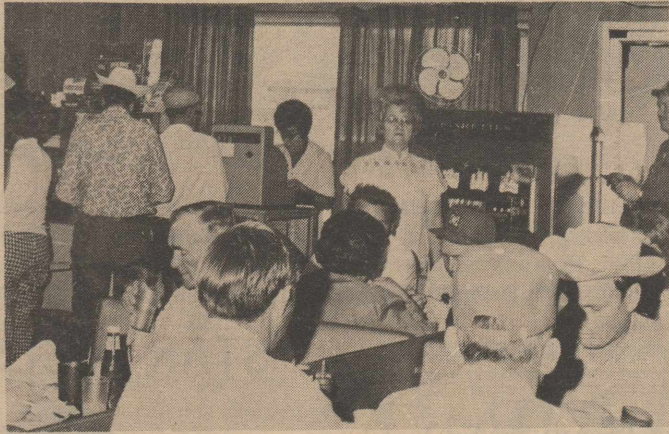

## 'Home Cooking' Specialty Of Busy Alford's Cafe

"The whole town and community is the reason if I am a success," says Vera Alford of her relatively brief career as "boss" at Alford's Cafe.

Vera reopened in May the restaurant which had been closed since her husband's death last February. The late Lynn Alford and his brother, Speck, operated the cafe 11 years.

The Alford's leased the cafe when they first came to Hart from the Monroe Phillipses and, a few months later, bought the business. It has operated in the same location since their arrival in Hart but none of the equipment or fixtures of the original cafe remain.

Urged to reopen the business, Vera discounts her own role in making the business a success by saying with sincerity that her employees,

legal advisor, banker, book-keeper and the patience of her customers are the reason the restaurant is kept busy six days a week.

"I'm learning a little bit," she says, "but when I came in here I was dumb, dumb, dumb, dumb." She is quick to praise her employees as a "real team."

Although the Alford brothers were experienced restaurant men, the business was strange and unknown to Vera but strangers stopping in for lunch during the busy noon hours would never realize the experience is a new one.

Vera's brother-in-law cooked during his stint in the army during World War II and entered the cafe business after his discharge.

Speck owned and operated a

## Hart Men Found After Missing 1 Year

Graveside services were conducted at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday in Hart Cemetery for J. C. Jackson, Mart Daniel Booe and Charles Curtis Hanes.

Officiating were B. B. Hardin and Morgan Sturgis of Tulia. Arrangements were by Parsons Funeral Home of Olton.

Bodies of the three local men and that of Harold McCollum of Dimmitt, pastor of the local Church of Christ, were discovered Saturday, one year and two days after their plane crashed in Utah's Blue Ridge Mountains.

Two brothers, deer hunting in the rugged mountains six miles southwest of Monticello, Utah, discovered the crashed plane and the bodies of the four victims who were apparently killed on impact. The plane was lodged in heavy timber on a snow covered mountainside.

Jackson, 43, was owner and operator of Hi-Way Garage and had lived in Castro County all his life. He was born May 13, 1930.

Survivors include his wife, Bessie; three sons, James, Cecil and Gary; five brothers and three sisters, including Wanda Henderson.

Hanes, a farmer, had been a resident of Hart five years. He was born May 1, 1921 in Tipton, Okla.

He is survived by his wife, Lula Mae; three sons, Steven, Clay and Chris; one granddaughter; three sisters and three brothers.

Booe moved to Hart six years ago from Munday. He was a Korean War veteran and employed by H. & S. Produce Company. He was born Nov. 10, 1929 in Knox County.

Surviving are his wife, Jerrie; two daughters, Sherry and Linda; two sons, Mike and Danny; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dan Booe; one brother

and three sisters.

McCullum, 54, had lived in Dimmitt 14 years. Services were slated today in Cedar Hill Cemetery in Abilene under the direction of Parsons Funeral Home.

The four men were on a church mission to churches in Washington and Canada when the plane, piloted by McCollum, was lost in blizzard conditions. Memorial services were held Nov. 5, 1972 in the elementary school gym for the four after search parties were unable to locate the missing plane.

