director for Sweetwater-Nolan County, said the conference would include 10 counties in this area, County Judges and commissioners, mayors and councilmen, Civil Defense directors, members of city and county government services, school officials, and business and industrial leaders are expected to attend.

In addition to Nolan, representatives are expected from Callahan, Fisher, Jones, Kent, Mitchell, Scurry, Shackelford, Stonewall, and Taylor Counties.

"Although the conference is directed to local government officials, all persons interested in defense and disaster relief are invited to attend," Geron said.

Primarily, the conference will point up defense and disaster relief responsibilities of local government officials, and provides other information that is valuable to the community in normal times or during periods of stress or tension.

Geron commented, "This information will be of value in disaster from natural causes, or in the event of nuclear chaos."

The program includes a demonstration on the effects of radiation, the development of shelter in new school construction, organization for defense and disaster relief, and the channels for obtaining State and Federal assistance when it might be needed.

The conference, one of 20 being conducted throughout the State, is presented in an interesting and educational form through the use of films and color slides. It is conducted by the Civil Defense training staff of Texas A&M University's Engineering Extension Service in cooperation with the State Office of Defense and Disaster Relief, Texas Department of Public Safety.

Participating in the conference will be Dr. W. R. Bodine, Gus White, and Larry Fisher, all of Texas A&M University; and John Christian,

Mahon For Congress Headquarters Opened

The District campaign headquarters of Mahon-for-Congress in Abilene were officially opened Saturday morning at 10:30 A. M., with a ribbon-cutting ceremony.

Cutting the ribbon was Abilene mayor W. Lee Byrd, who said, "I have cut a lot of ribbons for a lot of enterprises, and they have nearly all been successful. I feel like the same will be said for this one."

After the ribbon-cutting, a capacity audience heard a number of folk songs by the "West Four," a popular folk-singing group from Abilene.

A brief address was made by Jack Calloway, area campaign chairman, and the candidate, Eldon Mahon, was introduced by Bill Leach, Taylor County co-chairman.

In his address to the crowd, Mahon stated that he would have to have their help to win, since "a man can go only as far as his friends help him go."


In other remarks, Mahon cited his opponent's voting record in Congress, saying, "He has invited us to look at his record, so let's do that." He then referred to his opponent's lack of ability to get legislation passed; his lack of major committee assignments; and his lack of "effective" seniority.

Of his opponent's committee assignments, Mahon said one was a "house-keeping" committee concerned with auditing, printing and parking in the Capitol area. The other committee, the House Foreign Affairs Committee, is a minor one also, Mahon said, since foreign affairs policy is determined by the President with the advice and consent of the Senate Foreign Affairs Committee.

Concerning his opponent's seniority, Mahon stated that it is "chronological" seniority only, not a "real" seniority characterized by effectiveness and influence in Congress. "If I am elected," Mahon said, "I will make unconcerted effort to get on a committee that is directly concerned with problems of the 17th District."

Mahon is campaigning for the Congressional seat now held by Rep. Training Specialist, and Kenneth Tooley, Public Information Officer, both of the State Office of Defense and Disaster Relief.

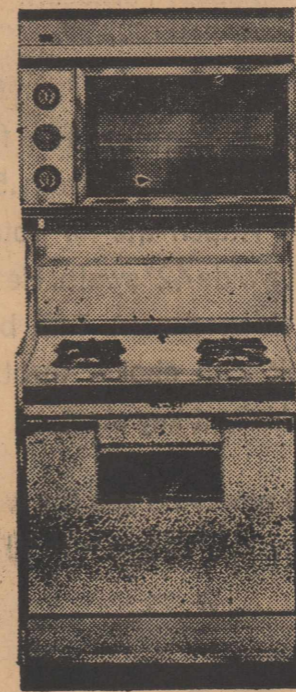

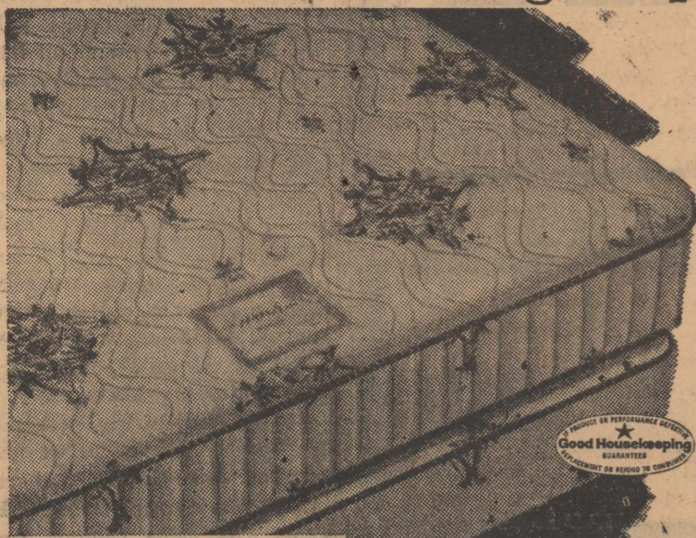

Health and Safety Tips From AMA

If your blood has too few cells or too little hemoglobin, you have anemia. Hemoglobin is the red coloring substance in the red cells.

A favorite self-diagnosis by people who do not feel well is anemia. Although more often than not this sort of diagnosis is completely wrong, anemia is a serious health problem.

The symptoms of anemia typically include fatigue, shortness of breath, lack of energy and a generally washed out feeling. However, the presence of one or more of these symptoms does not justify a self-diagnosis of anemia.

Anemia can have various causes — improper diet, poor absorption of food, excessive or chronic bleeding, injury to the bone marrow, certain parasites and infections. Whatever the cause, it isn't safe to make your own diagnosis and to treat yourself. Only a physician can determine what is causing your anemia, and can then prescribe treatment.

The function of the hemoglobin in your blood is to pick up oxygen from the air you breathe in and carry it to all your body tissues, as well as to carry carbon dioxide from tissues to the lungs to be breathed out. If anemia reduces the number of red cells and the amount of hemoglobin, the blood can't carry enough oxygen to supply your body's needs.

Unless you have some abnormal condition, you can prevent nutritional anemia by eating a variety of nourishing foods. There are all sorts of products on the market that are advertised to supplement your diet and correct nutritional deficiencies. None should be used unless you have been examined by a doctor and he has prescribed some particular product for your particular deficiency. Otherwise, the odds are great that you are wasting your money, with the risk of overdosing yourself with more nutrients than your body needs.

If you suspect that you are anemic, see your doctor. He will first determine whether you actually are anemic, and, if so, what is the cause. Then he will be able to prescribe treatment.
