We are glad to see that our cause has been joined by none other than our one-time boss, Wes Izzard of The Amarillo Globe-Times.

The Olton Enterprise was among the first to plead for a division of Texas into five states as provided under the treaty by which Texas became a part of the US in 1845.

Our reasons for desiring this division are many. It would give us here on the High Plains a state capitol that would be accessible.

We suggest Plainview for the capitol of our portion of the state because if it were a toss up between Amarillo and Lubbock the struggle no doubt would end in a blood feud as bitter as the one between Guthrie and Oklahoma City.

Olton is closer to three other state capitols than it is to Austin. They are Santa Fe, NM, Oklahoma City and Denver. Mr. Izzard came out strong for division of the state early this week. We just want to remind The Globe-Times that division of Texas has been and still is a major project of The Olton Enterprise.

New Elevator Being Built; Completion Slated Sept. 1

A brand new half-million bushel grain elevator and grain storage facility is being built at the western outskirts of Olton.

The new firm will be officially known as Olton Grain, Inc., and will be operated by W. N. "Bill" Yates. Glenn Singletery also will be associated with the grain business.

Owners of the new grain company, other than Mr. Yates, include Frank Cornelius, J. C. Hamby, Jack Straw, Brent Burrow and D. M. Granbery. The business will be operated as a corporation.

Mr. Yates said company grounds will cover a plot of nine acres on Highway 70, east of Straw-Burrow Gin.

The plot will have a frontage of 500 feet and a depth of 565 feet, Mr. Yates reported.

Physical facilities will include two grain tanks and a flat storage building. These will be served by two unloading pits.

The firm will be equipped with

a continuous-flow grain dryer. The scales will be 60-foot truck scales.

Also to be erected is a \$7,000 office building which will be made of steel. It will be centrally heated and airconditioned.

Construction is being done by Panhandle Steel Company of Amarillo. That firm also is building roads to the grain firm off the highway.

Roads for access and exit will be covered with caliche and gravel. Mr. Yates said completion is expected by Sept. 1. Cost of the project will run near \$150,000.

Mr. Yates said his firm will engage both in government storage and in buying and selling of grain.

Mr. Singletery has been in the grain business here about three years. He had been in that business several years before moving to Olton.

Mr. Yates has lived here at Olton for the past 27 years, and is well known throughout the area. He formerly was in the service

station business and the butane business. He also has farmed in this community.

Land for the construction site was purchased by the corporation from B. F. Findley.

Stockholders Get \$141,000 In Dividends At Co-Op Meet

Olton economy got a mid-summer shot in the arm Saturday night to the tune of \$141,504.87 as dividend checks were handed out

at the annual meeting of stockholders of Olton Co-Op Gin. Manager Lloyd Graham said that in addition to the dividends

paid, the gin also this year is installing \$45,000 worth of new equipment—all paid for. Checks handed out Saturday

night brought cash dividends paid during the five-year tenure of Mr. Graham as manager to \$870,950.91. Last year the dividend checks came to \$228,804.50. Ginning for the 1956-57 season was a whopping 20,647 bales.

Between 1,300 and 1,400 went through the serving lines for barbecued beef and barbecued chicken, served to stockholders and guests.