## Wreck Claims Life Of New Bridegroom

Wed just a few hours earlier, Eusebio Terrazas, 24, was dead on arrival Sunday morning at Central Plains Hospital in Plainview following a head-on collision at the south city limits of Olton.

Terrazas and Eva Cantano were married at 4 p.m. Saturday in the community room of Farmers State Bank. The shattering two-car crash that claimed Terrazas' life and injured his bride occurred at the curve on FM 168 near High Plains Corn elevator.

Hospitalized along with Mrs. Terrazas were Alfred Martinez, Consuelo Martinez, Anesencia Cantana, all passengers in the death car, and Claro Cruz, Mexican National farm laborer of Olton and driver of the second vehicle.

Ed Anzaldua, Olton night watchman, witnessed the accident from approximately four blocks away. He summoned a Parsons ambulance and Highway Patrolman Santi-

Rosary was read Monday evening in St. John's Catholic Church for Frank Anthony Bauman, 73. Mass was held at 10 a.m. Tuesday.

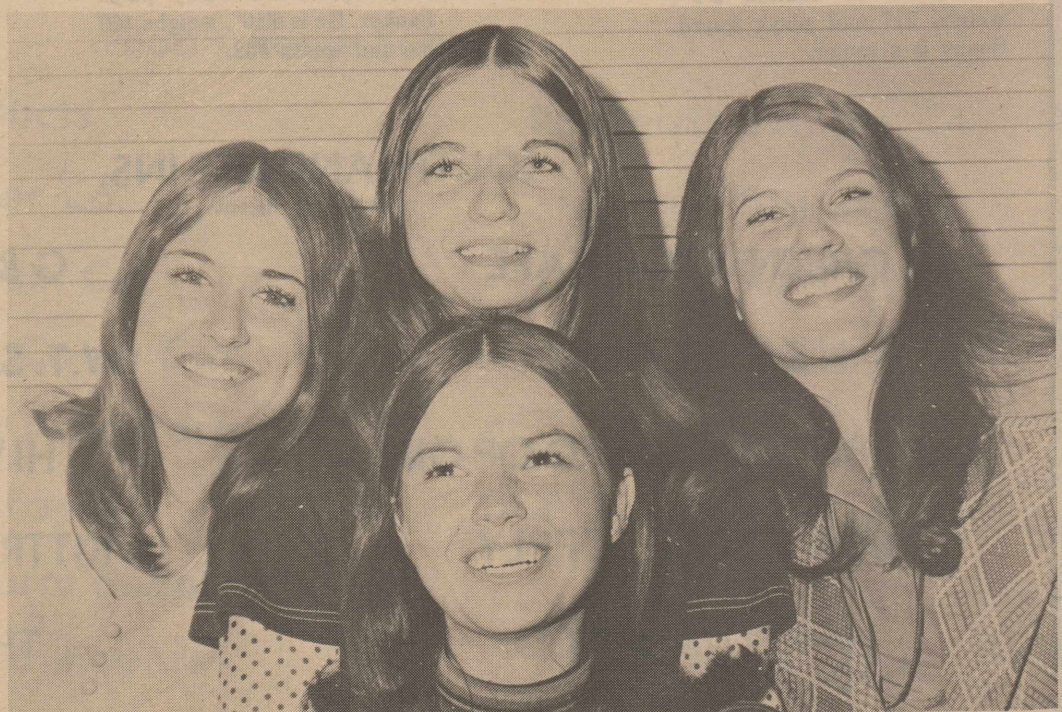
Father Raphael Chen officiated. Interment was in Hart Cemetery under the direction of Dennis Funeral Home.

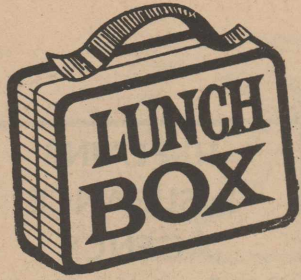
A retired farmer and mechanic, Bauman had been ill for some time. He died at 3:50 p.m. Sunday at his home.

