

Fisher County Voters Return Judge Bennett To Fourth Term, Elect Terry New Commissioner, Send Hale And Cleveland Into Treasurer Runoff

Fisher County voters elected Judge Marshal Bennett to a fourth four-year term as Fisher County Judge last Tuesday giving him over sixty percent of the votes cast. Voters also elected a new Fisher County Commissioner when they stamped approval on Gene Terry giving him 303 votes to 195 for incumbent Jimmy Wright.

In the race for Fisher County Treasurer, incumbent Ilene Hale failed to capture an outright victory by 03.8 percent. She needed one more vote that half of those cast. Final totals (including absentee) reflected 784 for Ilene Hale; 669 for Sue Cleveland and 245 for Jane Nowlin.

Hale captured 46.2 percent of the vote; Cleveland had 39.4 percent while Nowlin had 14.4 per-

cent of the total votes cast.

In other uncontested Fisher County races, Bettie Hargrove, unopposed candidate for reelection as District Clerk received 1174 votes; Betty Rivers, Fisher County Clerk received 1139 votes; and Billy Henderson, Fisher County Commissioner Precinct 2 captured 306 votes.

Justice of the Peace candidates Marie VanLoon (601 votes) and Geneva Chandler (492 votes) were each unopposed in their respective precincts for reelection. The vote totals for **Republican Primary In Fisher County Attracts Ten Voters To Polls**

They didn't set any records, but they voted - all 10 of em' - Republicans, that is. If the race for Governor is any indication of how it will be statewide, Clayton Williams will win by 70-percent.

In the Republican primary, Kent Hance captured 3 votes and Clayton Williams captured 7 votes.

David Stephens Adds Name To Roby School Board Candidate List

David Stephens added his name to the list of candidates seeking to fill a spot on the Roby school board. Two vacancies exist with three candidates running.

Incumbent Richard Gaona has filed as has Marie Henry.

The deadline for filing is Wednesday, March 21st.

Ken Myers And Emma Denton File For Spots On Rotan City Council

Two candidates have filed for positions on the Rotan City Council. Three vacancies exist in position currently held by Ernest Armstrong, Charles Atwell and Jim Gruben. Armstrong and Atwell have indicated that they will not re-file, Jim Gruben is undecided.

The two candidates who have filed for the elected positions are Ken Myers and Emma Denton.

Roby City Council Approves Of Kevin Rivers As Fire Marshall

The members of the Roby City Council, in regular session on Tuesday, March 6th, approved the appointment of Kevin Rivers as the new Roby Fire Marshall.

Roby Fireman J Donham announced to the council that the fire department has named Rivers to the spot and asked that the recommendation be approved by the Roby City Council. The council members expressed their appreciation to J Donham, who served as Fire Marshall prior to Rivers, for his dedication and service.

Margaret Gonzales Captures State Title In Powerlifting

Margaret Gonzales of Roby has a new trophy - first place in the State of Texas in her weight division in powerlifting. She and four other Roby powerlifters competed in the State Championship meet last weekend at Bastrop, Texas.

The other Roby girl winning an individual honor was Suzanne Maxwell, 5th in her weight division.

The Roby powerlifting team of Margaret Gonzales, Suzanne Maxwell, Shana Feagan, Karen Barrera and Jenny Blain captured an overall 5th place at the state meet.

Commissioners Give Approval To \$14,999 Clerk Micro Film Buy

Fisher County Commissioners approved the purchase of \$14,999 in new micro filming equipment for the office of Fisher County Clerk Bettie Rivers during a special meeting on March 20th.

The equipment is expected to save Fisher County Clerk Bettie Rivers approximately \$5,000 to \$6,000 a year over the equipment and services provided by another company.

The equipment will be installed in 10 days and should be fully operational at that time, according to Rivers.

The equipment purchased included: a DCI 6100 rebuilt camera/processor; a CMI rebuilt micro duplicator; a county clerk software package; a plain paper reader/printer; a 386 156Mb computer and a letter quality printer.

