Seven Running - Three Places Open

## School Trustees To Be Elected Saturday

Burkburnett School Board election will be April 6, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. in the Burkburnett Junior High School building. Seven candidates have filed for three places which will be open for election on the

ballot. Places 1, 2, and 3 will be open, with incumbents in each running for re-election. In place 1, incumbent Norman Roberts is opposed by Richard K. Galvin. Place 2 has incumbent Ted

Harris running against C.J. Lippard. And place 3 has incumbent Gene Bankhead running against Charles L. Chittum and Weldon Gorham. The Informer/Star received a statement from each candidate.

**Incumbent Norman Roberts** [place 1] said, "It has been my privilege to be associated with the fine Burkburnett School System for three consecutive terms as a member of the Board of Trustees. It is an honor to be a part of a school with such a strong and qualified administration that is supported by all the teaching staff as well as the student body.

During my years of experience on the board, there has been tremendous growth in both the community and school which has required much planning, consideration, and support of all taxpayers. I am vitally concerned that our tax dollars are spent for the very best in education to meet the demands of the growth and progress in our schools. With these years of experience, having served as president, vice-president, and secretary, I feel I am well qualified for this position."

**Richard K. Galvin** [place 1] said, "As a taxpayer and father of five children, I feel it is my civic duty and obligation to be concerned about the return I am getting for my investment in the community of Burkburnett—to not only share in the prosperity, but to work toward its growth. The well rounded curriculum of our future adults and possible town leaders is my utmost concern. It is not just survival of the fittest which will aid in the growth of our community, but the imagination, skill, and know how which I am interested in. I am a native of New York and

after 21 years in the military, chose to make Burkburnett my home because of its potential to become a city with a future. I am active in civic programs as well as programs set up for the young. I am a self-employed businessman presently involved with students in the D.E. program. I have worked with schools and school programs prior to coming to Burkburnett and feel with my experiences I can be an asset to the community by working with and for our school system which will play a big part in the development of our futures."

**Incumbent Ted Harris** [place 2] said, "I came into this office with no political obligations to any group or faction. I have been faithful to the responsibilities placed upon me by my constituents. I have missed just one board meeting during my three year term. I have

supported the administration and teachers. I understand the needs of the students and have striven to see that they have received the best possible education through the best possible use of the taxpayers money.

The population growth of this district is forcing us into an expanded school building program. I believe that this program can be handled without an increase in the tax rate."

**C.J. Lippard** [place 2] said, "Having sold my Insurance Agency, this is the first time I have been eligible to run for the school board. I was not urged by any group or organization, but by a number of good solid citizens from all walks of life. I believe the trustees should set policies and the superintendent and principals should carry them out and that the trustees work as a group and not individually on matters of special interest to themselves.

I am proud of Burkburnett's strong athletic program, but I believe because of the large number of students not involved in sports, there should be other activities also. The Burkburnett School System in the past few years has made great strides in the field of Arts and Science, Drama, and Vocational programs. I am especially interested in seeing these programs extended if possible.

Within the next three years there will be some very important decisions made, particularly in the building

program. Millions of tax dollars will be spent and a lot of thought and study must be given. Most of you know me to be a conservative person, but I

believe the education of our children is the best investment we can make in the future."

## Burk School Board Reinstates "Streaker"

The Burkburnett School Board met Thursday night, March 28, at 8 p.m. to further discuss action which was recently taken concerning punishment of a 16-year-old high school junior. The male student had been accused of "streaking"—removing his clothing and running from one point to another on the high school parking lot March 15.

During the meeting the board met with legal council in a

closed session and discussed punishment procedures, according to Superintendent James Pearson. Pearson later told the Informer/Star that the board decided to lower the punishment of semester expulsion to 10 days expulsion due to the fact that this was the first time an incident of this nature occurred in the Burkburnett Independent School District. He added that the record of the involved student was unmarred

up to time of the streaking incident and this measured considerably in the student's favor.

Board member Ira Schroeder made the motion, "to reduce punishment previously applied in the case to a period of 10 days with reinstatement effective April 1, 1974. This action is taken after considering that this instance was the first such offense to have happened in the Burkburnett Independent School District. Any further incidents of a like nature will be more closely examined and will be considered for greater punishment."

Six board members were present and the vote was 3 to 2 in favor of the motion. Board president Gene Bankhead abstained from voting so that there could be a majority and board member Norman Roberts was not present. Board members Schroeder, Morton, and Harris voted for the motion and Gill and Allison voted against.

John Gill later told an Informer/Star representative that he was against the first part of the motion, not the last. He said that he was against a reduction in punishment, but was for greater punishment should a similar incident occur. He continued that he would have preferred two separate motions so that he could vote as he wished on each one, but since it was all in one motion he had to vote against it.

