**French rioters shoot at police, Chirac vows action**  
Rioters fired shots at police and set hundreds of cars ablaze in an 11th night of violence in France on Monday, hours after President Jacques Chirac vowed to restore order.

**Early Christian church unearthed near Armageddon**  
In a maximum-security jail just down the road from Armageddon, Israeli archaeologists have unearthed what they believe is the oldest church discovered in the land where Jesus was born.

**Iran calls for fresh EU nuclear talks in letter**  
Iran's chief nuclear negotiator has written to Britain, France and Germany to call for the resumption of talks over its atomic program, the semi-official Fars news agency said on Sunday.

**Death row inmate from Texas captured in Louisiana**  
A Texas death row prisoner who made a slick escape from jail in Houston on Thursday was captured on Sunday at a liquor store in Shreveport, Louisiana, too drunk to be interrogated, police said.

**Indiana tornado kills 23, injures at least 220**  
A powerful tornado tore through southern Indiana and parts of Kentucky early on Sunday, killing at least 23 people and injuring more than 200, many caught sleeping when the twister hit, officials said.

**World Bank seeks \$1 billion war chest for bird flu**  
Health and veterinary officials from across the world hope to clinch a global plan for tackling bird flu, funded by a \$1 billion World Bank war chest, at a conference on Wednesday.

**US: Serbia can't join NATO without Kosovo solution**  
The United States will block Serbia from joining NATO unless it resolves a territorial dispute over volatile Kosovo, a senior U.S. official said on Tuesday in what was a new U.S. demand on Belgrade.

**New violence hits France despite emergency laws**  
Youths threw Molotov cocktails at police and torched cars in several French cities and towns in a 13th night of violence, ignoring the government's imposition of rarely used emergency laws.

**Californians vote, Schwarzenegger support tested**  
A bitter special election fight between California Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger and his big labor foes over a slate of reforms went before the voters on Tuesday, closely watched across the country for its impact on the political landscape and the former film star's reputation.

**Virginia polls close as US votes**  
Polls closed on Tuesday in Virginia, where a tight governor's race highlighted U.S. elections that could gauge the depth of President George W. Bush's political woes and offer hints about the trends for next year's congressional elections.

**One dead in Tennessee school shooting**  
An assistant principal was shot to death and two colleagues wounded on Tuesday in a shooting at a high school in eastern Tennessee, and a student was being held by police, authorities said.

**Man dies of bird flu as global experts meet**  
A Vietnamese man has died of bird flu, the latest case in Asia that underlines the urgency for top health experts drawing up a strategy in Geneva to prevent the virus from spreading to humans around the globe.

**Bombs at three Jordan hotels kill at least 57**  
Three suspected suicide bombers blew themselves up at three international hotels in Jordan's capital on Wednesday, killing at least 57 people and wounding more than 100 others, government officials and police said.

**Leaks about CIA prisons overseas spark fury**  
On Capitol Hill, lawmakers on both sides of the aisle are calibrating how far to push leak investigations.

**Bush awards Greenspan, Ali Medal of Freedom**  
President George W. Bush praised the influence of Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan and boxing legend Muhammad Ali as he honored them on Wednesday with the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the country's highest civilian award.

**Bush condemns Jordan attacks, offers aid in manhunt**  
U.S. President George W. Bush condemned Wednesday's suicide bombings in Jordan and offered U.S. assistance in the investigation.

**Lawyer in Saddam trial killed**  
Gunmen killed a second defense lawyer acting in Saddam Hussein's trial on Tuesday, renewing questions over whether the former president can get a fair trial amid Iraq's daily violence.

