## City gives \$5K for crisis center, will buy dozer

The Hereford City Commission voted to give \$5,000 to the Domestic Violence-Rape Crisis Center and decided that a city bulldozer needed replacing at its Monday night meeting.

JoAnn Dwyer, a representative with the crisis center, stated that the Domestic Violence-Rape Crisis Center has aided more than 100 victims since the center opened May 1, 1987.

"We've seen children abused by teachers, ice cream men and neighbors. It's amazing to see a 5-year-old kid get on the witness stand and send a man to TDC for 15 years for sexual assault," said Dwyer.

The city also authorized City Manager Darwin McGill to prepare specifications for bids on a used bulldozer to replace the 1976 model bulldozer which had been overhauled twice in the past three years.

The bulldozer now is requiring other repairs which would total \$20,000.

McGill said that the used bulldozer will probably cost \$40,000 to \$50,000, and since the bulldozer is not a

budgeted item, the city will purchase the used bulldozer with the \$56,000 allotted for a garbage truck.

The commissioners met in executive session to review the 10 applications for the municipal judge slot to be vacated by Judge JoED Cupell July 31.

Applications will be taken through June 10 and applicants are required to have worked in law enforcement for three years or to have worked as a judge in either a district, county, justice of the peace or municipal court for three years.

City attorney Earnest Langley stated that the requirements for employment have changed over the years since municipal judges are having to deal with more laws.

The commissioners also discussed the possibility of purchasing blue police officer uniforms for the Hereford Police Department, shedding the current green uniforms.

McGill suggested that the city pay \$600 monthly and provide the uniforms for the 23 police officers. The city currently issues a \$50 monthly clothing allowance for each police officer.

This item will be placed on the agenda at a later date.

## Dodd man killed in wreck

A Dodd man was killed Monday south of Hereford in Castro County after the cattle truck he was driving hit an extension blade on a county-owned maintainer, jacking the truck and causing a small fire.

Ralph Cook, 46, was pronounced dead at 10:07 a.m. Monday at Deaf Smith General Hospital from injuries he received when he was thrown from the cab of his Peterbilt tractor.

Receiving a shoulder injury was Gordon Stokes, 32, of Dimmitt, the maintainer operator.

Castro County Department of Public Safety Trooper Ron Morgan said the truck, which had a full load of cattle, and the maintainer were northbound on FM 1055 about seven miles south of Hereford when Cook pulled out to pass the maintainer.

The truck driver clipped the extension blade on the maintainer with his right front tire and wheel, spinning the maintainer about three-fourths of a turn and causing Cook to lose control of the truck.

As the truck jacked up, the cab buckled, ejecting Cook from the cab. The tractor's fuel tanks were ruptured and caused a small fire. DPS and other safety officials at

the scene said that while Cook would have been injured, the injuries might not have been fatal if Cook had been wearing a seat belt.

"There was room in there to live," said Gary Whitfill, a DPS officer from Hereford. Some of the cattle in the double-deck trailer were injured, but they were off-loaded into another truck.

## Last primaries scheduled today

Primary voters today narrow the fields in four U.S. Senate races, choose nominees for governor of Montana and pick a black Democratic candidate for the New Jersey congressional seat occupied by Peter Rodino for 40 years.

In other highlights of voting in seven states, Californians decide a large crop of propositions, including a measure sponsored by supporters of extremist Lyndon LaRouche that would permit the state to quarantine AIDS victims. Sacramento voters could become the first in the nation to close a nuclear power plant, the troubled Rancho Seco; and voters in San Bernardino County — the nation's largest — will decide whether to carve away the eastern, desert portion to create a new county called Mojave.

In San Diego, the nation's seventh-largest city, Mayor Maureen O'Connor is expected to win a four-year term by gaining a majority in the nonpartisan primary. She was first elected two years ago after Mayor Roger Hedgecock was convicted of a felony and forced to resign.

Both of the nation's first-term Democrats are among the senators with a stake in today's races, and both have been targeted as vulnerable by the national GOP. Frank Lautenberg of New Jersey has

two little-known primary opponents, and Jeff Bingaman of New Mexico has none.

New Jersey Republicans have united behind a single nominee, Peter Dawkins, a former Heisman trophy winner, Rhodes scholar and Vietnam war hero who moved to the state to enter the race.

