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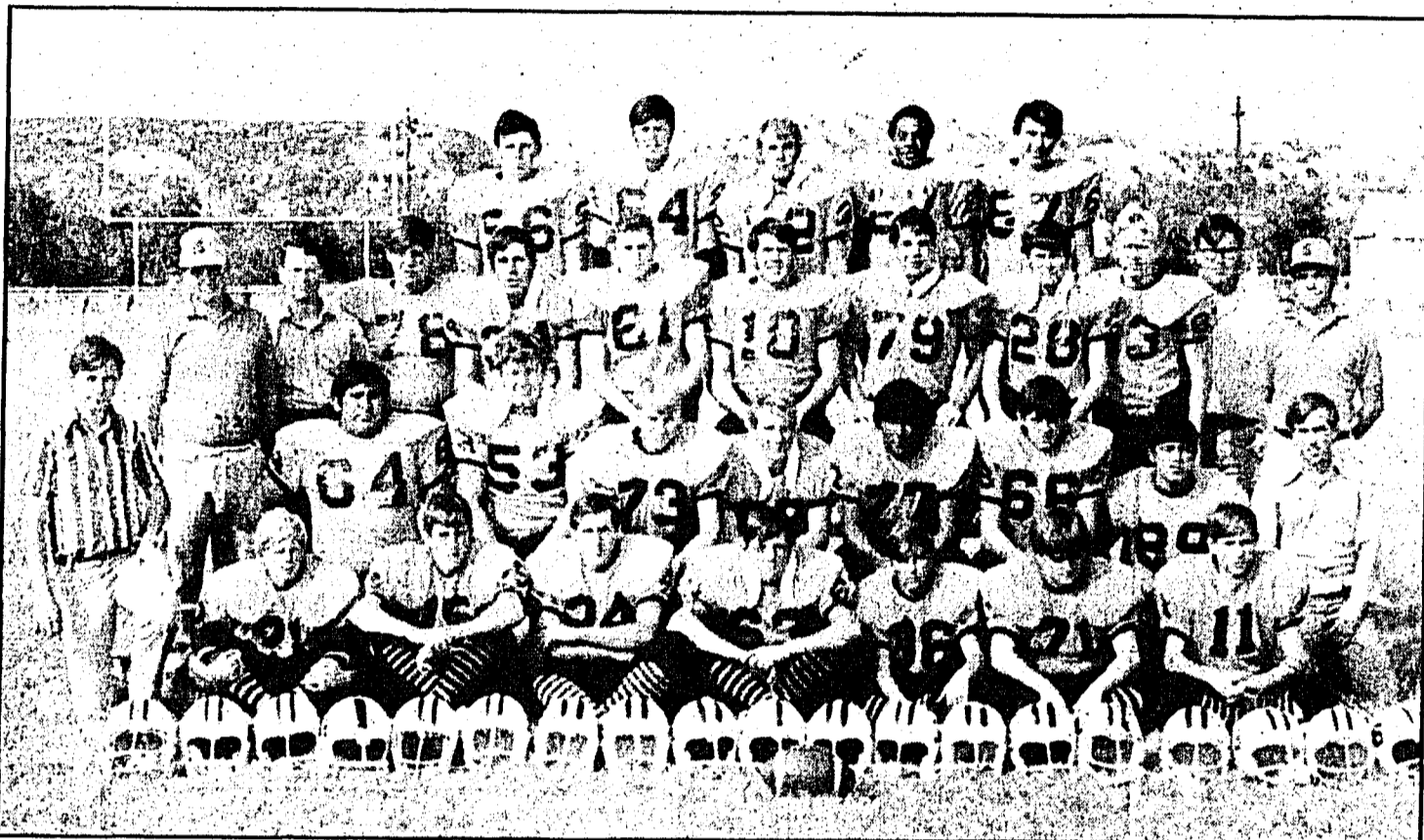

Town Meeting Addresses Use Of Economic Sales Tax And Prospects For Future

About twenty to twenty-five people attended a meeting last Thursday evening to hear questions raised and answered concerning the one-cent economic sales tax proposed by City Council and coming up for election on August 12.

Among those on hand to help answer questions and/or talk about the ramifications of the tax and how it has helped other communities were Larry Sanders representing Senator Bill Sims, Mike Martindale with WTU's Community Development office, Jim Brook of the State Comptroller's office and State Representative Bob Turner.

The meeting was led by Mayor Danny Kellar and Robert Noriega, member of the Santa Anna Development Board.

Turner told of how the Coleman Development Board was able to use the tax collected in that city to lure and establish two manufacturing

firms there within the past year and also helped another manufacturing concern which has been in business in Coleman County for many years and employs several hundred people, all of which had a major positive impact on Coleman and Coleman County. One firm moved to Coleman with the help of the Development Board which provided only expenses for the moving of equipment. Another was lured there by the board financing the building in which the manufacturing business would be located.

The audience was told that the tax could be of benefit for business expansion which is not necessarily "bankable" according to certain guidelines but of sound business venture.

Jim Brooks pointed out that companies looking for a place to locate often ask which communities have economic sales tax with the idea that "it is a competitive step

up" and affords opportunities for future expansion.

Martindale related that WTU, and others, periodically allocate funds to aid in community development programs for communities in their

service areas which are actively showing initiative in helping themselves. He also told the group that WTU would offer free consulting services which if contracted somewhere else would amount to thousands of dollars.

Senator Bill Sim's aide, Larry Sanders said, "The cost of surviving is going up, but growth is imperative. A community either continues to grow, or it withers away. There is no standing still." He added that property values would go up with each progress made in the community.

