County Residents Concerned About Kin In Middle East

Families in Tahoka and the surrounding area have reported their sons and daughters, brothers and sisters, and other family members involved in the U.S. deployment of military forces to the Persian Gulf or on standby status, waiting for orders to go to the military hot spot. U.S. forces were called to take stock of the situation after Iraq overran Kuwait on Aug. 2. Diplomatic efforts to resolve the month-long crisis are still stalemated and U.S. servicemen and women are being sent from throughout the United States to the gulf area.

In Tahoka, Mrs. Jerry Isbell (Janie), who has a son in the Air Force who received a call to go to the Middle East, and then was put on standby status, has spearheaded an effort to show support for the military by showing U.S. colors with red, white and blue ribbons tied on trees, light posts, houses, cars, etc. Yellow ribbons show that a family member is in the military.

"We need to show support for our military over there," Mrs. Isbell said. "Our children (and other family members) are being sent, and I'm scared for them. They need to know that we are thinking of them, that their hometown is concerned," she added. "People here who have other family members in the military (who are not from Tahoka) need the support of their friends here. Even if their military sons and daughters are not in Iraq, there is always the possibility that they will be sent over."

Mrs. Isbell enlisted the aid of Tahoka Chamberettes and the VFW Post, who are sharing the cost of the ribbons to give away to supporters, and who, along with other interested citizens, tied ribbons to the evergreen tree on the lawn of the Lynn County Courthouse and on the memorial triangle downtown. Also, Rudy Fuentes, commander of the VFW Post in Tahoka, enlisted the aid of city employees to tie bows up high on several light posts in downtown Tahoka. The two local flower shops, Balloons and Flowers and Tahoka Flowers, donated the ribbons for the trees on the courthouse lawn.

Mrs. Isbell is an employee at Tahoka Drug, which is the pickup site for the free ribbons. She reported that last Thursday after the local paper came out (with a story about the ribbon support program) that there was a steady stream of people all day who wanted ribbons, and that by Saturday she had given away all the ribbons she had. Haney Wells, owner of the drug store, is this week donating more ribbon to the cause, so

that people who were turned away may come back and get their ribbons. Mrs. Isbell said she will ask other organizations to donate funds for more ribbons, also.

People in rural areas in the county are also encouraged to show support, by placing ribbons near their homes in the country. "Just because they don't live in town, there's no reason they shouldn't have the same opportunity of showing support," said one supporter of the program.

"I was so pleased to see the people of Tahoka responding to this show of support," said Mrs. Isbell. "I keep hoping every day that this (crisis) will be resolved and our military can come home, but it looks like that's not going to happen yet. All we can do is hope and pray," she added.

At Tahoka Drug, there is a list of servicemen and women who are from Tahoka, or members of families in Tahoka, and this list will be published in *The Lynn County News* as additions are made. One of the men on the list is Gerard Rodriguez, who is the nephew of Mrs. Helen Saldaña of Tahoka, and he has already been deployed to the Persian Gulf. He is in the 82nd Air Borne Division who was stationed in North Carolina, which was one of the first divisions shipped to the Persian Gulf in early August. Mrs. Saldaña reported that in letters she has received, he says the men have plenty of food and water, but that the heat is pretty bad during the day. By evening, he says, the temperature has cooled enough to get some rest during the night. "They're just sitting and waiting," said Mrs. Saldaña. "They're just supposed to be there."

Other servicemen and women from Tahoka (or from families in Tahoka) who are already stationed in the Persian Gulf are Joe Hernandez and Fritz Speckman, Jr., in the Marines; James Maret and Billy Selman, Jr., in the Navy; and Mitchell Hammonds, Minerva Mecalco and Joe L. Castillon, in the Air Force.

Military personnel from families in Tahoka, most of whom are on standby status for deployment to the Middle East, include Berry Gandy, Raymond Barrientez, Esmal Cantu, Jr., Armando Rodriguez, Lupe Aleman, Jr., Daniel Ortiz, Mario Avila, Jimmy Antu, E. Frain Baez, Glociro Martinez, Jesse Ramirez, Jr., Stoney Thomas, Antonio (Tony) Garcia, Curtis Tillman, E.C. Tillman, Dale Stephens, Malcolm Chancy, Robert Sanchez, Charles Sanchez, Lupe Saldaña, John Saldaña and James Cawman, all in the U.S. Army; Clay Dunham and Larry Doss, both in the Marines; Tommy L. Tejada, and Al Saldaña and his wife Nola, all in the Navy; Scott Isbell and Jeremy Saldaña, both in the Air Force; and Dan Reid, in the National Guard.

According to Mrs. Isbell, there is a possibility of a "hometown effort" to send letters and cards to these military personnel, depending upon how long the Middle East crisis involves the U.S. military.

"For those who did not get ribbons, we now have more so please come by and get them," urged Mrs. Isbell. "Also, we want to keep adding the names of military personnel from Tahoka families to our list. The names of new additions to the list will be given to the newspaper, also," she said.

City Of Tahoka Latest To Seek Tax Increase

Tahoka property owners for the third week in a row have been advised that someone is going to raise their taxes. This time the City of Tahoka is announcing action to increase taxes by 3.1 cents per \$100 valuation, a smaller amount than increases announced earlier by the Tahoka school district and by Lynn County.

The tax rate for the city is to be raised from 51.1 cents per \$100 valuation to 54.28 cents, according to a notice in this issue of *The News* which announces a public hearing will be held on the issue at 7 p.m. next Monday.

Average value of a home in the city is listed as \$24,150. A homeowner whose house is valued at that amount would pay \$7.53 more on his/her tax bill (an increase from \$123.57 to \$131.10).

The percentage amount of the proposed increase by the city is 6 per cent.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON TAX INCREASE

The City of Tahoka will hold a public hearing on a proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in 1990 by 6%. Your individual taxes may increase at a greater or lesser rate or even decrease, depending on the change in the taxable value of all other property.

The public hearing will be held on September 10, 1990 at 7:00 p.m. at City Hall.

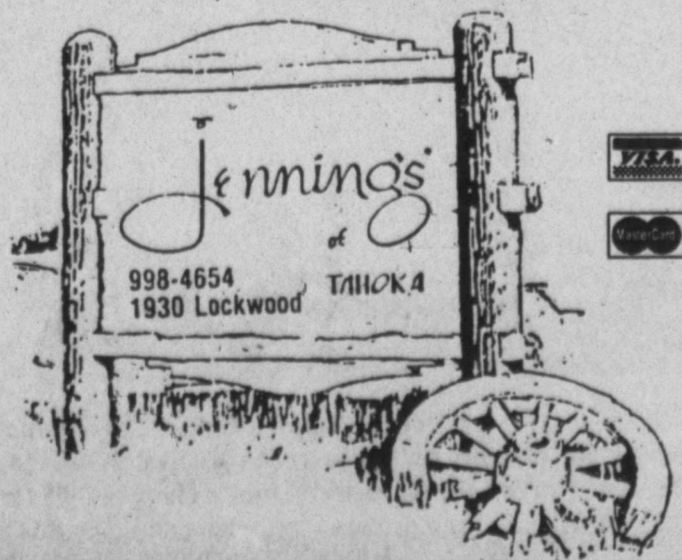
Under this proposal taxes on the average home would increase by \$7.53 or 6% (percent) compared with last year's taxes.

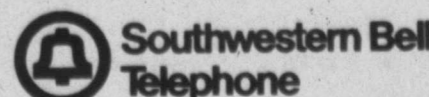