But in New Mexico, four Republicans are competing for the chance to face Bingaman. A poll taken last week for the Albuquerque Journal showed state Sen. Bill Valentine leading the field with support of 29.5 percent of Republicans, but 38.9 percent were undecided.

A third first-term senator seeking re-election is Republican Pete Wilson of California. He has no primary competition, but does have a jinx to worry about — for 30 years, no one holding his Senate seat has been elected more than once. On the Democratic side, Lt. Gov. Leo McCarthy is expected to dispatch three little-known opponents.

Montana also has a Senate race, with two-term Democrat John Melcher opposed in the primary by attorney Robert Kellshur, who advocates a parliamentary form of government. Yellowstone County Commissioner Conrad Burns is the only GOP entrant.

### Girl allegedly sexually assaulted

Police are investigating aggravated sexual assault case in which an 8-year-old girl says she was sexually penetrated by a 17-year-old boy on two occasions last summer in the 300 block of Douglas Street.

Reports state that the 8-year-old said the assaults occurred when she stayed the night with the accused's younger sister.

Debi Hathaway, a nurse at Northwest Texas Hospital, examined the girl and stated that her vagina had been torn.

The girl reported the sexual assault after seeing the We Help Ourselves (WHBO) program at school, an anti-victimization program which points out ways a child can be abused.

## Hispanics, blacks score better in 'three Rs'

# Minority students fare well

AUSTIN (AP) — Intensified work on basic skills is helping to narrow the gap between test scores of Texas minority students and their classmates, educational leaders say. "We've got a lot further to go, but actually the gap has been closing for a period of years," said William Kirby, Texas education commissioner.

statewide test results for the second consecutive year.

"We want to attribute the increase to better-quality instruction," said Marvin Veselka, the Texas Education Agency's assistant commissioner for assessment and evaluation.

Kirby and other top educators were pleased by recently released results of the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills test that show a growing percentage of black and Hispanic students are mastering math, reading and writing skills in the third, fifth, seventh and ninth grades.

Minority students improved in all categories in the four grades, except in the ninth-grade reading category. Their improved scores helped raise

Despite the gains in achievement, scores for both minority groups still lag behind those of white students.

For example, 82 percent of white fifth-grade students mastered all TEAMS tests, while 60 percent of the Hispanic and black students passed the test this year.

In comparison, 68 percent of the white students passed the reading, writing and math sections in 1986, compared to 43 percent of the Hispanic students and 42 percent of the black pupils.

A number of factors are thought to have caused the improved student performance.

In the 1985-86 school year, Texas

for the first time implemented a statewide curriculum that told teachers not only what subject to teach but which "essential elements" to teach within the course.

## Aide paid government money to oversee book

WASHINGTON (AP) — An aide to House Speaker Jim Wright was paid \$2,000 from official congressional accounts for expenses during a 1984 trip to Texas to oversee final editing of a privately published book by Wright, House records show.

The book, "Reflections of a Public Man," published by a longtime Fort Worth friend of the speaker, later brought Wright nearly \$55,000 in royalties.

Matthew Cossolotto, who has since left Wright's staff, said in a telephone interview Monday that the Texas trip was the culmination of several months of on-and-off work in Wright's Capitol Hill office to help the Texas Democrat draft the book's manuscript.

House ethical guidelines allow wide latitude in the use of staff members, but stipulate that "Employees may not be compensated from public funds to perform nonofficial, personal or campaign activities on behalf of the member."

Records maintained by the House show \$2,078.27 paid to Cossolotto for hotel accommodations "while on official business," car rental and meals from Oct. 22 to Nov. 14, 1984, when Cossolotto said he was in Fort Worth to complete work on the book.

At the time, Wright was House majority leader, the No. 2 leadership post.

Cossolotto said he spent "a good chunk of time" — perhaps 150 to 200 hours — between mid-1984, when Wright assigned him to work on the book at a staff meeting, and his trip to Fort Worth. The book is largely a compilation of Wright's speeches, sayings and anecdotes.

"It was not full time in any particular week," Cossolotto said. "I would collect some things, read some stuff, talk to the majority leader. It was hit and miss. The big crunch was down in Fort Worth."