Hargrove, Rivers, Henderson, VanLoon and Chandler do not include the absentee box. Complete totals for most statewide contested races and all Fisher County contested races can be found on

All Rotan Teachers Re-Hired, Board Cuts Out \$1,000 Above State Base

Good news and bad news - first the good news, all Rotan teachers will be offered an employment contract. Bad news, they will not be getting the \$1,000 above state-base. The action took place last Monday night at the Rotan School Board meeting and marks the first time since the 1984-85 school year that trustees have opted not to pay the \$1,000 above state-base. "It was an extremely difficult decision to reach but everyone must try to understand that the board is attempting to do everything it can to control costs of operating this

district," said Superintendent Alton Fields.

The vote, after the board was in closed session considering the hiring of teachers, was not unanimous. Board members Roger Blackwelder, Leo Long, Pete Fowler, Donna Kennedy and Larry Landes voted in favor of the motion to re-hire all teachers at state-base plus \$60.00 for insurance while board member Vick Burk voted against the motion. Board member Luther Summers was absent from the meeting.

Board members were presented with an 'Open Letter' signed by approximately 40 faculty members at the beginning of the meeting last Monday. The letter, in anticipation that the board would not grant the \$1,000 above-base, said in part "In the event you (the board) feel compelled to remove the above base supplement, we would appreciate knowing that if funds become available at the time the new budget is adopted you will reinstate the supplement so that we (the school system) can continue to attract and maintain the excellent faculty that Rotan has always enjoyed." Those signing the letter pledged to continue doing the best job possible regardless of the outcome of the above base issue.

Following the reading of the letter to the board by Debbie Mercer, Board President Pete Fowler said "It's kind of tough, we will be trying to do the best we can with respect to the administration, faculty, staff, classroom teachers and tax payers. We will try to make the

best decision we can as it relates to each group."

In other action, Superintendent Alton Fields informed the board of a potential financial problem with respect to a leaking roof at the elementary building. He informed the board that the leak in question is serious enough that "we have no choice but to call in a roofer."

Fields informed board members that, in his estimate, the school was within \$2,521 of staying within budget, not counting the expected expenses of roof repair.

Fields had an offer from David Hill of McCauley on a piece of property owned by the school district. Hill was offering less than what was owed against the property in taxes. The board decided not to accept his offer.

The board informed Fields that he was to continue the budget process preparation as in years past and agreed to continue to allow the use of the school gymnasium under the current policy.

Fields also braced the board for the possible formation of a new cooperative, similar to the tri-county education cooperative,

that would address the needs of 'at-risk' students. The schools in the area interested in the new cooperative are Snyder, Colorado City, Sweetwater, Roby, Ira, Trent, Hermleigh and Rotan. The districts involved could possibly be interested in locating a cooperative facility at Hobbs. The schools involved are planning a meeting in late March to further address the 'at-risk' student needs.

Board members briefly reviewed career ladder policies, were informed by Fields that \$5,634 in new Chapter 1 money had been secured and set the school election for May 5th.

The board appointed Anna Mae Fleming as the election judge.

The board voted on two candidates for Region 14 service center directors and adopted the list of textbooks for 1990-91.

In final action the board listened to a report on the GED testing program by Pat Hamric. In her report she said a total of 435 people had received their GED certificate since the program started locally in 1973.

Commissioners Approve McCauley ISD Detachment And Annexation

Fisher County Commissioners, at their meeting last Monday, entered an order redefining the boundaries of the McCauley, Roby and Hamlin school districts. The Roby ISD, McCauley ISD and Hamlin ISD boards of trustees, on March 8th during a special meeting, approved a petition requesting detachment and annexation of land in the former McCauley ISD to the Hamlin ISD.

Commissioners accepted a bid from E. Proctor in Sweetwater for the purchase of the 1984 Rotan Police car for \$550.

Commissioners approved the bills, discussed a meeting for rural volunteer fire departments and were informed that Fisher County Tax Assessor Collector Teddy Kral was hospitalized after having emergency gall bladder surgery last weekend.