### LEMON CHESH PIE

- 2 c. sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1 T. flour
- 1/2 stick oleo
- 1/2 c. buttermilk

juice of 2 lemons (1/2 c.)  
pinch of salt  
Beat eggs, oleo, and sugar. Add rest ingredients and beat well. Bake in uncooked crust at 375 for 45-50 minutes.

### DUTCH POTATO SALAD

- 3 lbs. med. potatoes (10-12)
- 1 c. chopped onion
- 1/2 t. celery seed (opt.)
- one-eighth t. pepper
- 1/2 c. vinegar
- 3 T. water
- 2 t. salt
- 6 slices bacon-diced
- 2 T. sugar
- 1 egg, beaten

Cook potatoes in boiling salted water until tender. Cool slightly, peel and thinly slice into large bowl. Add onions, celery seed, salt and pepper. Mix lightly; keep warm. Cook bacon crisp; drain on paper towel. Mix vinegar, sugar, water with cooked bacon drippings, heat to simmering. Add slowly to beaten egg, beating constantly. Pour over potatoes, add bacon. Mix lightly. Serve warm.

### BARBECUED FRANKS

- 1 lb. pkg. franks
- 2 small cans tomato sauce
- 1/2 c. chopped onion
- 1/4 c. chopped pepper
- dash of garlic powder
- 1 T. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 T. shortening
- 1 T. oleo
- Salt & pepper to taste

Saute onions and peppers in shortening. Add tomato sauce,

garlic powder, oleo, Worcestershire sauce, salt and pepper. Simmer. Cut franks into bite size pieces and add to sauce. Simmer about 20 minutes.

## 2 Vehicle Crash Causes Injuries

A grinding two vehicle crash south of town last Friday proved near fatal for former commissioner E. I. "Tump" McLain. Both pick-ups were "totaled."

McLain is hospitalized in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. James Jackson, driver of the other vehicle, was hospitalized overnight for x-rays and released.

Quick action by Jackson may have saved McLain's life. McLain's left leg was broken between the knee and ankle with the bone protruding through the flesh. Jackson applied a tourniquet to control the profuse bleeding.

McLain was taken into surgery shortly after reaching the Amarillo hospital. A steel plate was required to mend the break. He was taken to intensive care and remained on the critical list until late Tuesday afternoon.

Surgery had been tentatively scheduled for today on McLain's right leg which was broken at the thigh. He also suffered broken ribs, severe fracture of the collar bone and multiple cuts and bruises.

The retired commissioner has undergone a number of blood transfusions.

Gifts From God



More than 100 years ago, the famed and beloved American cleric, H. W. Beecher, wrote these inspirational words:

"Flowers are the sweetest things that God ever made, and forgot to put a soul into."

When Beecher expressed this eloquent and stirring sentiment, he echoed the heart-felt emotion that has motivated man, for thousands of years, to send flowers to bereaved loved ones when they have lost someone close.

So strong is this emotion that even when they're confronted with a request for a charitable contribution "in lieu of flowers," many people make the contribution, and send the flowers, too.

Such an expression of thoughtfulness allows them, at the same time, to be true to themselves and those they hold most dear.

Continued from page 1 restaurant, "The Dixie Tavern" in Lockney and after Lynn and Vera were married in 1951, Lynn and his mother bought the cafe from Speck. Lynn operated a cafe in Petersburg for a short time and the two brothers were working in Plainview when the selected Hart after looking around for a location of their own.

Vera has two sons, Phil Green of Little Rock, Ark., a service representative of Burroughs Business Machines, and Charles Lynn Alford, service manager for Firestone in Plainview. She has one grandchild, Kevin Green, almost seven.

Efficiently helping Vera run the business are her regular employees, Jearldine Newsom, Blanche English, Kay Campbell, Fay Ethridge, Isabel Guterrez, Patricia Tenorio and Carmen Guterrez.