During the trip, which was arranged by Wright's office, Cossolotto said he worked with the publisher, read proofs and made final corrections on the book. He said he flew to Fort Worth on a commercial flight, but did not know how that was paid for. The House financial records for the period do not show any air fare attributed to Cossolotto.

The book deal was among cases of alleged questionable activities by Wright cited in requests for an investigation of Wright by the House ethics committee. The panel met last week without deciding how to proceed.

## Unidentified boy possibly kidnap victim

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Authorities trying to trace the baffling origins of a hearing-impaired boy found wandering in Mexico are checking a connection with an Illinois kidnap victim as calls from across the country continue to pour in.

The 7- or 8-year-old boy communicates through gestures and pictures he draws, some of which indicate he might be from the United States. Authorities believe he may be a survivor of a plane crash that killed the rest of his family.

Sgt. John Mickler of the Decatur police department's youth services division doesn't think the mysterious boy is T.J. Davison, a 4-year-old who was abducted in October 1985 from his aunt's car in Decatur, Ill.

"But I haven't given up hope," Mickler said Monday.

The Center for Missing and Exploited Children in Washington, D.C., sent copies of Davison's fingerprints to the FBI office in El Paso. FBI spokesman Terry Kincaid said Monday he expected to receive the prints today.

**DEAR ANN LANDERS:** I am not an educated person but I will try to put this down on paper as best I can and hope you will fix up my letter and print it.

My wife and I were high school sweethearts and we married very young. My dad suggested that we live with him and Mom and the rest of the kids for a while, which I thought was a good idea. Things were OK for a few weeks, then I noticed a change in my wife. She seemed very unhappy and wouldn't say why.

One night my dad yelled at her for not helping my sister with the housework. I thought my sister had put him up to it and we had some harsh words. We moved out and I didn't speak to my sister for a long time.

Last year my wife became very quiet, wouldn't give any reason for not wanting me to touch her sexually and finally she moved back with her folks, taking our two children with her. I was heartsick. That same month Mom sued Dad for divorce and came to see me. She said, "I won't give you any details but your wife is keeping something from you." I thought it was another man.

The following weekend I went to see the kids and asked my wife if she would take a walk with me, alone. When I told her what Mom had said, she confessed that my father had tried to rape her repeatedly when we

were living at his house. I was so angry I wanted to kill him.

I called my sister and told her what my wife had said. She confessed that Dad had started to abuse her when she was 10 years old and quit when she threatened to tell every member of the family.

My wife refused to see a counselor because she says she just can't talk about her past. It is too painful. Meanwhile her life is a mess and so is mine. When anybody tells me, "You look just like your father," I want to scream, "Don't mention his name to me. He is the lowest thing on earth."

Do you see any hope for us?—Hurting in W. Va.

**DEAR W. VA.:** You both need to talk to a professional and diffuse the anger that is locked inside. Also, you need to understand how warped and sick your father is.

I urge you to talk to a clergyman, a counselor, a good family therapist or another mental health professional at once. There is help for all of you but you must seek it.

**DEAR ANN LANDERS:** Your column is informative, entertaining and therapeutic. I like the way you invite people to unload their pet peeves. Here is mine:

The weather reporters in Washington, D.C., invariably say, "It is raining outside."

Canyon eliminates Hereford from playoffs, 8-2

## Error-prone Whitefaces give away game

It just wasn't the Hereford Whitefaces' day Saturday in game three of the state quarterfinal series against Canyon at Plainview, with Canyon capitalizing on seven Hereford errors to score eight unearned runs and earn a trip to state.

Canyon scored three runs in the second inning, two runs in the third inning and three runs in the fifth inning — each inning starting off with two or three Hereford errors within the first three at-bats.

Hereford could score only two runs, both in the fifth inning, off Canyon starting pitcher James Ferguson, who upped his season record to 11-2.

"We just picked a bad day not to play very well. After losing that heartbreaker the other night, it really built up on us. It's hard to come back from eight runs down," Hereford Coach T.R. Sartor said.

"Jason (Scott) came in and did a heck of a job. By the same token, Ferguson did a hell of a job, and out mistakes made the difference.

"Ferguson's location was better today (than Wednesday), mixing it up real well," Sartor said after Saturday's defeat.

"They peaked at just the right time. They've played their best ball of the year. They're playing state-caliber ball right now," Sartor added.

