U. S. TROOPS PURSUE BANDITS

Ratify or Reject Says President

By C. L. MARTIN (United Press Staff Correspondent) WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—The Senate must accept the peace treaty and the League of Nations covenant as they stand, or reject them utterly, President Wilson told the Senate foreign relations committee at the White House today.

There can be neither amendment or reservation in the ratification resolution if the Senate would avoid sending the compact back both to the allies and Germany for reconstruction and re-acceptance, he said. The president added, however, with reference to Article X: "I do hope that you are at liberty contemporaneously with our acceptance of the treaty, to interpret our moral obligations under that article."

In a prepared statement to the committee the president also declared there could be no reasonable objections to interpretations accompanying the act of ratification, providing they do not form a part of the ratification resolutions. "I hope too, that this conference will be held in this way to my intimation that I would be of service to it. I welcome the opportunity for a frank and full interchange of views."

Answers Every Inquiry. Meeting a rapid fire of most searching questions, which went into minute details of the drawing up of his plan for a League of Nations, the president answered every inquiry promptly. "That Article X may come some time upon this country 'compelling moral obligation,' the president did not deny, but when the time comes, he asserted, complete freedom of action remains with the United States.

The committee's questions were decided in large measure in dealing with the extent to which the United States is bound by the League, the Shantung settlement and the effect of reservations.

Secret Treaties. President Wilson, as well as Secretary Lansing, knew nothing of secret treaties between Great Britain, France and Japan until after he reached Paris, he admitted.

He said further that he did not know when the existence of secret treaties affecting the Far East was made known to China. Arriving in Paris the president said, it was suggested at a meeting of the council of ten that all these understandings be laid on the table. The president did not know whether this was China's first knowledge of the treaties or not.

ROMANIANS HAVE PRESENTED A NEW PLAN TO HUNGARY

PARIS, Monday, Aug. 18. (Havas.)—The Budapest newspapers state that the Rumanians have presented new armistice conditions to the Hungarian government, which has forwarded them to the Allies, according to a dispatch from the Hungarian capital. The Hungarian government has refused to accept any modifications of the terms of the armistice of November last, the dispatch adds.

ARCHDUKE JOSEPH WILLING TO RESIGN BUT PROTEST MADE

BUDAPEST, Saturday, Aug. 19.—Archduke Joseph agreed today to resign as temporary dictator of the Hungarian government because of the socialist objections to him, but consented to remain in office for the time being when peasant leaders and members of the reactionary party protested. They declared they would cause the food blockade against Budapest to be re-established unless he continued to act as regent.

HOSTILITIES BETWEEN GERMANS AND POLES RESULTS IN FORMER BEING DRIVEN ACROSS BORDER

WARSAW, Monday, Aug. 18.—Hostilities broke out today between the Germans and Poles on the southeastern Silesian frontier, the Germans suddenly attacking the Polish lines and occupying two villages. The Polish population rose and drove them out and occupied two villages on the German side of the line of demarcation. Herbert Hoover, chairman of the Allied relief organization, who is visiting Poland, immediately ordered American army officers in the area to co-operate in an effort to bring about a cessation of hostilities.

HOUSE PASSES DAYLIGHT REPEAL OVER VETO OF PRESIDENT WILSON

BOLSHEVIKI SHIPS ARE REPORTED SUNK DURING ENGAGEMENT

HELINGFORS, Monday, Aug. 18.—The bolshevik battleship Andrej Petrovich, the battle cruiser Petrovskiy, a transport and a guard ship are reported to have been sunk during an engagement with the British fleet in the Gulf of Finland on Sunday. The British are said to have lost three motor boats and to have had eight officers and three men killed.

ADJUTANT GENERAL IS INVESTIGATING IN OIL DISTRICTS

FORT WORTH, Aug. 19.—An investigation of reports of oil-breaking in various oil districts of West Texas is being conducted today by Adjutant General Harley, who left here last night for Gorman as his first stop. He expects to visit the Burk Burnett district next. From the latter place he has received a request for Texas rangers, but before they are sent, he will personally look into conditions. He brought one ranger as far as Fort Worth with him, but left him here for the present. The chief trouble at Burk Burnett is the thefts of pipe, machinery, tools, etc. The trouble at Gorman is not known here, neither is it by Harley, who merely received a summons to come to Gorman. Rangers already are maintained at Ranger but at no other point in the field.