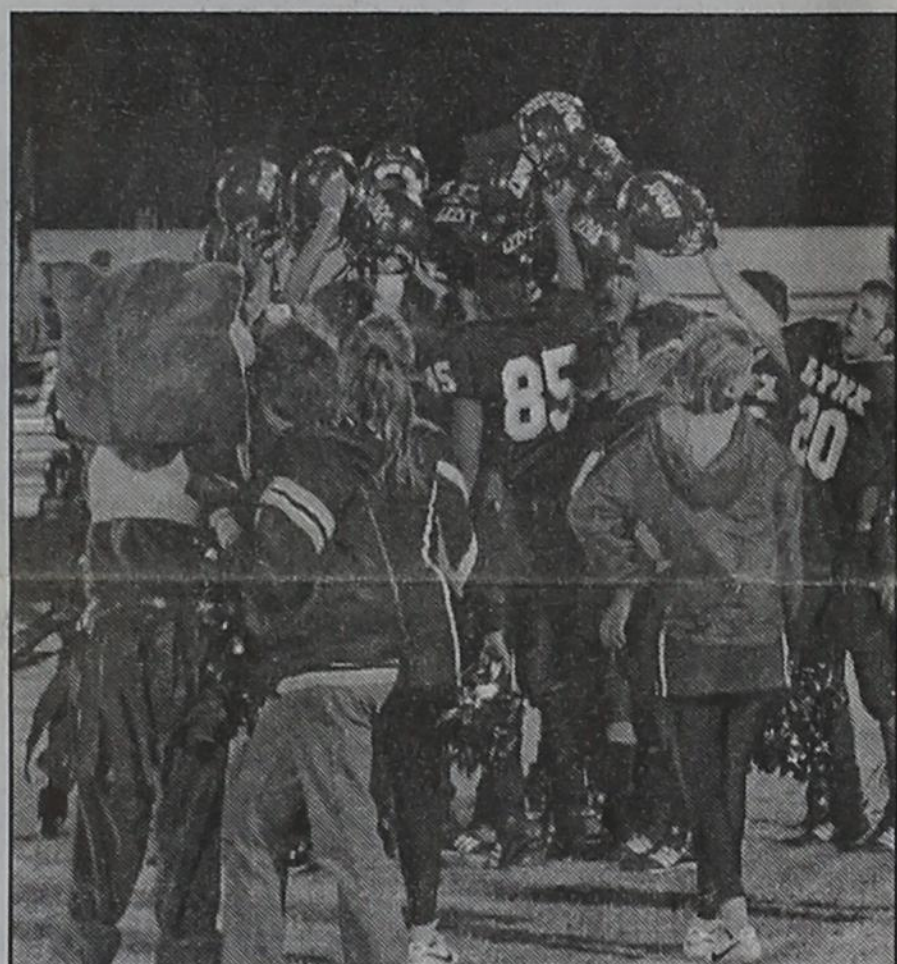

## Medicare Prescription Drug Coverage

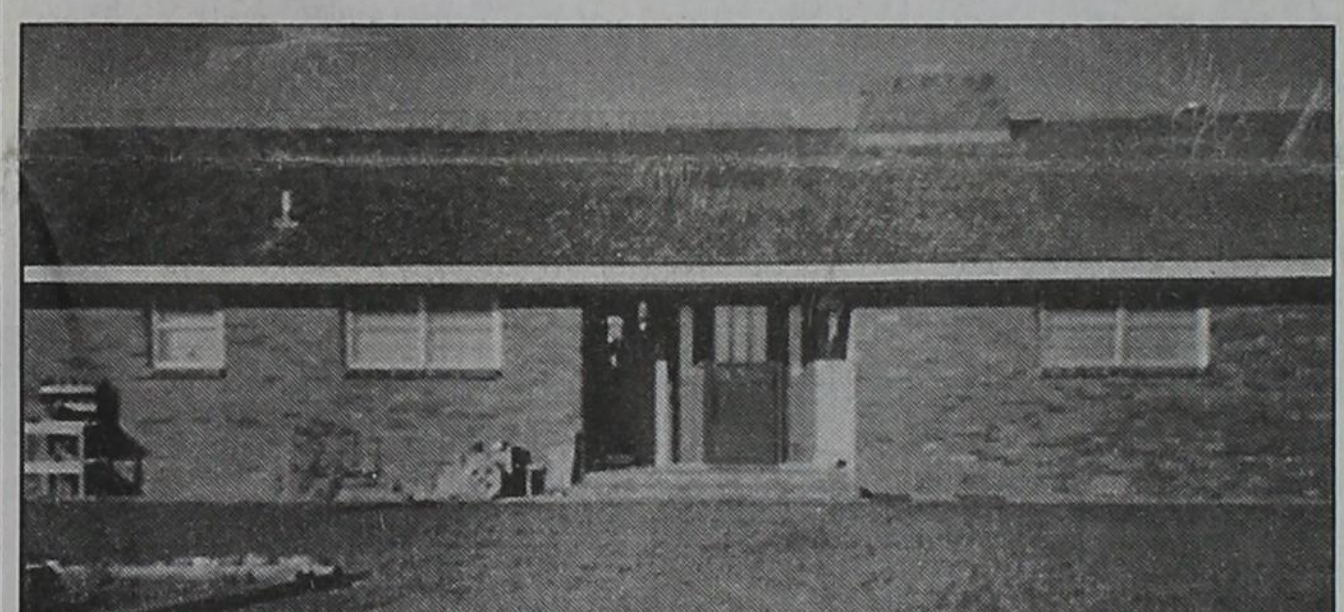

Enrollment time has come at last. Things that have been talked about are close to realization. Those of you that have prescription coverage have heard from your plan administrator and know if they will continue the coverage or if there is a change in benefits. Those of you that have limited incomes have made application with Social Security to see if you are eligible for "extra help" in paying for a plan under the new Medicare Prescription Drug benefits. Others have been receiving help from Medicaid and have already been provided information about your benefit - the next step is to enroll. There are 899 Medicare beneficiaries in Hansford County and the greater percentage will need to enroll in a plan.