Sartor, who has directed the Whitefaces to two consecutive District 1-4A championships, saw his Herd team go without an extra-base hit Saturday. Ferguson limited the Whitefaces to singles — eight of them — and struck out nine.

In both the second and fourth inning, Hereford hit two singles and had runners on second and third base after wild pitches were thrown, but failed to get any runners home. Ferguson struck out three straight batters to end Hereford's second inning threat.

Roger McCracken and James Hernandez hit the second inning singles and Hernandez and Keith Brown hit the fourth inning singles.

In the fifth inning, Hereford pitcher Jason Scott singled, beating out a throw from third base for the hit.

Courtesy runner Glenn Parker advanced to second on a groundout, and reached third base on an error by Canyon third baseman Todd Albracht, with Michael Phibbs reaching first base on the error.

A bloop single by Rodney McCracken and an RBI groundout by

Roger McCracken pushed Parker and Phibbs home.

Hereford's only other hits in the game were a line-drive single by Robby Collier in the third inning, and a single by pinchhitter Clint Cotten who beat a throw to first base for a hit in the sixth inning.

The frustration of the Herd batters could be seen numerous times in Thursday's and Saturday's games, when they hit long fly balls for outs, including several by Hereford's leading home run hitter, Rodney McCracken.

Canyon's first two batters of the second inning reached the basepaths on errors. Three errors, two of them on the same play, put Canyon runners at second and third. The Eagles gained a 3-0 lead on an RBI groundout by Albracht, an RBI single by Jason Roach and an RBI double by Kent Colley.

Canyon's leadoff batter in the third inning, Kevin Dewey, reached base on an error. David Atkins hit a single and an outfield error allowed Dewey

to score. Atkins later scored on a sacrifice fly by John Eller for a 5-0 Eagle lead.

After a leadoff walk in the fifth inning, Canyon took advantage of two more Hereford errors to score three runs. The first run was scored on the second error, and Albracht batted in the other runs with a single.

Canyon had the same number of hits as Hereford, eight, but the Eagles connected for timely hits.

If you take away the six Hereford errors, Herd pitcher Jason Scott may have had statistics like this: no runs scored, five hits allowed. But instead, eight unearned runs were scored. Scott had two strikeouts and walked four batters.

Instead of a 2-0 victory, Scott suffered his second defeat of the season, finishing at 12-2. And instead of a trip to the state tournament, the Whitefaces and their fans must "wait 'til next year."

Hereford assistant Coach Bill Bridge, the HHS junior varsity coach, said, "We've got a good nucleus of kids coming back. We'll miss the seniors. Hopefully, we'll do what we did this year next year to get into the playoffs, with those coming up."

"It's been a good year," Hereford Athletic Director Don Cumpton said. "We're proud of these kids. You just hurt for them, especially the seniors because they don't get another shot

at state."

Cumpton, Whiteface head football coach, said the successful baseball season "carries over into everything else," that success in one sport is important for success in other sports, including football.

The Whitefaces season ended with a 26-5 record. Canyon, 23-11, goes on to battle state defending champion Brenham, 29-3, in the state semifinals Thursday in Austin. The other semifinal matchup is Waxahachie vs. Robstown. The championship game is scheduled Friday.

