

Wandals Strike 3 of 4 Floydada Schools

Floydada's four school buildings were vandalized early Sunday morning. Damages expected to be in the thousands and cleanup, repairs and reconstruction will be extensive.

At R.C. Andrews elementary, R.C. Andrews High School, R.C. Andrews Junior High School, and A.B. Duncan elementary, principal, said some audio visual equipment was damaged and full bottles of Coca Cola broken on hallway floors.

"They went into the nurses office and poured medicine on the walls and rifled the office but took nothing," Copeland said.

He said that the vandals also entered the cafeteria, ate popsicles and then scattered the confections around the building to melt.

"I've never seen such a mess as that at the Junior High", Sheriff Cardinal said in discussing the incident.

Bob Alldredge, Junior High principal, said the Junior High library was ransacked, books ripped off the shelves, audio visual equipment damaged or destroyed, large globes damaged, maps destroyed, student projects destroyed, the teachers' lounge ransacked and two lamp fixtures broken.

"Additionally, Mrs. Bernice Walter's classroom was broken into, desks overturned, books strewn around, and other damage done," Alldredge said.

The Junior High principal also noted that his secretary's office was littered with drawers emptied out and the whole area put in general disarray. The office is occupied by Mrs. Dennis Dempsey.

Six to eight persons worked Sunday at the Junior High School to restore it for classes Monday morning, Alldredge

said.

At R.C. Andrews elementary, Principal Preston Watson reported that the intruders broke into the band music room and damaged a bass drum.

"We were fortunate on the music room damage in that there were practically no instruments in the room since the Junior High band festival was last Saturday and the sixth grade band members had taken their instruments home with them; otherwise there could have been a lot more damage," Watson explained.

He said the vandals entered the cafeteria, but did no damage other than messing it up by strewn eating utensils around and denting some wooden tables.

"They left the doors open on our two walk-in freezers, but fortunately it remained cold enough inside that no food was spoiled," Watson said.

The Art Room was broken into by twisting off a hasp and lock and nine of ten newspaper holders destroyed, in addition to generally messing up the room, he said.

In a special education room Coke was poured into a Duquane projection machine causing heavy damage, and some desks were rifled in an apparent search for money. Bulletin boards were desecrated and tempera paint poured on the hall stairs. A typewriter in the teacher's work area had Coke poured into it.

Main damage was in Watson's office. The heavy glass tops on his desk and that of his secretary, Mrs. Leona Warren were broken, personal mementos destroyed, and a general mess made of the area.

This was the second time that vandals had broken into Watson's office in five years and over that time

they have managed to destroy a number of his personal items.

The R.C. Andrews principal said entry had apparently been gained via a classroom window.

At A.B. Duncan elementary, where damage was the lightest, Bob Copeland, principal, said some audio visual equipment was damaged and full bottles of Coca Cola broken on hallway floors.

"They went into the nurses office and poured medicine on the walls and rifled the office but took nothing," Copeland said.

He said that the vandals also entered the cafeteria, ate popsicles and then scattered the confections around the building to melt.

"They also broke into the Coke machine and took maybe a few cents. They entered four classrooms and rifled desks, but took nothing as far as

He said entrance to the building was gained by cutting a screen and breaking a window.

Clocks in the buildings were damaged, and had all stopped between 2 and 2:30 a.m. Sunday, Sheriff Cardinal said.

Asked about leads in the case, Cardinal said that "we have taken fingerprints and also some footprints, and are working on those."

Cardinal said he hoped the school officials would consider the installation of a burglar alarm system in the district's four buildings, in as much as they have been broken into several times over the years.

"We know it wasn't small kids this time, such as ones who did it before and we caught," Cardinal said.

Council Turns Down Rezoning Request On Public Housing

A controversial rezoning request to enable the construction of 10-units of public family open housing was denied at a special noon meeting of the Floydada City Council Tuesday.

The city fathers had wrestled with the request last week for several hours before tabling it so that further investigation could be made before arriving at a decision.

The request was made by HUD (Housing and Urban Development) for the rezoning of the east one half of Block 6, Baker Addition from R-1, single family residential zoning, to R-1C, multiple family residential zoning.

At the May 8 council meeting some 15 citizens appeared to speak against the proposed housing, citing among other reasons that the erection of the 10 units would damage their property values, contribute to the population

load of the block, etc.