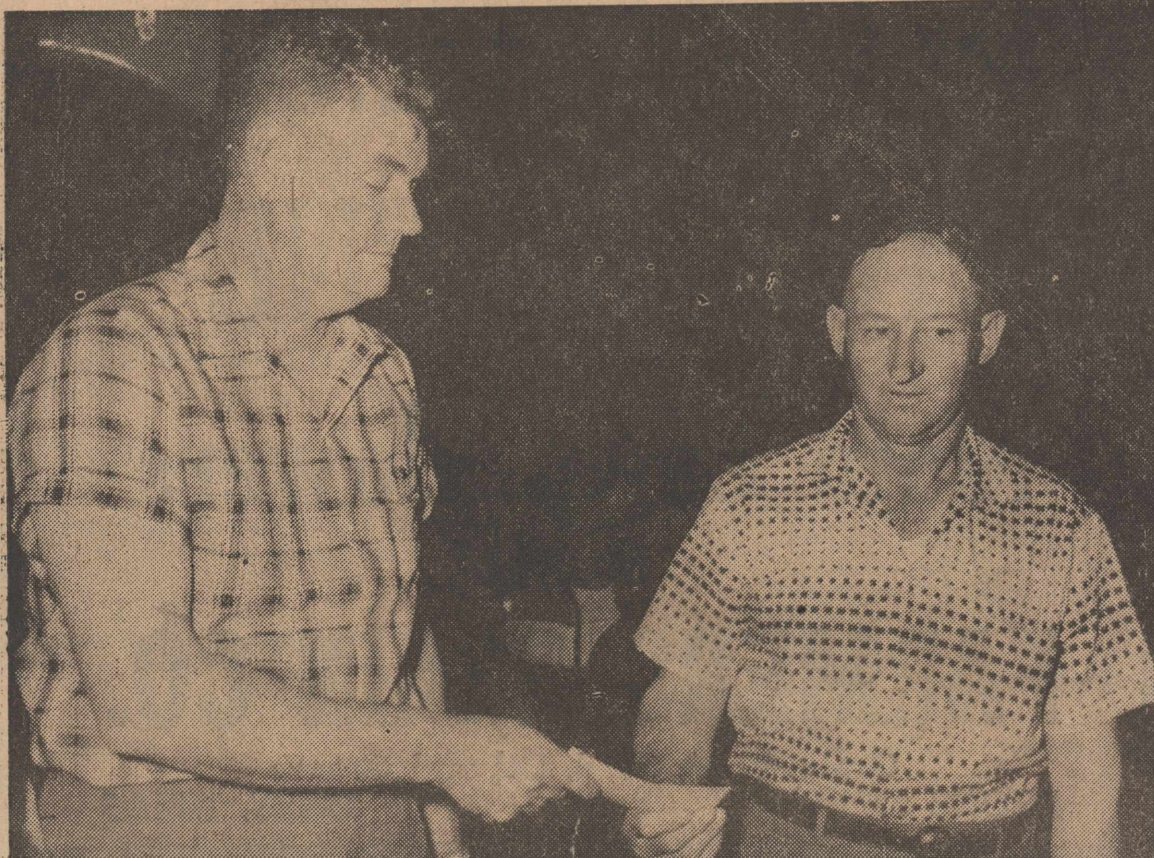

Making the annual audit report to the stockholders was Alex Williams of Williams & Merriman, an auditing firm of Muleshoe.