MANY CITIES ARE REPRESENTED TODAY AT AUSTIN MEETING

AUSTIN, TEX., Aug. 19.—Forty-four Texas cities represented by mayors and city officials here today declared themselves as favoring the just and reasonable regulation of utilities providing transportation, communication, power, light and fuel. Discussion as to whether the regulation should be in the hands of a public utilities commission or left the individual cities began this afternoon. It was tentatively agreed that the decision of the meeting should be embodied in a bill to be submitted at the next special session of the legislature.

TELEPHONES FOR THE DEWASTED REGIONS

PARIS, Monday, Aug. 18.—Telephones for the devastated regions of Northern France are being provided by the French postoffice out of equipment purchased from the American army.

MILLION DOLLAR SUIT INVOLVED IN ACTION TO TRY TITLE TO LAND

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—Repeal of the daylight saving law was passed today over President Wilson's veto by the House on a vote of 223 to 101, seven more than the necessary two-thirds. The repeal now goes to the Senate, where its supporters claim victory.

SUIT FOR DAMAGES FOR \$160,000 FILED AGAINST MAGNOLIA

Suit for damages in the sum of \$160,000 was filed Tuesday in the 78th district court by F. C. Vogel and Ed Napier against the Magnolia Petroleum Co., in connection with a previously filed action by the same plaintiffs against the Sixteen Oil Co., et al, for \$200,000, for the drilling of a well on a tract in block 74 Red River Valley lands to which plaintiffs claim the fee ownership.

APPROXIMATELY 350,000 EMERGENCY SOLDIERS ARE YET TO BE DISCHARGED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—Approximately 350,000 emergency soldiers remained to be discharged August 15, the War Department today said. Sailings from Europe in the first ten days of this month totaled 25,000 and it is expected 75,000 more will have embarked by September 1. To complete the enlisted quota of a 225,000 army, now authorized, about 55,000 more enlistments will be needed.

TURKISH MINISTER OF WAR HAS RESIGNED

CONSTANTINOPLE, Friday, Aug. 15.—Nazim Pasha, minister of war, has resigned and the military governor of Constantinople has been dismissed as a result of the recent escape to Asia Minor of Halli Pasha and Kitchuk Talaat Bey, both prominent members of the Committee of Union and Progress.

MANY ARE INJURED DURING RIOTING AS RESULT OF STRIKE

BUTLER, PENNA., Aug. 19.—More than a score of persons were injured, several seriously, in a riot this morning between strikers of the Standard Steel Car Company's plant and non-union employees, two miles from the plant. A troop of state police which has been guarding the works were rushed to the scene.

NEGRO PRISONER IS SHOT DURING THE PROGRESS OF TRIAL

DALLAS, Aug. 19.—In a crowded court room, O. C. Potter, Grand Juror, Texas, today shot and seriously wounded Jim Anderson, negro, who had been in the number of Potter's brother several weeks ago, was just starting. Potter was arrested.

SEVEN THOUSAND SHOP WORKERS GO ON STRIKE TODAY

PITTSBURGH, PA., Aug. 19.—Seven thousand shipworkers employed at the plant of the Bethlehem Ship Building at Sparrows Point went on strike this morning in sympathy with the striking employees of the company's railroad. Work was halted on all ways at the yards. Nine ships are in course of construction there. The strikers demand the discharge of all non-union employees.

This, and other orders delivered today, will be deferred, and Washington will be notified of conclusions, in line with the request, and be given an opportunity to put on the additional services.

ANIMAL KILLED AS A RESULT OF INJURIES WHEN HIT BY AN AUTO

A Dodge roadster driven by J. T. Brown collided with a male team drawing a delivery wagon at Eighth and Travis streets Monday evening. One of the mules was so badly injured that it was necessary to kill it to put it out of its misery. Patrolman Miles shot the animal. A complaint charging reckless driving, was filed against Mr. Brown. The case will come up for hearing in the city court Wednesday morning.