Jearldine is self-proclaimed "official taster" but skillfully and quickly handles her work as waitress. Blanche, "number one cook," began cooking in a cafe in 1961 and has worked steadily most of the time since. She professes to be a "throw together" cook rather than one to follow recipes. She admits that cafe cooking has made it difficult to adopt to the smaller amounts of home cooking.

Kay, "cook number two," really enjoys cooking. Patricia works through the cooperative education program at HHS.

Days begin at 6 a.m. at the Alford Cafe with good breakfast business. Coffee breaks keep the small cafe a-hum with activity until the lunch hour rush begins about 11:30.

Fifty-six persons can be served at one time and through the noon hour a steady coming and going keep the 14 booths filled.

Hearty, delicious meals are turned out quickly with no sacrifice for quality. Favorite foods include chicken fried steaks, pinto beans, cornbread and cobbles. Homemade pies are made daily.

Increasing prices have pinched the food budget of the cafe just as they have budgets of the housewives but, so far, Vera has not had trouble getting the food supplies she needs. The most difficulty has been with canned fruits.

Most of the cafe's foods are bought from Amarillo suppliers but the principal meat supply is from Plainview. "Plus a few dozen trips a day across the street to Pay-N-Save," Vera says.

About the only complaint heard of the Alford Cafe is the frequently spoken, "I wish you were open on Sunday." Opening on Sunday might be financially profitable but Vera is steadfast in her belief that a day of rest is vital and Sunday should be set aside for her employees to be with their families and a day free so they might attend the church of their choice.

## Farm Debt In Record Rise

Mortgage debts on the nation's farms totaled \$34.5 billion at the beginning of 1973.

The USDA says this figure represents an increase of \$3.2 billion, the largest yearly rise on record and a 10.2 percent climb over 1971.

Indications based on reported farm mortgage lending during the first half of 1973 are that this year's debt will probably equal or exceed the 1972 increase rate.

Farm mortgage debts held by federal land banks in 1972 showed the sharpest increase. They were up 14.9 percent, compared to a 13.6 percent increase for banks, 2.2 percent for life insurance companies, and 10.1 percent for individuals and other lenders.

Direct loans held by the Farmers Home Administration declined nearly 13 percent under FHA's continuing policy of transferring from direct lending to an insured loan program.