State Capital Highlights

AUSTIN—Capitol halls more than murmured last week after four liberal lawmakers walked out in protest of a joint session address by U.S. Secretary of Education Lauro Cavazos.

Cavazos, a native of Corpus Christi and former president of Texas Tech University, told legislators gathered to equalize public school funding that more money is not the solution to education woes — and that basic changes in the system are needed.

The majority of lawmakers, Democrats ready to follow Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby's massive new tax and spending plan, found themselves squeezed between their leadership and Texas Republicans in the White House.

Protest Walkout

Incensed, state Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, led the protest walkout and had plenty to say outside.

Parker will quarterback Hobby's bill through the Senate, and if Secretary Cavazos shot his new spending plan full of holes in his speech, Parker more than paid him back in media barbs.

Parker thinks Cavazos has back-shot every public school kid in the state.

Party Crasher

Sen. Carlos Truan, D-Corpus Christi, did more than that: he crashed the secretary's post-speech press conference to say:

"I feel betrayed and I feel embarrassed that the secretary of education — a minority from Texas — would not take a more aggressive position regarding the needs of education."

Others, including Sen. Hector Uribe, D-Brownsville, and Rep. Eddie Cavazos, D-Corpus Christi, echoed Truan's jabs, and Parker summed his anger: "That wasn't a speech for education; that was an apology for Republican policy."

Secretary Cavazos, who said he had given the speech dozens of times, including congressional committee meetings, commented that "no one has been angry with me until this came up the other day."

"It saddens me — not because it was a personal attack — but because people I have so much respect for take that kind of tactic,

in front of television cameras and reporters."

Bump The Lid

Some Democratic members privately agreed with Cavazos, but few will openly oppose Hobby and Speaker Gib Lewis.

"If money were the answer, then why are we in this jam so soon after we passed two billion plus dollars for the H.B. 72 reforms?", questioned one.

Besides the pressure lawmakers feel to raise taxes during an election, some also resent the futility of the situation. Gov. Bill Clements has promised to slam-dunk into the trash basket any new tax bills.

Clements put a \$200 million lid on new spending for schools because they can take the money from other agencies.

All they're going to get for bumping the lid is a sore head, and some political careers could die in the ballot box.

Velvet Gloves Off

They finally made Ann Richards angry enough to take off the velvet gloves, but she replaced them with the boxing variety and zinged her tormentors with a couple of well-placed shots.

For weeks, her gubernatorial opponents, Mark White and Jim Mattox, thrashed her for dodging the issue of past drug abuse.

Turning the guns on them, Richards questioned how White could afford a \$1.3 million mansion in Houston so soon after stints as attorney general and governor.

As for Mattox, she said he should make public whether he received \$200,000 in profit from a real estate investment with Danny Faulkner, a Garland developer whose racketeering trial ended in mistrial.

Appointments For Sale

Mattox mainly went about his campaign business, but an angry White, answering the charges that "he lined his pockets" while governor, released his income tax filings for the past 16 years.

White is now fighting charges that he enriched himself as governor by appointing individuals to key boards who steered millions of dollars in business to companies

that hired White's former Houston law firm.

White and Mattox have been saying that Richards cannot win in November, but she found an unlikely ally last week, who all but defused the drug issue.