There have been at least five community meetings to get information out about this new change in Medicare benefit. That has been reported to be helpful although it is overwhelming for most attendees. There is no way to keep it from being a daunting prospect but we can make it more palatable by providing information about the process. The Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) has set up an enrollment procedure on the internet that we have been talking about. It is now available on <http://www.medicare.gov/>. The next public event scheduled to help with enrollment is going to be one that shows how to enroll or find answers on the internet.

The First National Bank has generously offered to provide a setting for this information event. It will take place on November 16th with two options. One will be at 2 p.m. and the other at 6 p.m. The site is their community room at 729 W. 7th Street and the front entrance will be used for both sessions. There is limited space in this room so a sign up will be done in advance. If interested, call 806.659.5837. That is a direct number to Hansford County Hospital District - Office of Social Services. Please leave a message if there is no person to answer and state which sessions you would prefer to attend.

### Out At The Lake

Lake Level--November 7, 2005--25.04 feet

While Jim was taking the Lake level this morning at the intake tower, he saw a beaver swimming over to the East bank where it disappeared under water. He thinks there is a burrow there in the bank. Remember that in many areas beaver live in houses made of sticks and mud, but in parts of Texas they may make their burrows in cut banks of streams or lakes. They like the entrance below water, but much of the burrow is above water. Here they loaf, sleep, and rear their young.

Deer season is on now. Only white tail deer can be killed in the county. Jim said he saw a white tail buck on Saturday that hunters would have loved to have.

He is seeing two eagles at a time but he said there may be more than one pair. He hasn't been over to the Gibner side to see if they still roost there. Many of those big trees have died and a lot of them have fallen.

With the cooler weather not many campers are coming out, but there were 4 this weekend with 3 of them R. V.s and one a tent camper.

In reading the history of Clark Monument 10 I found the answer to a riddle I had on the Rifle Pits material. When I first read General Carr's report of his terrible trip in December of 1868 with his com-

mand from Fort Lyon in Colorado down to the Palo Duro, he mentioned that about 10 days out they came to and followed the Johnson (sic) Trail of 1857, seeing 38 carcasses of animals left by Penrose's outfit that they were trying to find. Carr wrote that he did not know what this Trail was until later.

The trail was going due East and was not a part of the Santa Fe Trail which they had crossed earlier. I couldn't imagine who had crossed that area in 1857 with enough of a force to leave a trail that was evident 11 years later.

This Trail was laid out by Lt. Col. Joseph Johnston (proper spelling) in the summer of 1857 when he directed a survey to mark the southern boundary of Kansas. To protect the surveying party from hostile Indians, they were accompanied by four companies of the First Cavalry and two companies of the Sixth Infantry. More than 100 wagons and their teamsters and a thousand head of horses were along. This would have been enough to mark a good trail, but then I found the Mexican buffalo hunters (ciboleros) also used the trail.

J. H. Clark first comes into our story here as he was an astronomer with the Johnston survey. A year later he contracted to run the survey to mark the border between the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles.

### Texas crop and weather report

The following specific livestock, crop and weather conditions were reported by Panhandle Extension directors: Soil moisture is short. Temperatures 10 to 15 degrees above average were reported. High winds caused soil erosion. Cotton was rated fair to good. Dry conditions allowed harvest to make progress. Yield reports were good to excellent. Peanut harvest was 85 percent complete; reported yields were good. Sorghum harvest was 60 percent complete. Soybean harvest was nearly complete. Sunflower harvest continued. A few wheat fields remained unplanted. Stands were in fair-to-good condition. Some fields were irrigated despite high energy costs. Rain was needed to allow recently planted dryland fields to germinate and emerged fields to survive. Rangelands were rated poor to fair; fire danger was high. Cattle were in good condition. Supplemental feeding continued to increase.

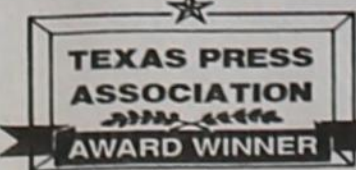

**Ceremony at VA Medical Center to honor Thomas Creek**

On Veterans Day, one of our area's war heroes will be honored during a special event at the facility that now bears his name.