According to James Pearson, Thurman Allison seemed to have a similar view during the meeting.

## Mrs. Peters Heads Easter Seal Appeal

"Easter Seals work for the handicapped," said Karen Vandiver, general chairman of the Easter Seal appeal now under way in the eight-county North Texas area which includes Burkburnett.

And the people of Burkburnett are supporting Easter Seals, according to Mrs. Marguerite Peters chairman of the mail-in appeal which raises funds for operation of the North Texas Rehabilitation Center in Wichita Falls.

To date, \$65.00 has been contributed by Burkburnett residents. This compares to a total of \$631.65 donated last year.

"In the past year," said Mrs. Vandiver, "more than 500 persons—children and adults—received the therapy they needed at the rehabilitation center."

"Some were able to pay for the treatments," she noted, "but because of Easter Seals, even those who were financially unable to pay all or even part of the cost of therapy still received the help they needed."

Mrs. Peters, who is a member of the joint boards of directors of the Easter Seal Society of North Texas and the rehabilitation center, said that 114 persons from Burkburnett have received therapy of some sort at the center.

Types of therapy offered include physical, occupational, etc....

"Burkburnett is fortunate that we are located close enough to Wichita Falls that our handicapped can receive the help they need at the rehabilitation center," Mrs. Peters said.

## Catherine Clack Tells History Of Burkburnett

During the Burkburnett Chamber of Commerce monthly luncheon Monday, April 1, in the Civic Center, Mrs. Catherine Clack (county historian) described the history of Burkburnett.

Mrs. Clack, a member of the Texas Historical Society, told some 60 persons that Mable

Gilbert was the first white settler at Burkburnett, and that Gilbert Creek was named after him. She said that he died of pneumonia at his home near Burkburnett in 1870.

According to Mrs. Clack, Monroe Dodson was the second white settler and came to the area in 1878. He built a dugout on what is now known as the Riley Farm. Mrs. Clack told of an ambush of the 10th Cavalry Regiment and the 1876 arrival of Samuel Burk Burnett.

She said that Burk Burnett never lived in the county, but did begin a cattle-raising business on the Red River at Burkburnett.

In 1879 John G. Hardin and Peter Hawkins came from Johnson County and bought acreage for \$1.25/acre near Nesterville. Mrs. Clack described Hardin as a man Burk should be proud of since he donated to many charities and made his million dollars before the boom. Hawkins built the first Baptist Church and school in this area and was the first to plant wheat. Later a post office was established and Wichita Falls was named the county seat.

According to Mrs. Clack, Burk Burnett persuaded President Teddy Roosevelt to come to

Texas in 1905 and tour the area. They camped out on the Red River and later Roosevelt opened the Big Pasture land to expansion.

She continued that in 1907 lots were sold in Burkburnett and agriculture was the dominate financial resource. Later in 1912, Burkburnett boasted a million dollar corn crop and in 1914 the oil boom hit.

Mrs. Clack said that she really didn't see that the oil boom did much good for Burkburnett since money was made here and spent south of Burk. Burkburnett had proved its worth as an agricultural

Being the father of three Burkburnett High School students, and a concerned parent, I want to express my views regarding the "streaking" incident that took place recently on the School grounds, and the ensuing actions taken by the School Officials and the Board of Education. The only information I have on this matter is what I read in the Informer/Star of 28 March 1974. Assuming the Informer/Star to be correct, I am appalled by the manner in which this incident was resolved and by the punishment given the student. I've always been under the impression that this is a "land of laws". Perhaps in school language "rules" would be a better word. If I interpreted the Informer/Star correctly, a first offense misdemeanor warrants a three day expulsion with possible probation.

Hence, it seems to me that this student should have been punished under existing rules. Should the School Officials and Board of Education opine that this punishment was not compatible with the offense, then, and only then, should action be taken by the School District to change the rules. It is terrifying to think what this great Nation of ours would be like if our courts, in disposing cases, followed in the footsteps of our School Officials and Board of Education; changing rules after the fact and assessing punishment with complete disregard of existing rules.

Although unknown to me, my heart goes out to the student and his parents. This is not to say that I, under any circumstances, condone or applaud conduct of this nature. I most definitely do not. However, I do say here and now that I, and all School Officials and Board of Education members, did not attain adulthood always the perfect angel. Should anyone take issue with this statement, let that person "cast the first stone". It is all too easy for us adults to drift into a state of self-righteousness.

However, I must say that the method by which the School Officials and Board of Education handled this incident (hastily and without compassion) and the punishment assessed the student does not reflect favorably on our fine School District.