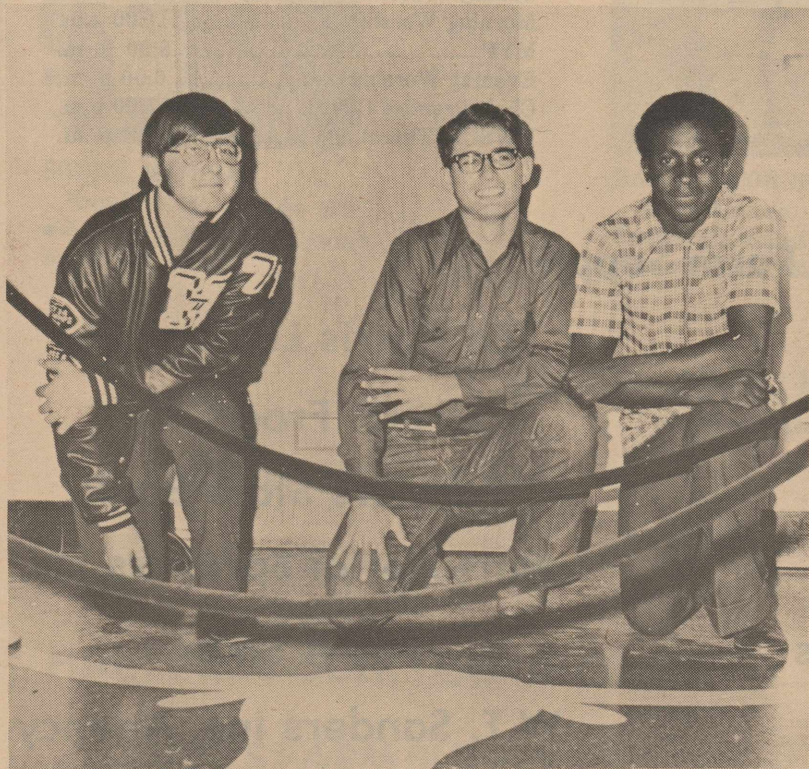

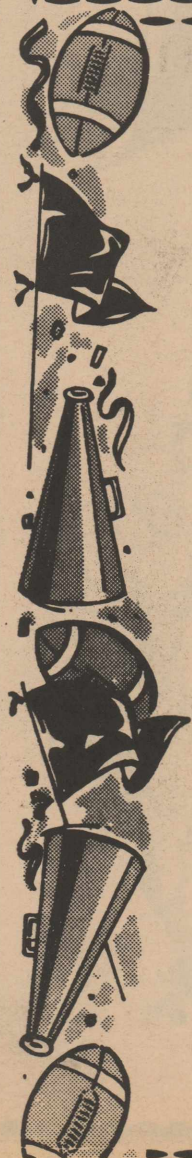

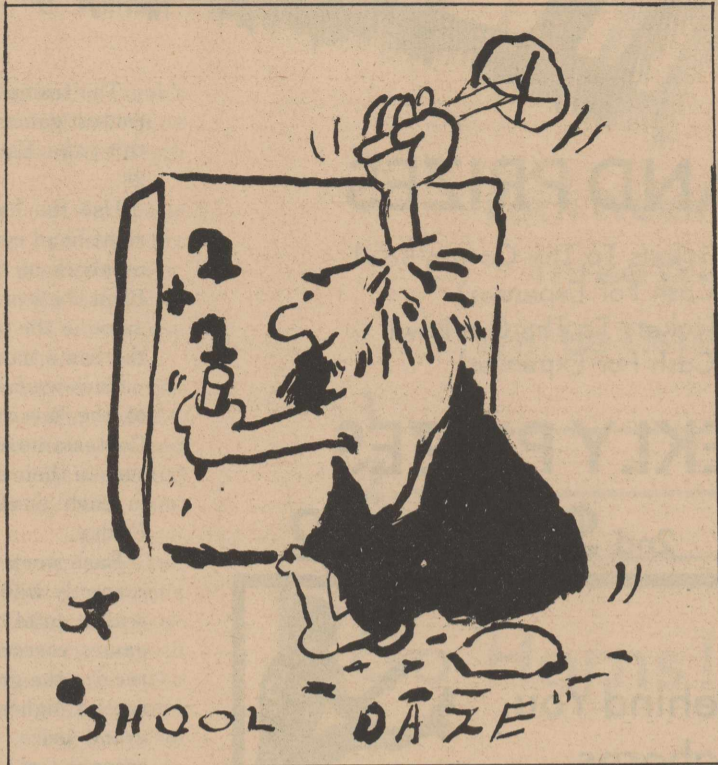

# Brown Leads Horns To Victory

Hart Longhorns met Farwell's Steers Friday night on the home field in a free-scoring game and came out on top 38-24. Jimmy Brown led the Horns offensively, scoring on runs of two, three, 53 and 65 yards. Barry George and Terry

Hill also added a touchdown each.

Farwell halfback Mike Woods scored on runs of three and 99 yards. Fullback Winfred Long scored once and Steer quarterback Kevin Hargrove hit on a 12 yard field goal for

Farwell's scores.

After returning the opening kickoff to the 45, Farwell went to work with their pass attack. On first down, Hargrove passed to end Carl Kirkland at the Hart 25. James McLain intercepted Hargrove's second pass attempt at the 10 and the Horns took over.

The fired-up Steer defense held and Hart punted to the Farwell 31. The Steers were also unable to move the ball and punted back to Hart. The Horns drove to their own 47 before they were forced to punt. Sophomore end Randy Finch downed the ball on the Farwell one.