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Medical Center in Amarillo is now the Thomas E. Creek Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center. The facility's new name honors U.S. Marine Lance Corporal Thomas E. Creek of Amarillo, whose final act in life was credited with saving the lives of several of his comrades.

The official renaming ceremony at the VA Medical Center is scheduled for 2 p.m. Friday November 11, 2005. It is expected that members of the Thomas Creek family, as well as local veteran leaders will attend the ceremony, which is taking place on the first Veteran's Day since the law changing the name was approved.

U.S. Representative Mac Thornberry (TX-13), who filed the legislation authorizing the name change, will be among the speakers for the ceremony.

The VA Medical Center is located at 6010 Amarillo Boulevard West. The public is invited to attend the event.

**Creek's Act of Heroism**

U.S. Marine Lance Corporal Thomas E. Creek of Amarillo was killed in combat in Vietnam in February of 1969. On the day he died, Corporal Creek was an 18 year old Marine with Company I, 3rd Battalion, 9th Marines, 3rd Marine Division. Creek was with a resupply convoy when it was ambushed by enemy forces near Cam Lo. During a fierce firefight staged at point blank range, Creek was hit in the neck by a bullet.

Despite suffering that wound, when Creek saw a fragmentation grenade land between him and the rest of the squad, Creek deliberately rolled on top of the explosive. When the device blew up, Creek absorbed the full impact of the blast - losing his life but saving five other Marines nearby. Creek's bravery inspired the rest of his squad to rally, overcome the enemy, and go on to deliver the load of supplies to the forward combat base.

For his courage and sacrifice, Creek was posthumously awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor by President Nixon.

**Thornberry worked with local Veterans**

In the fall of 2003, Congressman Thornberry was approached by a group of local veterans who suggested changing the name of the VA Medical Center as a way of paying lasting tribute to Creek's valor. Acting upon that recommendation, Thornberry crafted legislation to make the veterans' idea a reality. But, before the bill could be considered, approval of the proposed name change had to be obtained from every other member of the Texas Congressional delegation and also from six major veterans service organizations - the American Legion, the Disabled American Veterans, the Vietnam Veterans of America, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Paralyzed Veterans of America, and AMVETS.

Working together, the local veterans and Thornberry received the necessary approvals. Once the preliminary work was complete, Thornberry introduced legislation seeking the VA Medical Center name change on July 15, 2004. During a statement he delivered on the House floor that day, Thornberry called Creek "a true American hero, deserving of this recognition and honor."

Thornberry also told his House colleagues that, "In some ways, 1969 seems like a long time ago, yet acts of bravery like Corporal Creek's are timeless. They provide an example for us all. Corporal Creek's name will further magnify the honor attached to those who have served our nation and receive health care at this veterans' facility."

Congress gave final approval to the VA name change on November 17, 2004. The legislation was signed into law by President Bush on November 30, 2004.

**Words from Faith & Grace**

The Day of the Lord! For the Old Testament prophets the Day of the Lord was a day of wrath, of terror, of mighty events. The Day of the Lord! For the New Testament faith community a time of dread and yet anticipation. Our Lessons this week are found in Zephaniah 1:7-18, Psalm 90, 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11, and Matthew 25:14-30.

Zephaniah describes the Day of the Lord, "...That day will be a day of wrath, of distress and anguish, a day of ruin and devastation... I will bring such distress upon people that they shall walk like the blind; because they have sinned against the Lord". The Psalmist sings, "...for a thousand years in your sight are like yesterday when it is past...the days of our life are seventy years, or perhaps eighty, if we are strong; even then their span is only toil and trouble; they are soon gone, and we fly away". Paul describes the Day of the Lord as, "the Day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night" Paul's recommendation to the faith community is to be sober, wear the breastplate of faith and love, and the helmet of the hope of salvation.. Thus, Paul tells us that it matters not 'when the Day of the Lord is to be, what matters is that we are prepared! On the subject of the Day of the Lord, even Our Lord Jesus said that He did not know the day or the hour. How then do some modern clergy claim to have the secret? Consider that for each of us, when we are called home, that is our 'Day of the Lord'. Let us so live, dear Christian, that when the summons comes to us, that we go joyously leaving behind no good thing undone, leaving behind no broken promises nor harsh memories.