CROSS INTO MEXICO FOLLOWING RELEASE OF TWO AVIATORS ON PAYMENT OF \$7,500.00 AS RANSOM

CANDELARIA, TEXAS, August 19.—(Via Army Field Telephone to Marfa.)—Troops of the Eighth Cavalry crossed the Mexican border at 6:40 o'clock this morning in pursuit of the bandits who held Aviators Peterson and Davis for ransom. Davis and Peterson accompanied the troops, acting as guides. Aviators are co-operating with the cavalry as scouts to locate the bandits on the Mexican side, flying over the Ojinaga district south of Candelaria. American troops of the Eighth Cavalry, with aviators flying bombing planes acting as scouts ahead of the columns, swept across the Mexican border early today as a punitive expedition in pursuit of the bandit band used Jesus Renteria, who held the American aviators, Peterson and Davis, prisoners in Mexico. It was announced at military headquarters here today.

Adequately Supported. The troops are supported by an adequate communication line, pack trains carrying the field wirelogs for use when out of touch with the aviators, who are scouting the entire Ojinaga district for the bandits. Lieutenants Davis and Peterson, mounted on horseback, were with the cavalrymen, acting as guides. It was planned that Davis and Peterson would take the troops to the place where the aviators were made prisoners Wednesday. Although Davis and Peterson were tired from the eight-day vigil, they ate an early breakfast and reported to Colonel Langhorne here and left with the first column of troops. Colonel Langhorne sent a message to General Antonio Pruneda, commander of the Ojinaga force, through the Mexican consul at Presidio, Texas, notifying Pruneda of the punitive expedition so the Mexican general would notify his troops in the field to prevent a possible clash between Carranza troops and American cavalry.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—Secretary of War Baker in the first statement he issued on the kidnaping of two army aviators late today declared he had ordered a "swiftly moving force" to take up pursuit of the bandit captors. Baker's statement came several hours after word reached the department through press dispatches that Colonel Langhorne under American troops of the Eighth Cavalry in pursuit of the bandits.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—The American punitive expedition into Mexico after the bandits who held the two American aviators is being conducted with the full knowledge of authorities in Washington who have been withholding announcement of the government's policy until the two Americans were safe. Secretary Baker on reading the Associated Press dispatches from Marfa announced that American troops went over on specific instructions from the war department but withheld further official announcement until he had received official word from the border. It is the second expedition of its kind since the Pershing expedition into Juarez in pursuit of Villa. The other was the expedition into Juarez at the time of the recent fighting. In its diplomatic aspect it is an expedition on a "hot trail" it does not take on the character of an act of war, as is the case with the American army officers for ransom.

GEN. DICKMAN IS ON TOUR OF INSPECTION SAN ANTONIO, TEX., Aug. 19.—Major General Joseph T. Dickman, commanding general of the Southern Department, left for the border today morning. The announcement was made at department headquarters that General Dickman had gone on a tour of inspection to Eagle Pass, Del Rio and Fort Clark, a trip he has been contemplating for the last week. Colonel W. T. Johnson, chief of staff, pointed out that General Dickman will not be out of touch with developments in connection with the pursuit of bandits and that he could reach Marfa from any point on his itinerary more quickly than from San Antonio. Southern Department headquarters had not received an official report of the crossing of the Rio Grande by the Eighth Cavalry by noon today. General Dickman learned before he left of Captain Matlack's escape with lieutenant Davis without paying the ransom of the \$15,000 ransom amount at once transmitted instructions to officers at Candelaria to pay the bandits the full amount as stipulated in the agreement made with them by the United States Government.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—Judge Barry Miller, Dallas, Texas, was recommended for appointment as judge of the fifth circuit by Senators Culberson and Sheppard of Texas, it was stated today. The circuit includes Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Georgia, Alabama and Florida.

### GET PROMISE FROM WASHINGTON RAILROAD ADMINISTRATION TO RELIEVE CONGESTED CONDITIONS

Special to The Times. WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 19.—Protests against congested tracks of the Fort Worth and Denver City and Katy railroads in West Texas, signed by the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce, Texas Petroleum Refiners' Association, West Texas Chamber of Commerce, reached Representatives Commerce, Texas Industrial Traffic League and Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce and Latham last Monday. They immediately conferred with the railroad administration and were advised that nothing was known here of dangerous congestion to the lines mentioned.

An immediate investigation was promised with assurance that all possible would be done to afford relief to shippers. Request has been made for a single director to handle the two roads which it is said have been virtually closed up by the rush of business in the Wichita Falls oil district.

