Real-World Forum To Be Held Here To Gather Citizen Input For Education "Raising Expectations To Meet Real-World Needs"

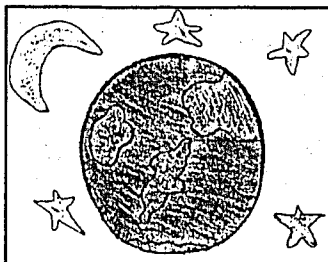
Santa Anna citizens are going to have an opportunity to have a say about what they feel students should be able to accomplish by the time they graduate high school. A forum is to be held for this purpose at 7:00 p.m., November 11, in the school cafeteria. Betty Tucker and Donna Tomme are in charge of this very important meeting. In the forum the Texas Education Agency is inviting you to participate in a citizen input process to determine the skills and knowledge that young people need to be successful in the real world.

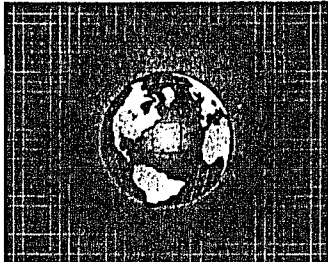
This effort, called "Raising Expectations to Meet Real World Needs," is being conducted in cooperation with the Office of Governor Ann Richards, the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, the Texas Department of Commerce, the Texas Employment Commission, and the Texas Business and Education Coalition.

The major feature of this process is the discussions that are being held by a wide variety of groups across the state through the month of November. At these discussions, called Real-World-Forums, participants will be asked the

question, What do students need to know and be able to do by the time they graduate to be successful in higher education, in the workplace, and in other adult settings? Your response to this question will help guide state policy for public schools in curriculum, student

assessment, and classroom instruction.

All groups such as the Volunteer Fire Department, Delta Omicron, Churches and Sunday School Classes, the Chamber of Commerce, etc..... as well as individuals in the community are encouraged to participate in this public involvement process. Along with your neighbors and colleagues, you can receive information about the future of work and higher education in Texas, and discuss and inform the state of the knowledge and skills that you believe young people should acquire by the time they graduate.

Other states also are addressing this question, but none has involved the public at large on the same scale as is Texas.

If you care about the future of education, you are encouraged to be at the November 11 meeting and bring someone with you.

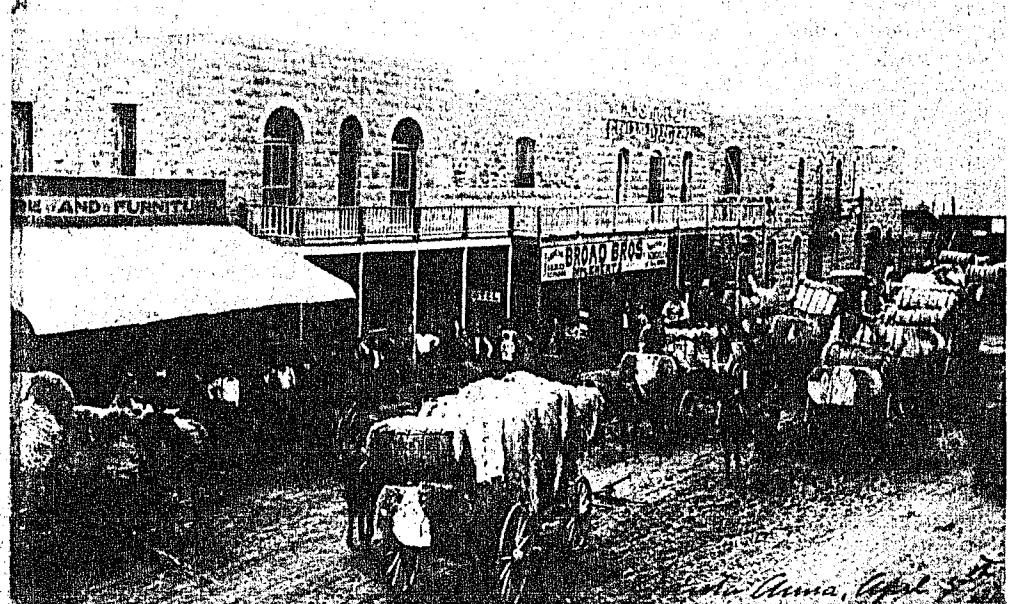
Smith is married to the Rev. Clarence Smith and the mother of two sons who reside in St. Louis, Missouri. She is the grandmother of three.

The one shown here is from the files of Santa Anna News and depicts a busy scene in Santa Anna in the early 1900's in which horsedrawn wagons are hauling numerous bales of cotton. The rock buildings you see were in the business block where Western Auto, Countywide Insurance and others are now located. At the far right is pictured a blacksmith shop which was located where the building now stands which will house the Santa Anna Development Committee's office. Cordero Baptist To Build New Sanctuary, Brick By Brick

Cordero Baptist Church has outgrown their building in six years time and has begun to build another sanctuary. According to pastor Joe Frausto, the present sanctuary will be used for a fellowship hall and classrooms when the new structure is complete.