Matthew gives us what has come to be called the tale of the talents [talent = a weight measure of precious metal]. An owner [god] gives one of his servants five talents, another two talents, and another one talent. The owner leaves for a long period of time. On his return the servants with the ten and five talents have doubled the owners' investment. The servant with the one talent has done nothing but hide the talent. He blames the owner for being a harsh man so that the servant was scared to do anything with his talent. The owner takes the talent from this lazy servant and gives it to the servant with ten talents. Upon reflection, one can believe that the owner would not care if the servant had lost his talent while trying to achieve more, but could not abide a servant who, for whatever reason, failed to try his best with what he was given. # Open Letter

It has come to the attention of the officials of Hansford County, Texas and the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) that rendering companies have now begun to charge for the removal of the carcasses of dead cattle. It has been the practice to drag the "deads" to the ditches, and in many cases the roadside, so that the carcass would be handy for the "used cow" truck to pick up and remove.

This practice is not acceptable unless the cattle producer intends to have the carcass picked up. Dragging the carcass to any high-

way, farm-to-market road or county road and leaving it is a violation of common littering laws, as well as a violation of the solid waste disposal provisions of Texas Law. In addition to being against the law, the carcasses pose a traffic hazard, a health hazard, and makes for unsightly roadsides.

The purpose of this letter is to inform cattle producers that Hansford County officials will investigate complaints of cattle dumping and take action to discourage the activity. Cattle producers should be aware that cattle

dumping on state and county rights of way is illegal and there are misdemeanor and even felony sanctions to punish those responsible. Neither Hansford County nor TxDOT will remove these carcasses.

The officials of Hansford County and TxDOT are counting on your cooperation so that the roadsides of our county remain clear.

Remember, dumping dead cattle near highways and roadways is illegal.

## Cotton, Irrigation Take Center Stage at Annual Farm Management Symposium

Growing interest in cotton in the northern High Plains is multiplying production issues and questions.

The 21st annual Panhandle Farm and Ranch Management Symposium will address some of those questions, as well as irrigation issues. The symposium will be on Dec. 1 as a part of the Amarillo Farm and Ranch Show.

"As the cost of fuel increases and the availability of water decreases, farmers are looking for crops that require less water," said Leon Church, Texas Cooperative Extension agent in Potter County and moderator for the program. "Cotton fits that bill."

Registration begins at 8 a.m. in the Grand Plaza at the Amarillo Civic Center.

Dr. Randy Boman, Extension cotton specialist from Lubbock,

will start the program at 8:30 a.m. by addressing the agronomic aspects of cotton production.

Brant Baugh, Extension integrated pest management agent from Lubbock, will follow with a discussion on insect pests, especially thrips, in cotton.

Rising fuel costs also are prompting producers to determine the most efficient way to irrigate, which includes not only looking at fuel, but also timing and rates.

Leon New, Extension irrigation specialist, will address this on the program by discussing various irrigation pump fuel options.

Following New, the latest version of the Texas High Plains Evapotranspiration Network will be unveiled by Thomas Marek, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station engineer from Amarillo, and Dr. Dana Porter,

Extension/Experiment Station engineer and irrigation specialist from Lubbock.

The network is an irrigation scheduling tool already being used by some producers. However, Marek said, the newest version will allow the producer much more individual adaptation.

Levon Harmon of the Texas Department of Agriculture will wrap up the program with pesticide laws and regulations training.

Participants can receive three pesticide license continuing education units and three certified crop advisor units - one in integrated pest management, one in laws and regulations, and one general.

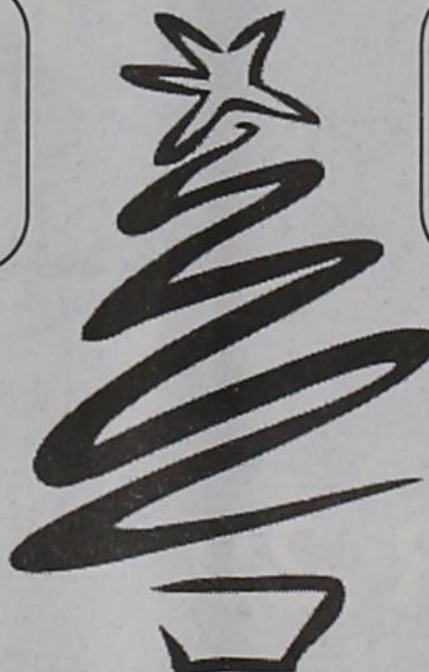



# Museum Founders Remembered Our Lady... Clementine and Our Gentleman, Gus

Panhandle near Texhoma. Sorrow struck the family in 1939 when Gus' dad died. After WW II Mother Renner and Gus moved to town. Brothers, Ralph and Clarence (C.J.), came home from the service and started farming. The other members of the Renner family were a little scattered but close. Leona remained in Kansas and Eleanor was near Guymon. Mrs. Renner passed away in 1949. Not long after that Gus renewed his acquaintance with Clementine Stewart and they married September 16, 1952 at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Spearman. They farmed and ran cattle for many years.