### JAIL FOR PROFITEER IS URGED IN SPEECH BY MITCHELL PALMER

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—Attorney General Palmer, addressing the fair price committee here last night, urged that profiteers be put in jail. He said he had come from Washington to give instructions for conducting the campaign here for fair prices, because "New York is the natural leader in this movement and the eyes of the nation are fixed upon it."

### MEXICO CONTENTS RELATIONS WITH THE U. S. ARE TRANQUIL

BUENOS AIRES, Monday, Aug. 19.—The Mexican legation here today made public telegrams from the foreign office in Mexico City saying that "relations between Mexico and United States remain tranquil. Exaggerated press reports to the contrary are false."

The telegrams details the steps taken by the Mexican Government to protect foreigners and explained the necessity for foreigners congregating in populous centers. The Mexican charge d'affaires stated that federal troops have already annihilated "such bandits as Zapata, Blanquet and Inez Davila," and now are engaging Villa forces. The legation also made public a note similar to the Mexican reply to Washington referring to crimes in most cultured nations.

DENVER TO HANDLE CEMENT SHIPMENT FROM COTTON BELT

FURTHER EFFORTS BY MR. COX ARE PRODUCTIVE OF BETTER RESULTS.

SOME RELIEF FOR SITUATION

Some Delay May Be Occasioned in Arranging the Details of Shipment.

A second effort was successful in securing an agreement from the Fort Worth & Denver to run a train load of cement to Wichita Falls, taking the cars from the Cotton Belt at Fort Worth instead of the Texas & Pacific, according to M. E. Cox, of the Wichita Falls Freight Bureau, who returned Monday night from a conference with officials of the various roads at Fort Worth and Dallas in connection with this matter. Although the higher traffic officials of the Denver, with whom he conferred on the matter did not agree to handle the proposition as a train load, it was agreed that the stuff should be handled promptly, according to Mr. Cox, who was told by the officials who would have actual charge of the handling of the consignments that they would get rid of it just as they received it, if it came to them as a solid train. May Be Delayed. The delay in securing assurances of the handling of the consignment, however, is likely to cause a delay of several days in the receipt of the cement, as the loaded cars which had promised to Wichita Falls in case the railroad agreed to handle the shipment, had been assigned to other parties on the failure of the negotiations with the railroad officials Saturday. "I would like to say that every car of cement consigned to Wichita Falls

that was on the rails of the Fort Worth & Denver last night, is in Wichita Falls this morning," said Mr. Cox. "However, this was only a matter of three cars, and will not suffice for a very short while, as little less than a train load will do much good at this time." Charges Horseplay. "An instance of how the 'playing horse' with each other carried on by the railroad officials at Fort Worth is reacting to the detriment of Wichita Falls and other points on their lines," Mr. Cox continued, "arose during my efforts to secure relief in the cement situation at Wichita Falls. One road had on their line seven cars of cement already loaded for Wichita Falls. I secured an agreement from an official of another line to take these cars at Fort Worth from the second line and move them to Wichita Falls. Upon

calling a similar official of the first line, the latter told me that he would be glad to move the cars to Wichita Falls if he was personally assured by the officials of the receiving line that he would take the cars off his hands at Fort Worth. This assurance the other official flatly refused to give. In the meantime, on account of this little bit of horseplay, the buildings in Wichita Falls, which are facing a shut down through lack of cement, do not get their cement." FEDERAL GOVERNMENT'S EFFECTIVE SERVICE.

Some of us are wont to declaim against a paternalistic government and to decry invasion of personal liberty and the rights of the states, and it is true that our government is, in a measure, paternalistic and that there has been a gradual encroachment on personal liberty and the rights of the states, but the fact remains that the federal government is about the only agency that is doing much to help us meet our living problems. Here are some of the things the federal government is doing in Wichita Falls right now to reduce the high cost of living and to curb the profiteer:

The War Department has sold the buildings at Call Field to citizens of Wichita Falls who are pledged to rent them to others without profit. This is the most effective step that has so far been taken to relieve a desperate housing situation here.

Agents of the Department of Justice are obtaining evidence against food, clothing and rent profiteers in Wichita Falls to be used in criminal prosecution of the offenders.