Wayne Russell, prefacing his motion with the comment, "I don't think we have any choice but to refuse it (the request) if we are going to represent the people," moved to reject the rezoning request.

Councilman Carl Jarrett, seconding the motion, said "since there was no one (citizens) for the rezoning request at the last council meeting, I agree with Wayne that we have to refuse it."

Mayor Parnell Powell asked for a show of hands on the motion and it was passed unanimously.

As last week's Hesperian story pointed out, the 10 family units which were proposed seem to be tied in with an additional 10 units to be erected for the elderly, which no one opposed. It was felt last week that rejection of the rezoning request for the 10 family units would kill chances for getting the

elderly units built, but councilmen and Mayor Powell were somewhat more optimistic at Tuesday's special called meeting that the units could still be built.

One other item on the special meeting agenda was tabled. This was a discussion to change the fire limits of lots 13 through 30, Block 82, originally from the present fire limits. This is where the proposed 10 units for the elderly would be built.

Councilmen agreed that they would act on the fire limit change if the elderly units are built as hoped.

Those attending the meeting were Mayor Powell, City Manager Bill Feuerbacher, City Attorney Bill Kincaid, Councilmen Johnny B. Sue, Leroy Burns, Jerry Thompson, Wayne Russell and Carl Jarrett. City Secretary Jimmie Lou Stewart took the minutes.

Trustees Approve Tennis Repairs, 2 New Buses

Decisions to purchase two new school buses and repair badly deteriorated tennis courts at the Junior High School highlighted the regular meeting of the Floydada Independent School district board of trustees Monday night.

Business Manager Tom Cathy told the trustees that 93.2% of the district's taxes have been collected through April, amount '79 thus far to \$841,444 of the \$899,400 on the tax rolls, leaving some \$38,199 outstanding as unpaid, after discounting some \$19,757 as uncollectable.

After approving the minutes of the last meeting the trustees listened to a request made by Lon Davis, member of the Floydada Tennis Association that the trustees consider authorizing the repair and refurbishing of the junior high tennis courts which are badly in need of repair.

Davis, who made a cogent and persuasive presentation, told the attentive trustees that the Tennis Association would like to help with the cost of renovating the courts, in as much as the association uses the courts for regular and tournament play.

It was agreed by the trustees that the Tennis Association could make an unrestricted donation to the district's athletic fund, which the district could

use as they saw fit in their athletic program.

A firm in El Paso, Mallot, Peterson, and Grundy, in the tennis court construction business since 1911, had submitted a bid on repair of the courts, as had two other area firms.

Davis was accompanied to the meeting by his wife and Frank Barrow as interested members of the Tennis Association.

June Ware moved and Betty Holmes seconded that the trustees authorize Superintendent A.E. Baker and Business Manager Tom Cathy to proceed immediately to seek final costs on the repair project. The administrators were advised that should the district's cost of the project run to more than \$3500 the trustees would be readvised on the matter.

After disposing of the tennis court matter, the lights went out. Superintendent Baker was equal to the occasion: he quickly felt his way out of the blacked out room with a cigarette lighter and momentarily reentered carrying a large, lighted, green fluted candle. Just as the group had resettled, determined to carry on by candle light, the electricity resumed.

After studying a comprehensive and informative report on the state of the district's nine regular buses and its nine spares, which was prepared by Tom Cathy, members voted to purchase two new 53-passenger buses equipped with power steering, automatic transmissions, rear seat heaters and bookracks. Total cost for the units, which will take nearly a year to procure, is about \$29,570, Cathy's figures showed.

He advised the board that two of the spare buses should be sold when delivery of the new units is made. Bus purchases must be made through the state board of control on a state contract, and therefore require six to 12 months for delivery from the time the order is placed, Baker told the group.

In final business the trustees authorized the employment or reemployment of Glenn Jarnagin as Vocational Education Handicapped teacher, Donna Harmon as an elementary teacher, Pat Barrow as an elementary teacher to replace Mrs. Tony Igo, and H.L. Mitchusson as a mathematics teacher in high school.

District bills were allowed approved and instructed to be paid.

All trustees attended the meeting. They are Betty Holmes, Martha Farris, secretary, June Ware, Travis Jones, president, Lawrence Stovall, Harvey Allen, and Adrain Helms.