They were both active in the community and their church. Gus was a board member of Texhoma Wheat Growers for thirty-five years retiring in 1974. He served from 1955 until 1976 on the Board of Directors of Producers' Grain Corporation, Amarillo, Texas, District 1 serving as President for a time. He served on the Board of the North Plains Water District and was a Vice-President.

Clementine was a charter member of the Sacred Heart Catholic Women's Guild and was named Diocesan Council of Catholic Women's Woman of the Year in 1990. She was a member of the Twentieth Century Club, a Hospital Auxiliary member, volunteered for the American Cancer Society, a charter member of the Hansford Historical Commission and was awarded a Merit of Historical Preservation by the Texas Historical Commission in 1991. She and Gus were co-founders of the Stationmaster's House Museum.

The Renner's were such dear

people and good friends to me as well as many others. Even their very over-weight, home-made gravy fed "little" dog, Misty, was special. Gus would lift her down from the pickup and bring her into Consumers Sales Company where I worked at the time for a morning visit. Then they would be off most likely to check on what we know as "the pink houses" or the farm. (The pink houses are now what's known as "The Clementine Bed and Breakfast" and 3J Beef. The home in town is known as "The Clementine-Town House".) The Renner's and Misty are watching over all of us; making sure we are carrying on with the Museum. We're trying, friends ... we're trying!

If you say anything at all about the Station Master's House Museum you nearly have to say Clementine and Gus Renner at the same time. So as the Museum prepares for it's 30th anniversary it is only fitting that we visit a little about those two very important people.

According to the Hansford County History Book Clementine's story begins by saying that three of her grandparents were born in foreign countries. How lucky for us that they chose to come to the United States and Hansford County. Clementine's father, Joe Venneman, and his brother, Ben decided to go West and settled in Hansford County. They did return east to marry their boyhood sweethearts and return to the Panhandle with their brides.

Clementine's mother, Hattie, was one part of a set of twins born to Joseph and Lena (Bensen) Schwarzman. The Venneman's lived all of their married life in Hansford County. They were farmers and ranchers and raised Clementine and brother, John, around that life.

Clementine married John M. Stewart and they lived about 1 1/2 miles east of the Bernstein Elevators. After his death in 1944 Clementine remained on the farm for six years farming and enjoying her dog, Colonel. Her brother helped her with the farming; then later Dude and Lena Barnes took over those chores. Clementine built her new house in town in 1950 and moved to the city.

Now Gus's family started out in Baden, Germany. Gus' grandfather came to America and was part of the Union forces during the Civil War. Later he moved to Indiana where he married Mary Schriener and they had six children. One of the six was August J. Renner, Gus' father. The family ended up on a

farm 20 miles west of Wichita, Kansas.

The maternal side of the family were from Illinois. They were Theodore and Ann Foppe. They along with their eleven children left Illinois settling on a farm 23 miles west of Wichita, Kansas.

Since they were neighbors it seems only fitting that at some point romance would fill the air. And it did when August J. Renner met Mary Albers there and they were married in 1909. They settled three miles from where Mary grew up and they farmed there. In 1931 they moved to the Texas