The Church was started a number of years ago as a mission of First Baptist Church, with the congregation meeting at various times at First Baptist Church annex, the Santa Anna Civic Center, and in the New Hope Church on Brady highway.

With the present building now paid for, the 40 member congregation has started a program of building the new sanctuary "brick by brick" with members and

other interested persons purchasing a brick or bricks to help with the construction project. Names of donors will be inscribed on the bricks. Rev. Frausto estimates the project will cost about \$35,000 to \$40,000 with members doing most of the work.

The cement slab foundation was poured Tuesday. When finished the new building will include bathrooms, a library and office along with the sanctuary which will include a baptistry. The congregation has been conducting baptismal ceremonies at First Baptist Church since their present facility does not have a baptistry.

The Love of Reading Begins At Home

Reading can be taught at schools, but children learn the love of reading at home. Parents play an important part in teaching their children to love reading. By setting aside 15 minutes a day from their busy schedules to share a reading experience with their child, parents provide a skill that is necessary for success in life—reading. Here are some practical techniques for sharing books with children:

SET THE EXAMPLE. Children learn by watching those around them. If reading is important to you, it will be more important to your child.

EXPLORE LIFE TOGETHER. Creating new experiences for children provides background for reading. By enhancing the child's observation skills, you build a rich background the child can use when reading. This background will allow reading to become more meaningful.

CHOOSE A TIME AND PLACE. Find a special time and place to read to your children. Anytime and anyplace can be appropriate. The important step is to share reading.

SELECT APPROPRIATE BOOKS. Select books based on the child's age and interest. Young children enjoy nursery rhymes, tales about animals, and stories about familiar objects. As your child grows, expand the types of books to include both educational and fun topics. Fairy tales, folklore and stories about real life can be shared. Regardless of how well you read, or the language you speak, share stories. By selecting picture books, stories can be created. Books that come with a cassette tape can be listened together.

SHARE BOOKS. Sharing a book is more than just reading. Look at the cover together. Talk about the title, make predictions about what might happen, and notice details in the pictures. Read for enjoyment. Both you and your child will enjoy using expressions in your voices to show emotion or

Deer and Turkey Hunting Season Begins Saturday Morning

Don Davis, Wildlife Biologist with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department reminds landowners and sportsmen that the 1993 general deer hunting season in Coleman County will begin on Saturday, Nov. 6, 1993 and run through Sunday, Jan. 2, 1994.

The bag limit is four deer, no more than two bucks. No special permits are required for harvesting antlerless deer, however, both bucks and antlerless deer must be tagged with the appropriate tag from a hunting license.

"We conducted our annual fall deer surveys in the county during August and September," said Davis. These survey help determine overall deer density, reproduction, and sex

change in characters. Talk about how the story relates to your child's life.

EXTEND THE READING EXPERIENCE. Attend a play or community event that relates to a book. Visit the library. Establish for the child a library of their own. Find other ways to relate life to reading.

By sharing time and reading with children, a parent can nurture the love of reading.

It is impossible to survey each individual ranch so standard survey lines are established and counted each year. By collecting this trend information over a period of several years, it is possible to make density estimates and to suggest general harvest recommendations for the county.

The recommended guideline to harvesting antlerless deer throughout most of the county is one antlerless deer per 200 acres.

"However, this general recommendation does not automatically mean a heavy harvest of antlerless deer is needed," indicated Davis.

Age and antler information gathered during surveys of lockers and cold storage facilities indicate the harvest of bucks in the county has been comparatively heavy. The proper harvest of bucks will allow bucks to reach some of their genetic potential. Therefore, it is important for each landowner to look closely at his existing deer herd and decide how many deer need to be harvested, if any.

Hunters are reminded to show respect for the land on which they are hunting and to practice gun safety and good sportsmanship. Report game violations to the game warden, Steve Vail at 625-4421 or James Nixon at 625-3646, or by calling OPERATION GAME THIEF at 1-800-792-GAME (4263).

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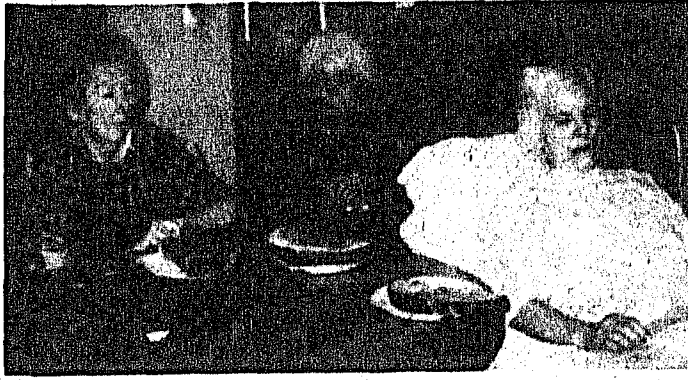
