

District Court In Final Week

The Special District Court entered on the final week of this term Monday morning. Judge Brooks expects to clear his docket this week.

The grand jury was reconvened Tuesday of last week after having recessed for more than a week. Within a short time after starting work Tuesday indictments were returned against Cork Hipp of Colorado and Albert McKinney of Westbrook charging them with burglary of the Oblesby store at Westbrook on Friday night. In addition to the indictments against Hipp and McKinney, the grand jury, in its final report filed with the court Wednesday, reported a bill of indictment against John Grafford of Westbrook on the charge of selling intoxicating liquors.

The three bills reported by the grand jury Wednesday placed total felonies for the term at 17. Fourteen indictments were reported when the jury recessed on March 2.

Hipp and McKinney were brought to trial last Wednesday. Hipp received two years in the penitentiary. He was already under a two-year suspended sentence for car theft given him at Colorado last year and was not eligible to claim benefit of the suspended sentence law. The Judge permitted the two terms to run concurrently.

McKinney was assessed a five-year suspended sentence, after it had been shown the court he had never been convicted on a felony charge.

Acreage Law Held Void

The tenth court of civil appeals at Waco has held the cotton acreage reduction law unconstitutional and the decision has become final. The 15-day time limit passed without a motion for rehearing being filed.

Tom Tyson, county attorney of Robertson county and the defenders of the law in the test suit, said that he would not carry the fight to the supreme court. He pointed out that the statute had been held unconstitutional both by the trial court and the court of civil appeals.

The test suit therefore did not settle definitely the constitutionality of the law as a subsequent case may be carried to the supreme court. However, unless and until that is done, the law will be unenforceable.