On first down, Mike Woods broke through the Hart defense and raced 99 yards for Farwell's first score. Kick for extras was good and the Steers led 7-0 with 5:07 left in the first period.

George fell on the ball at the Hart 37 following the Farwell Kickoff and the Horns then mounted a 63 yard scoring drive. Brown raced in from three yards out for the score. Try for extras failed.

Following an exchange of punts Farwell drove to the Hart 24 and from there Long galloped 24 yards to score with 8:32 left in the half. The kick for extras was good and Farwell led 14-6.

George returned the Farwell Kickoff to the Horn's 47. On first down, Brown got the call and raced 53 yards to paydirt for Maroon herd's second score. The try for extras failed and the score stood at 14-12.

Farwell returned the kickoff to the 33 where on first down, Hargrove attempted a pass

which Horn linebacker Kent Irons intercepted and returned to the Farwell 19, dragging would-be tacklers with him.

McLain ran to the Farwell 7 on fourth down to keep the Longhorn drive alive. Two plays later Brown scored from three yards out. McLain ran for two and with five minutes left in the half the Horns led 20-14.

In the closing seconds of the half Farwell drove to the Hart 8 after Brown fumbled a Farwell punt at the 20. On third down Hargrove booted a 12 yard field goal to make the halftime score 20-17.

Farwell recovered on onsides kick at the 50 as the third period began but the Horns got a big break when a Steer fumble was recovered on their own 41. The Horns drove to the Farwell 20 where McLain tossed a screen pass to George who went in for the score. Try for extras failed and the Horns led 26-17.

Midway in the fourth period Hart drove to the Farwell 27 but penalties set the Horns back to the 40. On third down McLain tossed an incomplete pass to Finch at the 13 but interference was called on the Steers. Brown carried down to the three and hard running fullback Terry Hill went the final yards for the score. Extras failed.

The "Marron Gang" defense forced Farwell to punt following the kickoff and the Horns got the ball on their 49. The Horns lost 12 yards on a recovered fumble. On second down Brown ran toward the sidelines, cut back against the grain and outran the Steer defense for a 63 yard touchdown. Extras failed and with 2:44 remaining in the game the Horns led 38-17.

The Steers refused to be held scoreless in the fourth period.

Kirkland found a large hole in the Hart defense and raced from the Farwell 25 to the Hart 3, following Hart's kickoff. Woods went the final three on the next play. Kick for extras was good and the score was Hart, 38-24.

The Horns drove to the Farwell 15 but could not score as the game ended.

## Sudan Dropped From District

Hart Longhorns will have one less district foe for the 1974 football season according to an announcement made this week by representatives of the University Interscholastic League Conference.

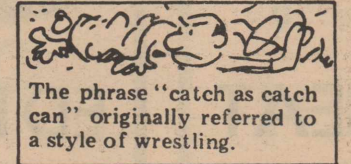
Sudan has been re-classed to a 14 member Class B district leaving the Horns district games to be with Bovina, Springlake-Earth, Farwell, Kress and Vega.

Advance tickets may be purchased from any member of the class for \$1.25 for adults and students over 12. Students under 12 may purchase tickets for \$1.



Band Boosters will conduct a "country store" with Chi Psi operating a concession for pop corn balls and homemade candy.

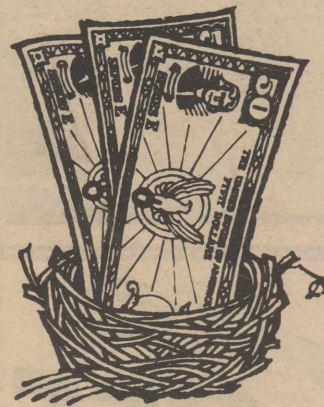

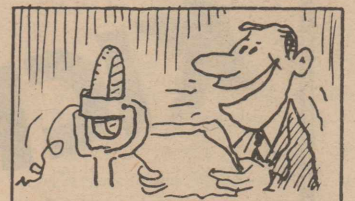