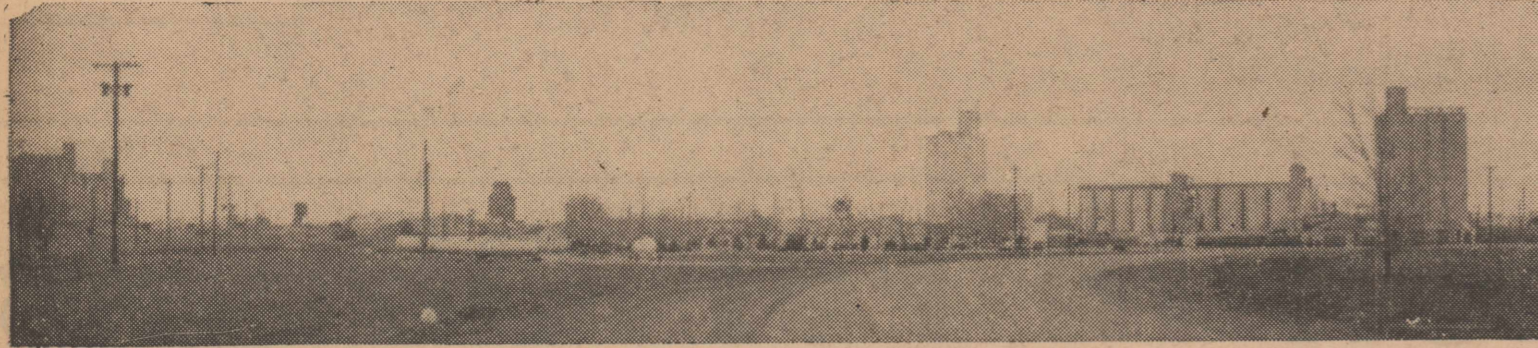

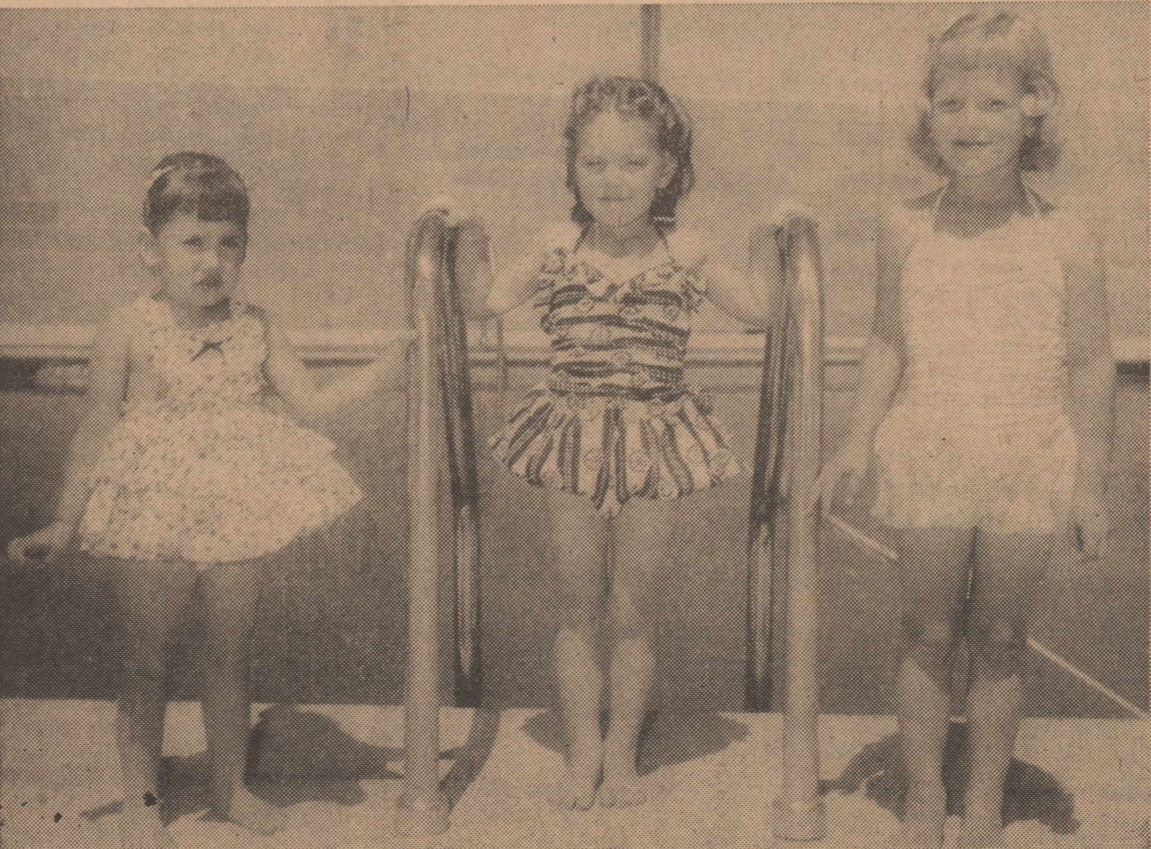

Bennett Cerf's Vest Pocket Book Of Jokes For All Occasions, published by Random House, only 95c.

Never again will I underestimate the power and the need of the right kind of advertising in our way of life.

For after reading the current best-seller, Madison Avenue, USA by Martin Mayer, published by Harper and Brothers \$4.95, I decided that successful advertising is an art—a dignified art that requires the talents of a genius.

This story of the ten billion dollar plus advertising agencies on Madison Avenue in New York and the products they have made famous (brand names) and the people they have made rich is at times fascinating reading.

But the book is important to us because creative advertising is affecting our thinking and our way of life.

And John Caples, the vice-president of one of the bigger advertising agencies, has written a book called Making Ads Pay, published by Harpers at \$4.50.

The basic fundamentals of advertising presented simply and effectively in this book should prove useful to anyone in business, no matter how large or how small the business may be.

Mr. Caples tells us how to write advertising copy that will attract and hold people—advertising copy

that will create desire. It is a very readable book, and I was especially delighted with all the valuable know-how in the field of mail order advertising.