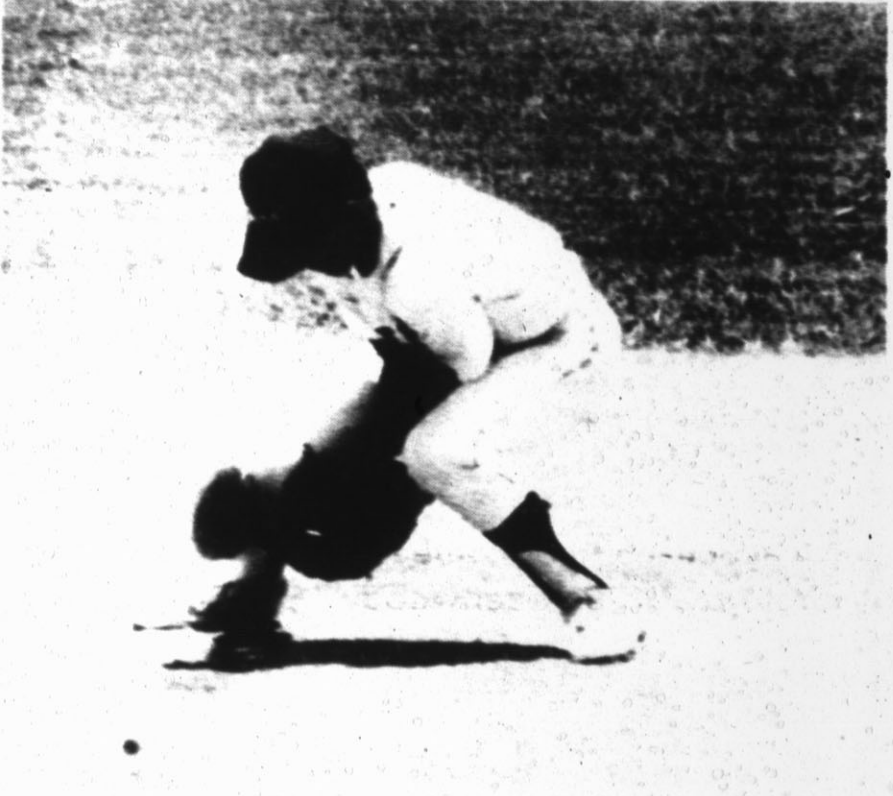

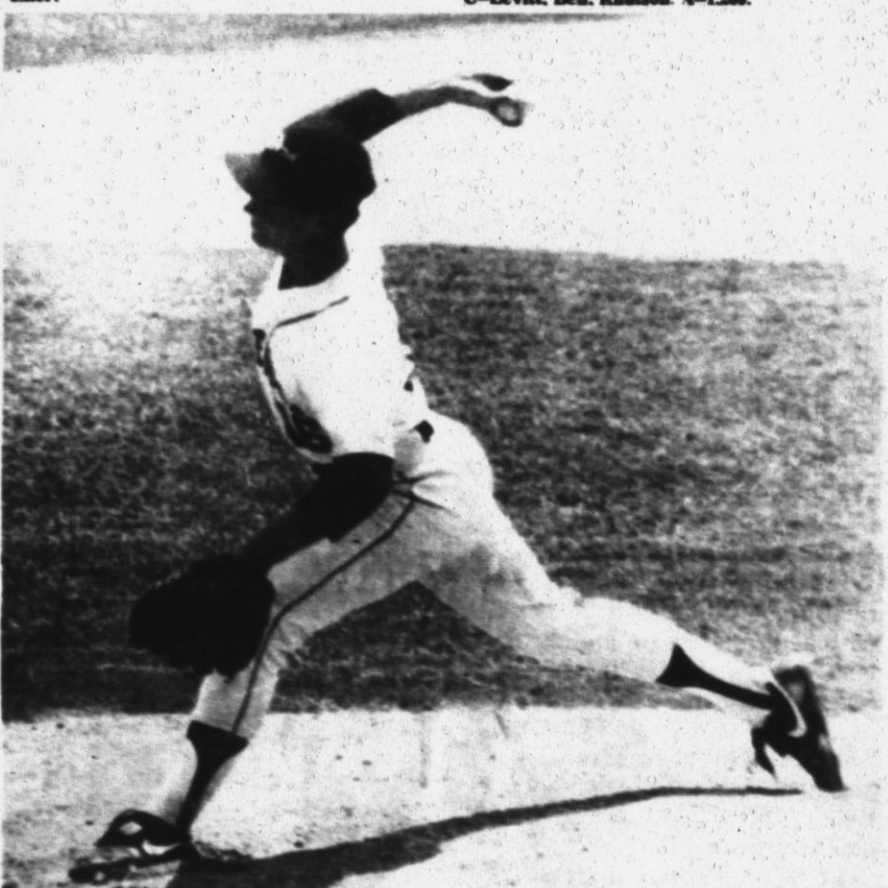

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# Senator Bill Sarpalius reports

AUSTIN — As we watch the drop-out problem continue to plague Texas schools, more and more people have begun to advocate a "get-tough" policy toward those students who chose to leave school early.