Jim Brooks pointed out that the ballot for the August 12 election on the sales tax issue would actually have two propositions. There will be a vote on the 1/2 cent economic sales tax and another on the 1/2 cent property tax relief with the possibility of one passing without the other.

The Santa Anna Development Board has estimated the one-cent combined tax could generate from \$10,000 to \$20,000 for economic development and property tax relief.

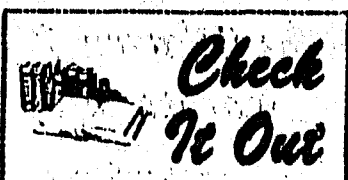

The petition for Coleman County Telephone Cooperative to expand Toll-Free calling to the Coleman exchange has caused a lot of dissension in the county. If I just pay \$3.50, someone else who doesn't call Coleman will have to pay the remaining \$6.50. That is not right. There are a lot of elderly people in this county who live on a low income and have children and doctors in other counties, if they are forced to pay the telephone bills for us who like to call Coleman, just please tell me who is going to pay their bills so they can call their children and doctors.

Some say this Toll-Free calling is for business calls. I'm probably a little bit dumb, but if I had a business that didn't make money enough to pay for phone calls to take care of it, I'd sweet talk that business off on someone else in one heck of a hurry, though not to an old person.

Please don't believe that this "I talk, you pay" deal will never be more than \$3.50, in time it will be.

CHILD SUPPORT: QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Child support enforcement, which comprises more than

half of our agency's personnel, is one of our crucial missions. When your child needs help getting a non-custodial parent to pay court-ordered child support payments, we stand ready to help.

Child support is a complex is-

sue. It can be a confusing process for our customers as well. The following are some of the most frequently asked questions and answers regarding child support.

What does the OAG Child Support Division do?

We are responsible for establishing paternity, locating non-custodial parents, establishing and modifying child support orders, establishing and modifying medical support orders, enforcing delinquent child support orders, and collecting and distributing child support payments.

Who can apply for child support services and what is the fee?

We accept applications from both custodial parents and non-custodial parents. Our attorneys do not represent either parent, rather they represent the State of Texas in providing child support services. We are required to provide all appropriate services for the benefit of Texas children — we cannot pick and choose our clients. There is no fee for services provided by our office.

Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) recipients automatically become a part of our caseload. Persons not on AFDC must apply directly with our office for child support services.

Where do I apply?

We operate child support enforcement field offices around the state where people may apply for services. The telephone numbers and addresses for these offices are in local telephone books. You may also call our toll free phone number (800-252-8014) to request an application.

Do other agencies handle child support enforcement cases?

In Texas, county-operated domestic relations or child support offices, private attorneys, and private collections agencies also provide some child support enforcement services.

How long will it take before payments begin?

That varies on a case-by-case basis. For example, your case might require the full gamut of services — locating the non-custodial parent, establishing paternity, obtaining a support order, and enforcing the order. Or you might have all the necessary information and groundwork already laid out. In that case, you may begin to receive payments much sooner.

What information does we need to locate a non-custodial parent?

The most important information an applicant can provide, aside from the non-custodial parent's current address and social security number, is the name and address of the non-custodial parent's employer. If the current employer is not known, the name and address of the last known employer should be provided.

Other very useful information about the non-custodial parent includes his or her social security number, date of birth, names and addresses of relatives and friends, and names of organizations, unions, or clubs to which he or she belongs. It is also helpful to have the names of the non-custodial parent's banks or creditors and a list of the places where he or she spends free time.

What documents do I need?

If available, child support applicants should submit copies of the following:

- Divorce decree or separation agreement (necessary only if you were married to the other parent).
- The children's birth certificates.
- All documents which may reflect both parents' income and assets, such as paycheck stubs, tax returns, and bank statements.
- Copy of court order for child support (if you have one).
- Evidence of payment history (if you have one).

How do AFDC recipients seek child support?

To receive AFDC benefits

through the Texas Department of Human Services, you must cooperate with our efforts to identify the non-custodial parent and collect child support. In addition, the state of Texas will recoup the AFDC payments made by the state from the noncustodial parent.

Santa Anna ISD Letter to Households (Multi-Child) National School Lunch/Breakfast Program

The Santa Anna Independent School District Meals serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.00 from pre-kindergarten through 6th grade and \$1.25 from 7th grade through 12th grade. Children may buy breakfast for \$.60 (60 cents). Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

TO GET FREE OR REDUCED-PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILDREN, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. WE CANNOT APPROVE AN APPLICATION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.

HOW TO APPLY
If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the children you are applying for, an application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member.

If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature.

If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from., the signature of an adult household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

VERIFICATION: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

FAIR HEARING: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing:
Superintendent of Schools, Dean Bass, phone 348-3136, P.O. Box 99, Santa Anna, Texas 76878.

REPORTING CHANGES: If your children get the free or reduced-price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving in come information.

CONFIDENTIALITY: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get the free or reduced-price meals.

REAPPLICATION: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

HANDICAPPED: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

IN THE OPERATION OF THE CHILD FEEDING PROGRAMS, NO CHILD WILL BE DISCRIMINATED AGAINST BECAUSE OF RACE, CREED, SEX, COLOR, NATIONAL ORIGIN, AGE OR HANDICAP. IF YOU BELIEVE YOU HAVE BEEN DISCRIMINATED AGAINST, WRITE IMMEDIATELY TO THE SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE, WASHINGTON, D.C. 20250.

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
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