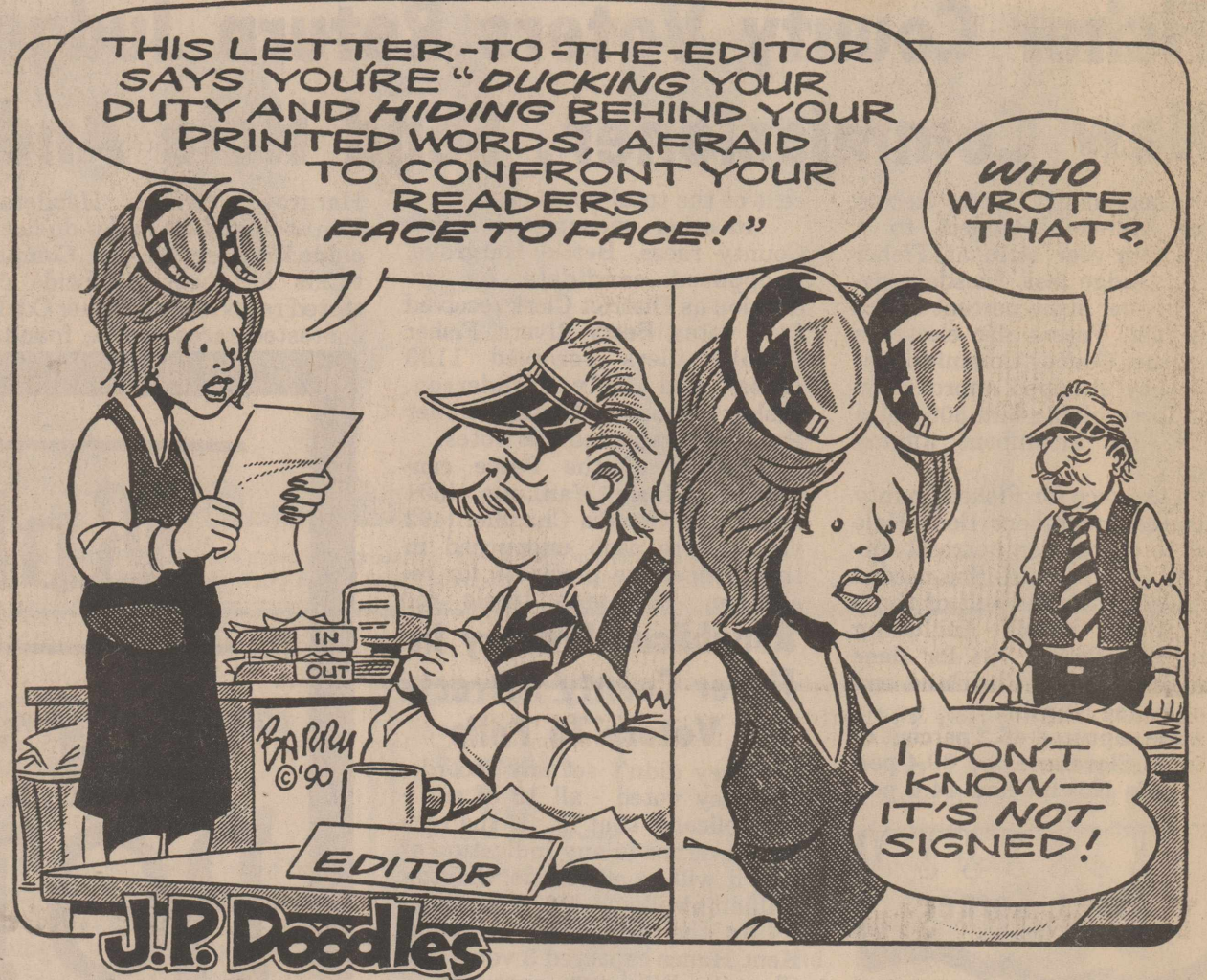
Clayton Williams, at this point the GOP frontrunner, said he thinks Richards has answered the question and that they ought to lay off her on that. He said he won't use it as an issue. Of course, someone else may bring it up.

Other Highlights

■ If elected attorney general, Sen. Buster Brown, R-Lake Jackson, said he would try to remove U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice from the federal case involving Texas' crowded prisons.

■ Three of every four Texans believe abortion is a private issue, according to a poll by the Texas Abortion Rights Action League.

■ State Rep. Doyle Willis, D-Fort Worth, filed a bill to bar counties from hiring members of hate groups.

Judge Bennett Carries Over 60 Percent Of Votes In Victory

Eligible Upland Cotton Producers To Receive Payment

The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced that eligible upland cotton producers will receive final deficiency payments of \$250 million this month for the 1989 crop of upland cotton.

Daniel Shaw, acting executive vice president of USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation, said payments will be based on a rate

of 13.1 cents per pound. Producers who participated in the 1989 price support and production adjustment program may have received advance payments of 8.56 cents per pound, leaving a balance of 4.54 cents per pound, to be paid in cash.