Some of the suggestions have been fairly conventional, such as raising the truancy age and toughening penalties for parents who don't force their children to attend school. Other ideas have been more novel, such as one that would prevent drop-outs from obtaining their Texas driver's

license. Rep. Bill Hammond of Dallas says he will introduce a bill next session that would prevent those who drop out of school before graduation from receiving their driver's license until they turn 18. Texas youths currently are eligible to receive their licenses at 16 (15 in hardship cases) if they have completed a state-approved driver's education course.

Hammond and those who support his proposal argue that existing efforts to prevent students from dropping out have failed. He says drop-outs rarely listen to reason. They are unimpressed by arguments that dropping out will hurt their long-term earning potential.

Proponents of the driver's license plan go on to argue that the majority of today's drop-outs essentially are spoiled. These students live for the "here and now" to the exclusion of any long-range thinking or planning. Denying these drop-outs their driving privileges will hit them where they live.

The argument is not without merit. A certain percentage of drop-outs leave school simply for a lack of motivation and for laziness. Taking these drop-outs licenses away might get their attention.

But, there are questions surrounding the proposal that need answering. For instance, in its current form it assumes all students drop out because of laziness when in fact a variety of problems cause students to drop out of school.

There are those who leave school because of the emotional stress caused by shattered home life,

students who are the children of abusive parents or alcoholic or drug-addicted parents. There are those who live in crushing poverty who feel they must leave school to help their families earn immediate money, not stay for the promise of greater earnings down the road.

Sure, these students should stay in school. It's still their best option in the long run. But they're not dropping out for selfish reasons. Does taking their license away really accomplish anything? Or, does it just deny them one potential way of earning a living?

It's a tough question and one the Legislature must deal with next session. We co-sponsored a bill last session that helped create a better tracking system for identifying students who are dropping out or who are at risk of dropping out. It was a start, but we must do more.

Now, we are serving on a special interim committee that is trying to come up with a comprehensive approach to dealing with drop-outs. The sentiment on the committee seems to be that there is no single solution to the drop-out problem just as there is no single cause.

In that respect, maybe the driver's license proposal is not a cure-all. But it has served to focus more attention on the growing number of drop-outs in our public schools, and that all by itself is a major accomplishment.

# Keep cool, save energy with air conditioner

Cooling costs can be expensive, especially in areas where electricity rates are high, but you can beat the heat and still hold the line on costs, reports the Association of Home Appliance Manufacturers (AHAM).

Two key factors should be considered when buying a new room air conditioner.

First, estimate cooling capacity. It's the most important consideration in choosing a model that will cool and dehumidify your room adequately. Too small a unit won't deliver enough cold air, but too large a unit wastes electricity and doesn't remove enough moisture to prevent the cold clammy feeling caused by chilly, humid air.

Cooling capacity, measured in British thermal units per hour (BTU/hr), refers to the air conditioner's ability to remove heat and moisture from a room. The larger the BTU/hr. rating, the greater is the unit's cooling ability.

A dark green AHAM seal on the model assures you that its cooling performance and its electrical input, expressed in amperes, are rated accurately and verified by an independent testing laboratory.

Room size, location and other important factors dictate a room's cooling needs, also called the "cooling load." Use a "Cooling Load Estimate Form" to determine your room's cooling load. The form is available through dealers or by sending 35 cents with your request to AHAM, 20 North Wacker Drive, Chicago, IL 60606.

For best cooling results, select a room air conditioner with a cooling capacity that's five percent plus or minus your room's cooling load.

Next, consider energy efficiency ratings (EERs). Once you know the cooling capacity you need, check the EERs of similarly sized models to learn which are the most economical to operate.

EER, the big bold number on the yellow Energy Guide label, is a measure of room air conditioner operating efficiency. When all other

factors are equal, models with higher EERs use less electricity and, so, cost less to operate.

High EER models are especially important to residents of hot climates where air conditioners are used frequently and cooling costs tend to run high. For example, Miami residents, who average 2,000 air conditioning hours annually, would have far more opportunity to cut their cooling bills than Seattle residents,

who average only 150 hours annually.

The "Hours of Operation" map, developed by AHAM, shows the average number of hours per year that air conditioners are used in various parts of the continental U.S.

Cooling just the rooms in use instead of the entire home is another way to cut cooling costs. At night, cooling is generally needed just in the sleeping area, and during the day, only in the living area.

He concludes he is not a drug addict and that having cocaine once in a while is harmless. I'm afraid he could suffer a heart attack or stroke. Am I right?