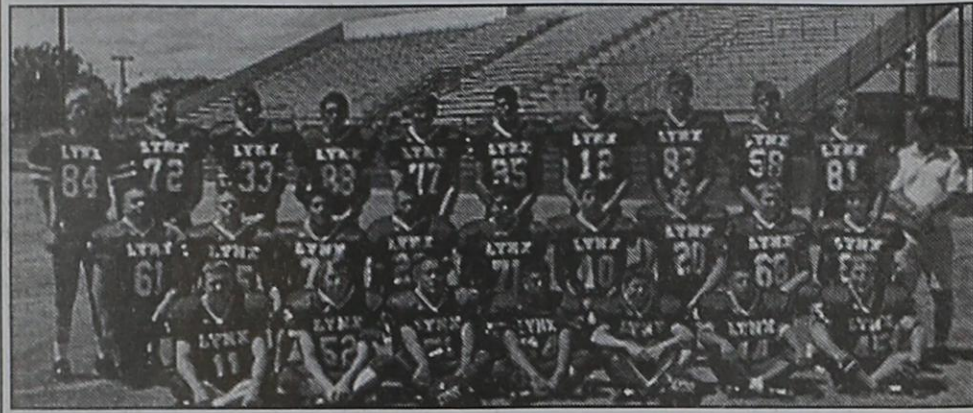

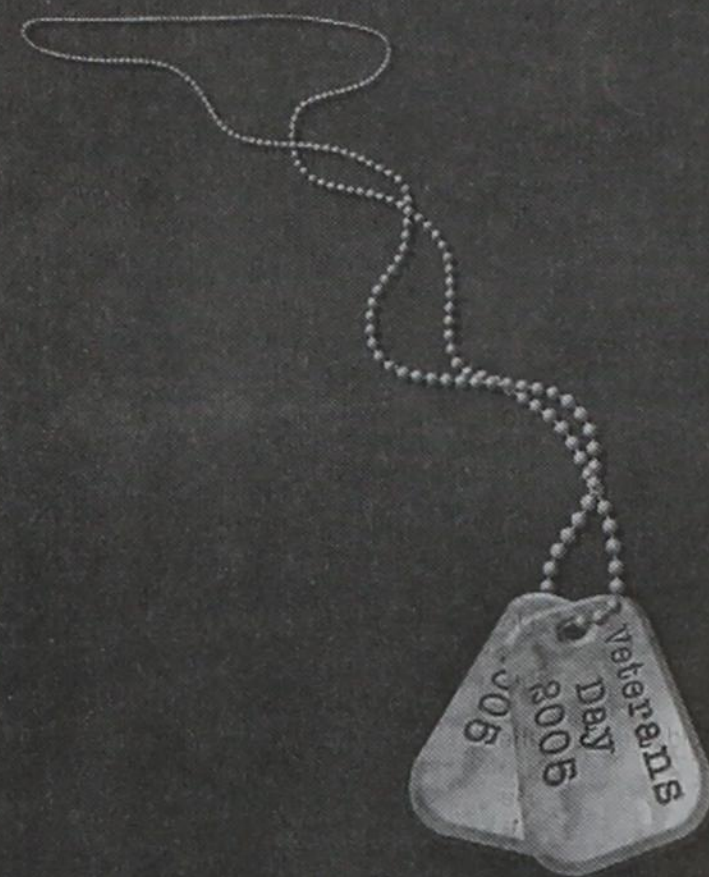

# Muesum celebrates 30th year

The Stationmaster's House Museum will celebrate its thirty year with an "Open House" on Sunday, November 13th from 1-4 pm. They will be serving refreshments and giving museum tours during this time.

In an interview with me on KRDF-FM Radio, Spearman on July 2, 1998 Clementine Renner told me that in 1963 Hansford County Judge, Johnny Lee, called her about a museum for Hansford County. He had noticed the surrounding counties had museums and Historical Commissions and didn't she think Hansford County needed that, too. As Clementine reflected "It kind-of started slowly". The Hansford County Historical Commission was soon formed with Lee McClellan, Gertie Archer, Gwenfred Lackey, Tom Jones and Clementine Renner. Then in turn the Museum Board was started.

Somewhere around 1974 a location was needed and the old Santa Fe Stationmaster's House seem the best beginning for the museum. It was where the station master or depot agent lived from around 1919 or 1920. It belonged to Lloyd Winslow "Duke" and Rose Roberts. They were contacted and the price was \$3500.00. Duke had purchased the house from the Santa Fe Railroad and he sold it for exactly what they had originally paid for it. Gwenfred Lackey donated the first money toward the building but the Board decided to borrow the money and go on with the Museum. Eventually local pioneers and history buffs, N.F. "Gus" and Clementine (Venneman) Renner, paid the note off on the house.

In 1984 the next addition to the museum was the old Santa Fe Depot that was located at the end of Main Street. Next came the first white settlement north of the Canadian was Zulu Stockade, which was founded by the Cator Brothers, south of Gruver in Hansford County. It's replica was the next addition to the Museum complex in September 1992.

Then the Santa Fe caboose now found it's way to the museum. Now

that's a story. It was purchased for approximately \$3,000.00 from Santa Fe and the caboose was located in San Bernardino, CA. At that time cabooses were only put on the end of trains carrying radioactive materials. Somehow the caboose got lost on it's way to Hansford County and ended up in Brownwood. It was ready to continue it's journey to Tennessee when Santa Fe found it. Finally, it arrived in Spearman. The ties and rail were donated by Santa Fe with the ballast being donated by the people building Palo Duro Dam. Gus Renner, J.D. Wilbanks and Irvin Boyd laid the track. A Baker and Taylor Drilling Company crew with Harvey "Red" Whitefield at the helm went into action to move the caboose from the railroad yards to the museum. Some of the helpers were Ted Whitefield, Mark Parker and the little "straw boss", Edward Mayfield. They had quite an adventure getting that caboose moved and re-located.