And in conclusion Mr. Caples quotes, "It is better to light one candle than to curse the darkness," and he applies this to advertising.

To prove his point that good advertising does make a worthwhile contribution to our way of living, he quotes Franklin D. Roosevelt as follows:

"If I were starting life over again, I am inclined to think that I would go into the advertising business in preference to almost any other. This is because advertising has come to cover the whole range of human needs and also because it combines real imagination with a deep study of human psychology. Because it brings to the greatest number of people actual knowledge concern-

ing useful things, it is essentially a form of education—it has risen with ever-growing rapidity to the dignity of an art. It is constantly paving new paths. The general raising of the standards of modern civilization among all groups of people during the past half century would have been impossible without the spreading of the knowledge of higher standards by means of advertising."

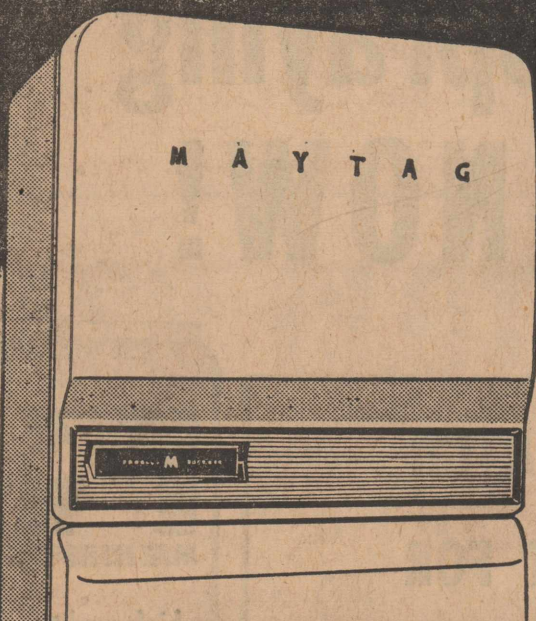

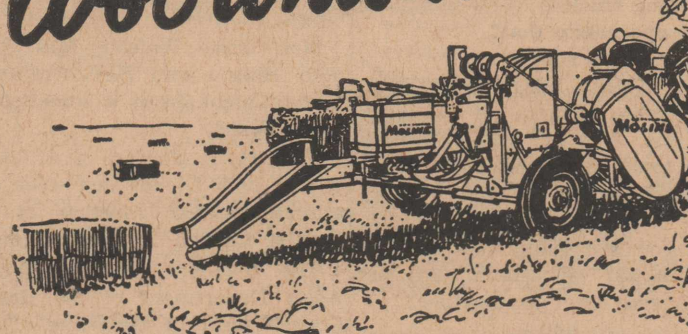

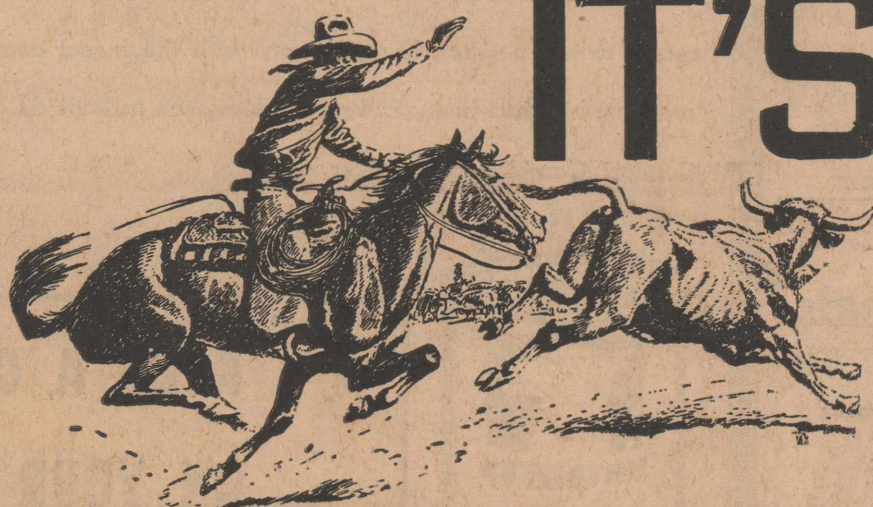