Army supplies are being offered to the people through the postal service at low prices. This should give direct relief on a number of food items from excessive costs so far as the goods sold by the government will go and ought to have some influence toward a general reduction of food prices here.

The three activities named are practical, effective measures and the only agency that has moved. Opposition to the enlargement of the federal government's activities may be all right in theory and in some instances, but in practice your Uncle Sam is a nice old relative to have about sometimes and we must not make him an impotent and helpless old gentleman.

Wichita Falls is not the only place either where your Uncle Sam has interested himself in the welfare of his nephews. Up in Wilbarger county last fall the farmers had just come through a prolonged drought. Their stocks of feed and seed were exhausted, likewise their money. Uncle Sam made deposits in the Vernon banks to be loaned the farmers to buy seed. The farmers did buy seed with money loaned by the government. This year Wilbarger county has harvested a big wheat crop. Already deposits in the Vernon banks have increased a million dollars with the wheat crop far from all being threshed. The organizers of the new party down at Fort Worth will have some difficulty in enticing Wilbarger county farmers over the kind of government that would have rendered Uncle Sam powerless to help them in their time of dire need.

reference is fast losing all authority and power. The peace conference may legislate and resolute and recommend and suggest, but unless it has force back of it, the greedy peoples of Europe will pay no attention to it, he says. There is this consolation, however, in that sort of a game, there is no nation so powerful or resourceful as the United States. A better way will be to adopt the league of nations plan and to put real teeth into the league. By doing this we will not only help ourselves but help all the people of the world and save some of the great work of the

Three or four weeks will probably be required for the completion of the survey of the land in Wichita county claimed by Oklahoma, under the contention that the Red River of the boundary line of the State of Texas as defined by the treaty with Spain has changed its course to the north, according to the plans of the commission which arrived Monday, and began its work this morning. Dr. P. W. Livingston of Minnesota, and C. L. Jones of Bunnelle, Fla., the scientific experts of the party will be here for at least three weeks. It is believed, making the survey, while the other members of the commission, H. A. Feck of Oklahoma City and J. A. Tallin of Little Rock, are investigating the legal phases of the question, and will probably finish their work in a week's time.

Attorney General C. M. Cureton was here today from Austin, and with Judge A. H. Cargan, counsel for owners of some of the land in controversy, joined the commission for its first trip to the field. Major Luther Hoffman, of the firm of Bullington, Boone, Humphrey and Hoffman, also accompanied the commission. Attorney General Cureton is here to protect the property interests, and the land in controversy and to gather data to be used in filing suit for the State of Texas, if this becomes necessary to protect the property interests, and the citizens who hold the land and have held it some of them at least as far back as 1883.

### ASSISTING THE FEDERAL BOUNDARY COMMISSION

FORT WORTH, Aug. 19.—Attorney General Cureton of Texas is in the oil fields today, assisting the federal boundary commission in surveying the Red River bed to determine the dispute between national and state governments. Cureton is gathering evidence to file suit for the State of Texas.

### CURB BROKERS TO CONTEST ORDINANCE ON STREET SALES

Curb brokers have pooled their interests and say they will fight to the finish the city ordinance prohibiting the street making sales of stock on the street. A test case was furnished Monday when C. A. Everts, a curb broker, was arrested twice for selling oil stock on the sidewalk in front of the Central Stock Exchange. The first arrest was made by Assistant Police Commissioner Goodfellow.

Mr. Everts was taken before the police court and booked on the charge of a violation of the city ordinance relative to street sales of stock, and a bond of \$25 was deposited for his appearance Tuesday morning. He returned after his arrest and commenced selling again and was arrested the second time by Patrolman Belcher and another \$25 bond was made.

The case was brought up in the police court Tuesday morning but the hearing postponed until Wednesday morning, when it is understood that Mr. Everts will plead not guilty and in case of conviction will immediately appeal the case to the higher courts.

The brokers claim unfair discrimination in favor of others who have been allowed to sell their wares on the street in a statement issued Tuesday morning.

It is also pointed out that curb brokers are permitted to operate in New York, Fort Worth and many other cities, and the test case is designed not so much as a matter of stubbornness but to really test the validity of the ordinance.