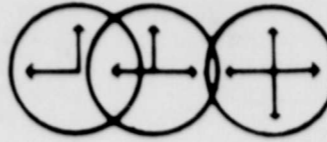

The cancelled portion of an emergency loan, granted by the Farmer's Home Administration because of a drought to growing crops, is taxable income.

In the Farmer's Tax Guide, it is listed under the heading of "late development." Some tax practitioners have apparently overlooked this item.

Farmers who have not properly included the loan cancellation as income are subject to additional tax, interest and penalty.

Persons wishing to correct their previously filed returns may use the Form 1040X to amend their return. The amended forms should be mailed to the Internal Revenue Service Center for the Southwest Region in Austin, Texas.

Farm landlords should check the little box on schedule E if at least 1/2 of their income is from farming. This is a new addition to the form.

Schedule E is the form on which rents and royalty are reported. Failure to check the box on the form may result in getting a notice to pay an estimated tax penalty for not filing an estimate. Copies of the Farmer's Tax Guide are still available free from the Cotton County OSU Extension Center.

A considerable amount of concern has been voiced about the damage caused by the last week's freeze. Frost or freeze injury can occur to small grain any time after jointing, but is

most easily damaged when the spike emerges from the boot. Damage to the spike can usually be observed in 5-7 days after injury. I have been in contact with an area agronomist and will report on the amount of damage as soon as it begins to show up. It may be difficult to tell the extent of damage until the plant is headed.

A considerable amount of damage has occurred to new growth on trees and shrubs. The darkened ends of branches should be pruned back.

It would appear that most fruit was killed by the freezing weather. Also a considerable amount of damage was done to gardens and bedding plants. Some replanting will be necessary.

If one is to control Phylloxera (galls), with a dormant oil, they should be sprayed now. If malathion is to be used, it should be applied when leaves are one-third grown. One should also mix 4 pounds of zinc sulfate per 100 gallons of water at the same time Phylloxera is controlled.

**County Agent News**

Texas farmers applied more fertilizer to their cropland last fall than usual. Recent figures show that fertilizer use increased a whopping 67 per cent during the last half of 1973 compared to the same period in 1972.

The trend definitely points to more fall fertilization. Of course the energy crisis which has curtailed fertilization production, uncertainty about prices and other factors had a hand in persuading farmers to put down their fertilizer early.

Suppliers normally build up an inventory of fertilizer during the fall and winter months, but this is not the case this year. There has been little building of inventories over the past few months, so spring fertilizer supplies will definitely be tight.

The increase use of fertilizer last fall pushed the total volume of fertilizer used by farmers in 1973 to 26 per cent more than the 1972 volume. What does the first half of 1974 hold as far as fertilizer production and use is concerned? About 2.5 million tons of fertilizer should be available to Texas farmers through June if production continues at the present pace. But this is below the amount farmers would like to use.

**Near-Record Onion Crop**

AUSTIN--Texas onion producers have nothing to cry about. They're producing 18 percent more onions this year than last, and their crop is expected to be the largest since 1967, and the third largest on record.

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said spring onions are starting to come to market. He said acres for harvest in Texas is set at 21,000, an eight percent increase over a year ago. Yield per acre is estimated to be up also, nine percent above 1973.

The trend toward bigness in the cattle feeding industry continued in Texas during 1973. Cattle feeding has become even more concentrated in the larger feedlots lately. Of the 1,533 feeders in the state last year, only 233 had a one-time capacity of 1,000 head or more and these accounted for 98 per cent of all the cattle fed in Texas.

A check on onion-producing areas around the state revealed that peak volume in the Lower Rio Grande Valley should occur in April. Crop quality appears excellent.

In the Coastal Bend area, harvest is expected to get underway in mid-April. At Laredo, the crop will be harvested beginning the first week in April.

Crop harvest should begin in the San Antonio-Winter Garden area in late April or early May.

**Home Demonstration News**

Everyone wants to save money, but "real" bargains aren't always easy to detect, so consumers often fall into "traps." Telling the difference between a good deal and a shady one takes certain precautions--and knowing some "bargain jargon."

First, become familiar with what we call "bargain jargon"--these are merchant "lines" or wording used to explain price reductions. For example, determine how much an item is reduced. A raincoat marked "Reduced to \$9.90" isn't such a bargain if it was \$10 originally. Also watch for terms like "as is," "imperfect" or "second."

These usually indicate less-than-perfect merchandise. When considering such items, examine each article and decide whether it's acceptable or repairable. Another common "deal" states, "Buy three-get one free" or "Two for the price of one."