After the caboose came the old Palo Duro School House once located near what is now Palo Duro

Dam. The school house was originally a post office from Waka. Sandy and Otto Drake were using it for storage and they decided to donate the building and the 20th Century Club paid for having it moved and for a foundation.

Next in 1994 came the big addition of the Harry and Margaret Shedeck Wagon Barn. The Shedeck family donated the Shedeck Wagon driven in the Rolling Plains Mule Train for many years. The problem was that there was no place to display it but soon the Wagon Barn came into being.

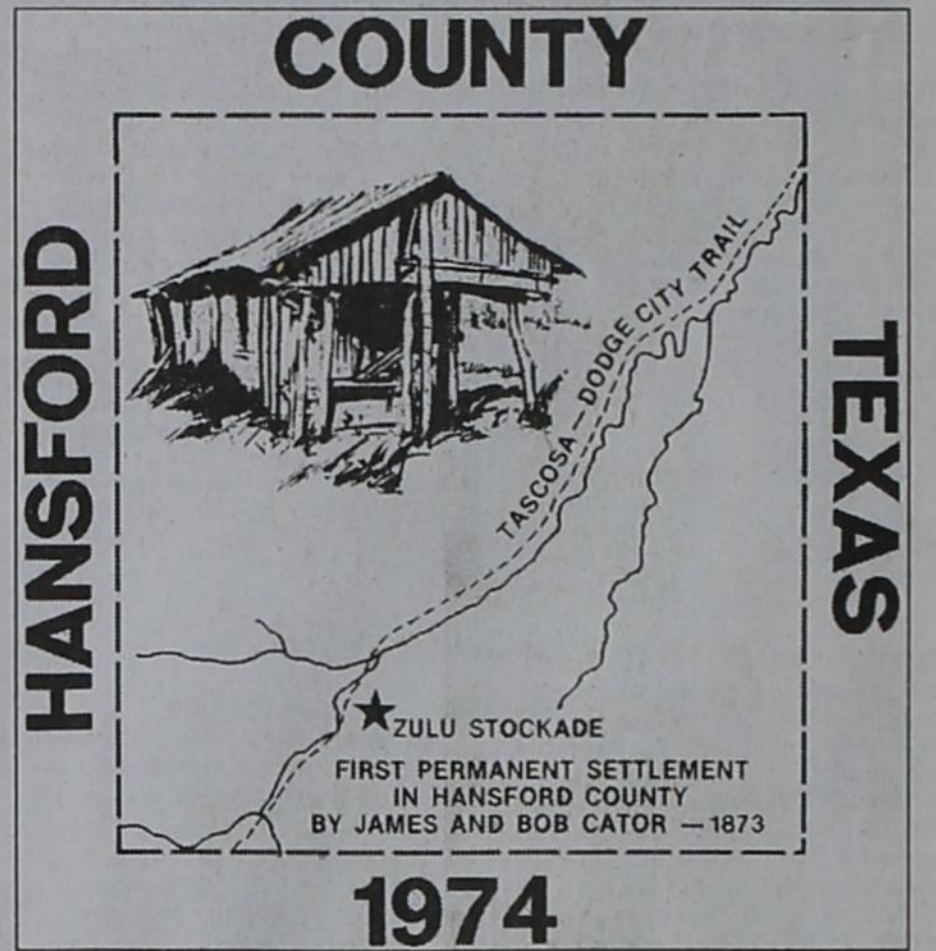
Then the museum Board managed to purchase the land behind and across the alley from the Stationmaster's House. The land was from the Frank Dressen family and purchased from their granddaughter, Bonnie Cox, with a generous donation from the Evelyn Gilpatrick Estate.

So with the much needed land problem out of the way the next thing was display space. That's when Board members Lester Denton and Ruby McLain began

contacting local banks. With the money donated by Gruver State Bank; First National Bank, Spearman; First State Bank, Spearman; Interstate Bank; Marshall Cator and other generous contributors a spacious 90 X 42 Morton building was erected. It is now known as the Cator-Gilpatrick addition. Now they are filling it up.

Come by and see the museum. The Board members along with Reba Hunter, Marilyn Been and Wilma Francis look forward to seeing you.

Special Note: Don't forget the Museum with memorials and general donations of monies as well as your family history items. They need both. Let's keep all Hansford County History in Hansford County!