Producers who did not request an advance deficiency payment will receive their entire payment.

Support Prices For Wool And Mohair Released

Support prices for wool and mohair for 1990 marketings will be \$1.82 per pound for shorn wool and \$4.532 per pound for mohair, a U.S. Department of Agriculture official announced today.

Mohair is being supported at 85 percent of the percentage of parity at which shorn wool is supported.

Keith Bjerke, executive vice president of USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation, also said that pulled wool will be supported at a level comparable to the support price for shorn wool to maintain

normal marketing practices for pulled wool.

Further details will be published in the Federal Register at a later date.

The 1989 deficiency payment rate is the difference between the national established target price of 73.4 cents per pound and the higher of the national average market price received by producers of upland cotton during the 1989 calendar year or the loan rate for Strict Low Middling 1-1/16-inch cotton, micronaire 3.5-4.9, at the average U.S. location.

Because the 1989 calendar year national average market price of 60.3 cents per pound is above the loan rate of 50 cents per pound, the deficiency payment rate is the difference between the target price and the 1989 calendar year national average market price.

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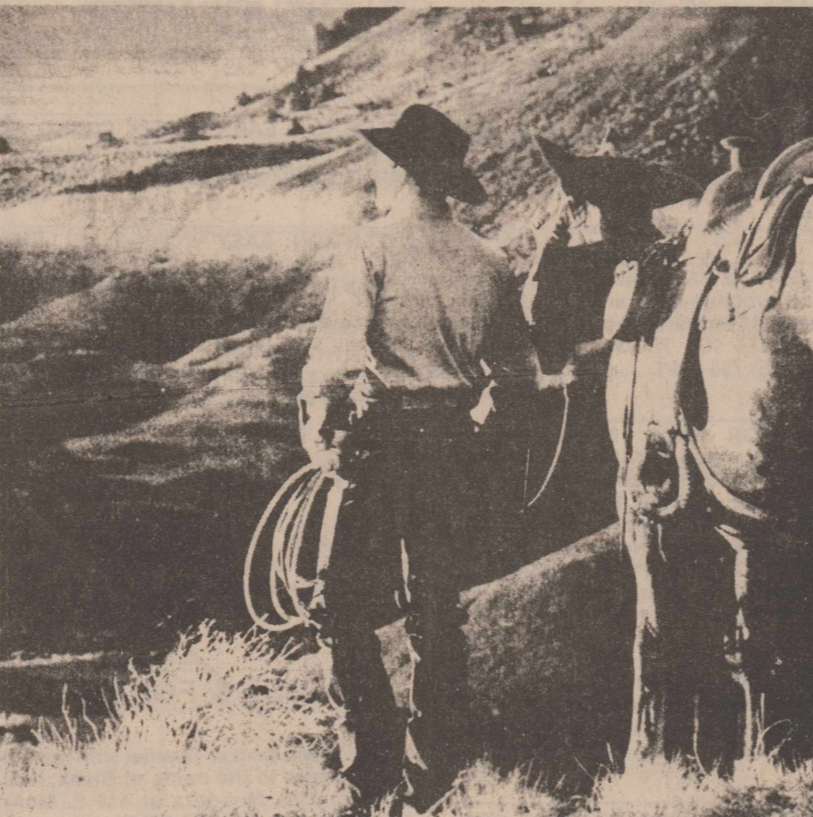
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Information On (SSI) Checks

If you receive supplemental security income (SSI) checks, you should tell Social Security whenever there's a change in your resources, income, or living arrangements. That way, we can be sure you receive the right amount in your check every month, and you can avoid the hardship caused by paying back overpayments.

Too often, SSI recipients fail to inform us about a change that should be reported and end up being overpaid. Since the law requires the Social Security Administration to recover the overpayment, the money is usually withheld from future checks, resulting in a tremendous hardship for many recipients.

Examples of changes that commonly result in overpayments when not reported are listed below. If you get SSI checks, you may be able to avoid being overpaid by promptly reporting these changes.