## LABOR DAY COMMITTEE MAKING GOOD PROGRESS WITH PROGRAM

Preparations are well under way for a Labor Day celebration to be held in Wichita Falls Monday, Sept. 1, which bids fair to exceed anything of this kind ever held here, according to a statement made by the committee in charge of the plans, composed of Chairman H. The names of the prospective bride and groom are withheld at this time. The local merchants will give presents to the couple, and a money shower will be given them following the ceremony.

## COTTON MARKET.

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—A disposition to cover or to buy for a reaction after yesterday's break was increased in the cotton market by the firmer cables of today and the better opening tone of the stock market. First prices were steady at an advance of 22 to 30 points and active months sold 27 to 35 points net higher during the first few minutes October touching 30.40 and January 20.42. There was considerable Southern selling on the advance however which also met further liquidation and later fluctuations were irregular. Offerings were comparatively light on the midday decline and the market firmed up again early in the afternoon. Cotton futures closed very steady.

## New Orleans Cotton.

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 19.—Better cables than due and a disposition on the part of the recent sellers to realize profits caused a stiff rise in the price of cotton today. In the first half hour of business the market gained 35 to 44 points on the most active months. The market acted oversold in the afternoon and when buying started on reports that American troops were marching into Mexico, shorts pushed to cover. The sharpest bid of the day ensued and it carried prices 66 to 76 points over the close of yesterday. Cotton futures closed steady at net advance of 37 to 39 points.

## GRAIN AND PRODUCE.

CHICAGO, Aug. 19.—The corn market started out strong today on commission house buying which found only limited offerings available. Opening prices ranged from 1 1/4 to 2c higher, with September \$1.75 1/2 to \$1.79 1/2, December \$1.41 to \$1.42 and May \$1.37 1/2 to \$1.37 3/4. On the decline May touched \$1.35 but worked back to about opening figures. Oats followed the course of corn. Provisions dipped at the opening and being 20 to 30 cents lower. ## ACTION ON LAWS TO REDUCE HIGH PRICES BEING CONSIDERED

By RAYMOND CLAPPER, United Press Staff Correspondent.  
WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—Action on legislation to reduce the cost of living is expected today when the Senate agricultural committee plans to vote on Attorney General Palmer's request for broadening of the food control act. Hearings on the Kenyon and Kendrick packer bills were suspended until tomorrow, when packers will appear. "I doubt very much whether the amendments will be reported out by the committee," Chairman Gronna said today. "A majority seem opposed to them. It is possible, however, that they may be modified by exempting farm organizations from proposed penalties."

Penalty for Profiteering.  
The amendments would extend the food control act to cover clothing and would add a heavy penalty for profiteering. Farmers contended their organizations might be held liable under conspiracy clauses of the act. The House agricultural committee also plans to change radically Palmer's suggestions for amendment to the food control act. Chairman Haugen today will submit amendments to the food control act which will provide for the proclamation of fair prices on all necessities by the President with adequate power to severely punish all who sell above these figures. The amendments have been framed after conferences with department of justice officials.

The act exempts farmers, farm organizations and farms with annual sales less than \$100,000. If you can regulate the big fellows and tell the people what fair prices are, there won't be much blame for the little fellows to profiteer," he said. Attorney General Palmer or Assistant Attorney General Ames will be called before the committee today to give their opinion on some details of the plan. The main purpose of the amendments are to get immediate action on we propose to give the department power beyond a shadow of a doubt to bring down prices," Haugen said. "It is proposed to regulate storage and commission charges, as well as other profits."

Haugen's plan carries the same penalty. Palmer proposed—fine of not more than \$5,000 imprisonment for not more than two years, or both. The House today was expected to pass the resolution of Representative Igou, Missouri, ordering the Federal trade commission to make complete investigation of the show situation. Representative Siegel, New York who claims manufacturers are planning to increase the price of white collars to 35 cents September 1, will ask consideration of his resolution for a Federal trade investigation of this industry. The fact that Europe has had practically no coffee for four years, and the surplus in the United States is practically nil. Prohibition is also a factor. But the REAL REASON is an adjustment of values among commodities. A few years ago Rio sevens sold for 5 1/2 cents per pound, so did cotton. Now cotton sells for above 80 cents and Rio sevens for twenty-two. Wheat used to fluctuate between sixty-five cents and a dollar, and is now two-twenty.