Although honest merchants offer such legitimate deals, a schemer raises the item's regular price--eliminating or reducing savings on the free item. Also beware of stores that have been "going out of business" for years. A shady dealer thrives on such sales by offering sub-standard goods at inflated prices. Another dishonest merchant technique is attracting people to the store by advertising tempting specials. Once inside, he tries to sell them a higher priced item--claiming the advertised one was sold out, unsuitable or no good. However, in Texas it's illegal for stores to advertise an item if they don't intend to sell the item. Texas law also requires stores to have a large enough

supply of an advertised item to meet reasonable public demand--unless the ad specifies a limited quantity. Avoid the false advertising trap by shopping before buying, patronizing reputable dealers, and knowing some "bargain jargon."

In this day and time, saving time is as important as saving money. Cutting down ironing chores saves two kinds of energy--your own as well as electrical. Man-made fibers and permanent press finishes have significantly reduced ironing chores in many households.

Even so, recent reports indicate the average U.S. family uses more electricity for ironing than for radio-record players. To reduce need for this, don't overdry clothes. Also avoid hot temperatures with permanent press items. Using a dryer's cool down cycle removes most wrinkles. Regardless of dryer cycle, remove clothes as soon as they are dry. This way, most won't even need a touch up. To prevent wrinkling, remove bed sheets from dryer while slightly damp. Fold them and they'll press themselves.

Or, line dry them--most wrinkles will hang out. Certain items--such as work or play clothes--benefit little from pressing. They are wrinkled so quickly in these activities that ironing won't matter. Iron several items at one time to make the most of the energy used to heat the iron. Also, dampen clothes--or use steam--to save time. To prevent repeated temperature adjustment, iron items requiring similar temperatures at the same time.

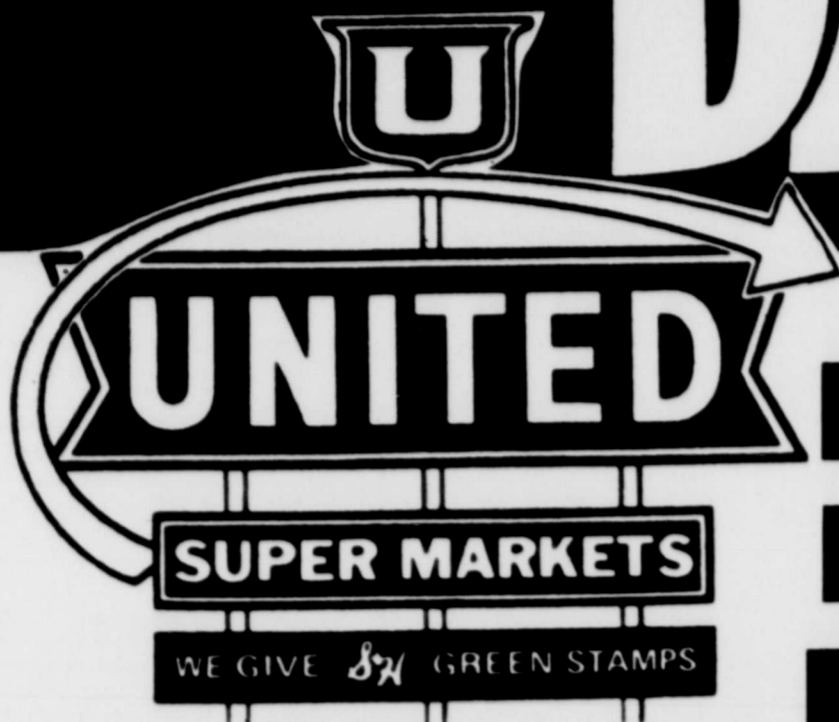

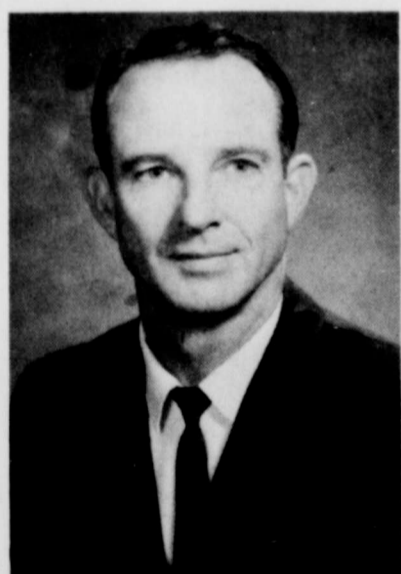

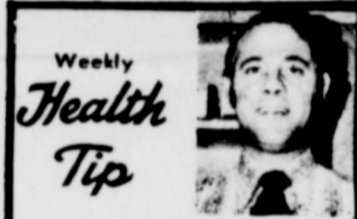