* an increase in resources—the things you own, such as cash, checking or savings accounts, stocks, bonds, and certificates of deposit

* an increase in income—both earned and unearned

* if you get help with your living expenses

* if you enter an institution

* if you plan to leave the United States

* if you move or someone moves into or out of your home

* if someone who lives with you dies

* if you or someone who lives with you has a baby or gets married, widowed, divorced, or separated

* an improvement in your health, if you're getting checks because you are disabled or blind.

It's easy to report a change—just call any Social Security office. You can find the number in the phone book under "Social Security Administration" or "U.S. Government." You should report the change within 10 days after the month it happens. But remember, the sooner you report the change, the sooner Social Security can adjust your check. Avoid overpayments -- report changes right away.

County Extension Report

THE TRUTH ABOUT STRESS SUPPLEMENTS

Stress is a "hot-button" word these days, especially for women who are trying to juggle multiple roles as wives, mothers, community leaders, athletes or students.

Some manufacturers of supplements would like us to believe that a pill is the answer to stress. Stress tablets are based on a formula originally developed for post-operative patients and victims of severe trauma.

While the acute stress of surgical procedures or injuries can increase energy and nutrient needs, psychological stresses such as fear, anger and tension fall into the category of normal stresses of daily living and do not substantially increase nutrient needs.

Supplement marketers try to convince the public that the RDA for some nutrients is not adequate to cope with day-to-day stress. The adrenal glands are involved in the stress reaction, they say, and because the adrenal glands have high amounts of vitamin C, stress requires supplements of this vitamin. Clinical studies at this time do not support this claim.

Individuals under stress need supplementary B vitamins, say supplement manufacturers. Vitamin B6 (pyridoxine) is included in stress formulas because it is thought to raise serotonin levels, thus improving mood. Recent research shows neurologic damage in women who take high

doses of B6 for months, typically for the treatment of PMS.

There is evidence to support increasing potassium intake during stress, but nutrition experts recommend doing this by eating more fruits and vegetables and drinking fruit juices.

THE TRUTH ABOUT STRESS SUPPLEMENTS

So what can you do when you're experiencing day-to-day stress? Try taking these steps:

- * Eat regular meals in small amounts, since stress can slow the digestive process.
- * Increase the amount of fruits and vegetables in the diet.
- * Eat high quality protein foods to protect against muscle breakdown.
- * Drink plenty of fluids.
- * Exercise to reduce anxiety and to feel a sense of control.
- * Use relaxation techniques to counteract tension.
- * Enjoy comforting foods like baked custard or chicken soup in moderation. Individual comfort foods are more likely to relieve stress than a pill!

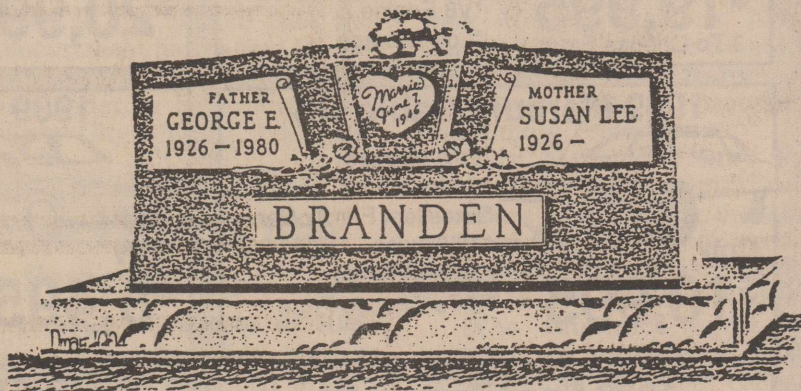
This program will highlight how persons can access these resources as they plan for the future.

DEALING WITH THE IRS

The average taxpayer probably doesn't care how many divisions there are within the IRS or how the work gets allocated to the various departments. But if you're a taxpayer who has reason to correspond with the service, there are a few things to keep in mind.

