The cancellation of these bonds will result in an appreciable saving and aid us in our efforts to reduce the indebtedness and cost of operation.

Chevrolet Used Car Outlook For 1941

DETROIT, Jan. 30.—Chevrolet dealers' continuance, during 1940, of used car sales gains evident since the factory's used car merchandising program was launched several years ago, assures still greater emphasis, in 1941, on the used car reconditioning system which from the standpoint of the buyer is the most vital feature of the program. W. E. Holler, general sales manager, and sponsor of the highly-successful operation, made this announcement here today.

AGRICULTURAL ACTIVITIES

To show that the vocational agriculture students in our school are learning by doing as well as by studying books, a new series of articles is being started this week. This series, Agriculture Activities, each week will tell of one boy's supervised practice program in Agriculture.

Tom Jeff Lee, that tall blond senior, has studied vocational agriculture in Abernathy High for three years. During these years his vocational program has netted him \$709 and his farm equipment is valued at \$150. Tom has been an active member of the F. F. A. throughout high school and this term he was elected treasurer of the organization.

In his first year in Agriculture, 1937-38, his farm projects included pigs, baby chicks, cotton and maize.

Tom raised six pigs from one sow; the net profit was \$34. Out of a hundred-fifty baby chicks he raised 90% and the profit was \$15. His five acres of cotton, from which he made \$61, averaged a half bale an acre. Tom Jeff's maize crop, which was five acres, averaged a ton an acre and his profit was \$30. His total profit for that year was \$150.

His second year in vocational agriculture, 1938-39, showed an advancement. He supervised five projects from which he made \$235. His hundred laying hens netted him \$40. A profit of \$25 was made from a sow and seven pigs. Tom's six-hundred baby chicks that year made him \$75; He raised 95% of them. His five acres of cotton averaged a half bale an acre, showed a profit of \$60. \$35 was made from five acres of maize which averaged a ton an acre.

During his final year in agriculture, 1939-40, Tom made \$334.90 from six projects. Two hundred laying hens showed a net profit of \$174.90. From two sows he raised thirteen pigs and made \$35. Ninety-eight percent of three hundred baby chicks were raised that year, making a profit of \$30. His five acres of cotton, from which he made \$60, averaged a half bale an acre. Tom Jeff's five-acre maize crop averaged a half ton an acre and he made \$30. Also, that year he made \$5 from twenty-five capons.

Although Tom Jeff has furnished the high school course in vocational project. For this year they include: a hundred-fifty laying hens, seven and a half acres of cotton, and three hundred baby chicks.

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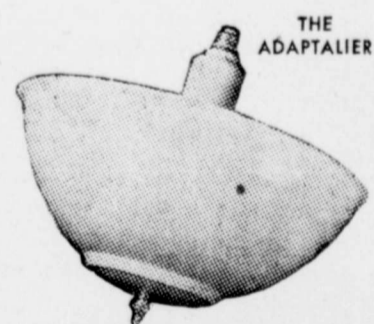
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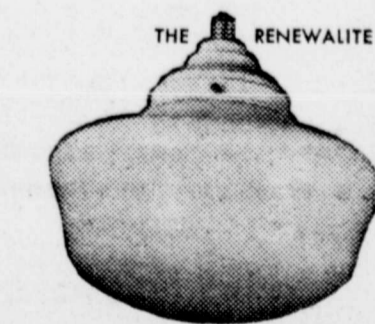

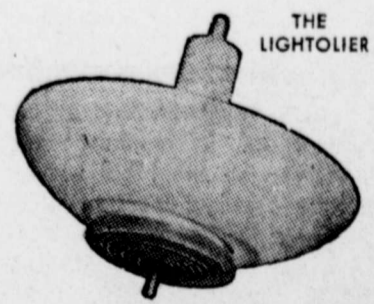