The two main units you will have contact with are the audit branch and the collection branch. The audit branch is responsible for examining tax returns and determining the correct income tax. The collection branch has several duties, one of which is the collection of unpaid taxes. Contact from the IRS can be by phone, correspondence, or in person.

It is important to take any contact from the IRS seriously and to respond at once. What may seem like an almost casual first contact from a "lower level" employee of the IRS should be treated by you as a significant event. Also, don't ignore computer-generated notices from the IRS.

Keep a record of all contacts with the IRS including dates, IRS employee names, telephone numbers, and written correspondence to and from the IRS. It is difficult for any accountant to assist you in dealing with the IRS unless a complete chain of events and appropriate correspondence identification numbers are maintained.

If the IRS requests items such as cancelled checks, bank statements, receipts, or other documentation, send copies. Keep the originals in your records; you may need them again.

Use certified mail or return receipt requested when sending documentation to the IRS and when mailing anything with a deadline.

The IRS can and does make mistakes so don't assume that their notices or calculations are always correct. Have any IRS notice reviewed by your accountant so that you do not pay more tax than you legitimately owe.

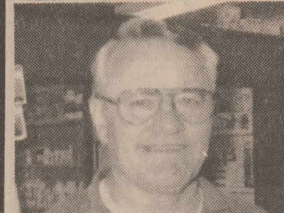

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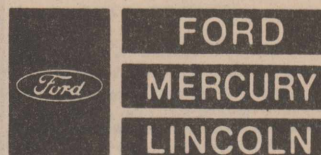

mile relay, came in second place. The boy's time was a 3:51.

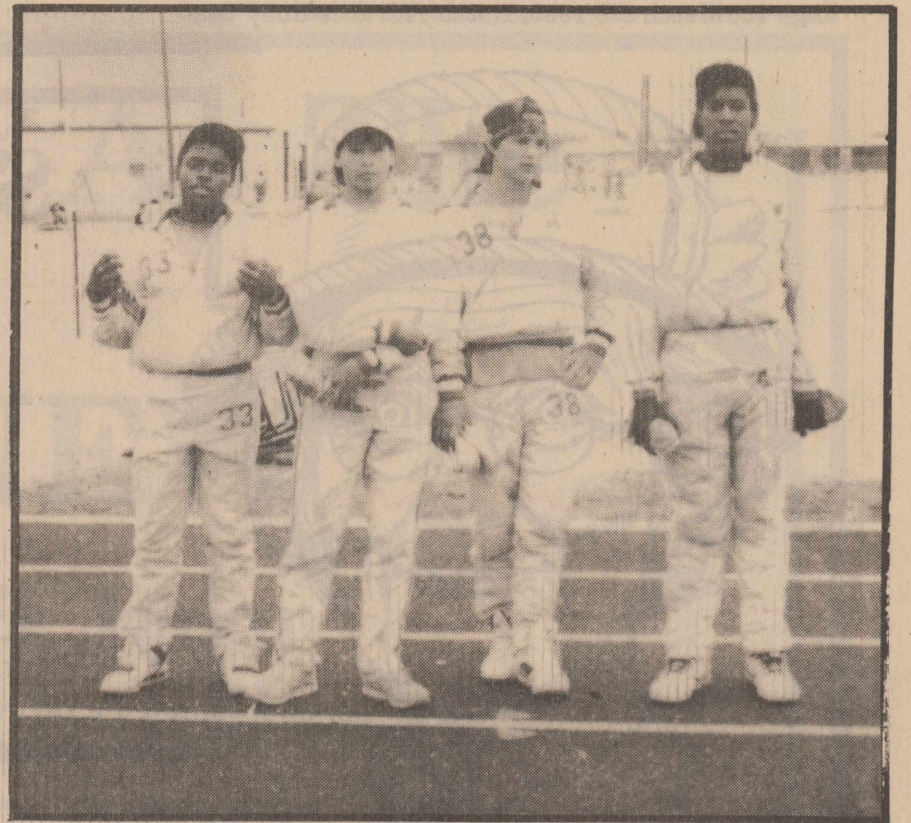
